Fifteenth Street Sewer.

As provided by ordinance the street committee of the city council opened bids Saturday evening for the construction of the main sewer on East Fifteenth street.

Following were the bids submitted: R. R. & R. R., Portland, \$7,273.96; Jacobson Bros. & Co., Portland, \$6,285.60; Mummy Bros., Eugene, \$6,200. Mummy Bros. being the lowest bidder were awarded the contract.

Mummy Bros. constructed the Eleventh street sewer and the work was satisfactory in every particular excepting that the tile used was too small. The new sewer will be of 18-inch pipe, ample size to carry off all sewerage.

The bids for grading and graveling A and Aider streets were opened. A. U. Matthews' bid of 50 cents per cubic yard for graveling and Blanton & Winfrey's bid of 30 cents per running yard for grading were accepted.

The improvements will be made immediately. A street is the first street west of the U. O. campus and Aider is next.

GIANT SCHEME FOR POWER

Eastern and San Francisco Capital to Invest.

Negotiating for Power and Light Plants in the Valley-McKenzie Water Fall Filing May Figure.

Dr. D. A. Paine, president of the Eugene Electric Light Company, returned from a trip to Portland this morning. When seen concerning a rumor of Eastern capital offering to buy out the light company he informed a GUARD reporter that the status of the case is this:

There is a giant scheme on foot to buy out all the light companies of the coast by Eastern capital, conduct an extensive electrical system whereby many of the cities which now own and conduct their own light plants will rent from this corporation at so much per horse power.

There are several different sets of capital intent on the same scheme as the light company here has received letters of inquiry from both New York and San Francisco concerning the annual profit, cost of operating and mode of power employed for the local plant.

The letter from San Francisco told that the intention of the parties behind the capital was to buy outright the existing companies, involving millions of dollars, improve the property, or where necessary demanded, to improve new property, or existing power from local centers of energy, of which there are plenty along the intended main line. This letter also asked the company if it wanted to sell out and if it would be willing to let the power of the new company. The power will be used for electric trolley lines, run mills, manufacturing and for anything for which power is necessary.

Dr. Paine stated that the local company is not anxious to sell but have their figures for which, if met, they will dispose of the plant to responsible parties. He also stated that it is now known that these capitalists have had secret surveys visit every city where they wish to buy and survey the plans and get full data as to power, etc. They therefore know what they are offering to buy. An official survey will be made if the present preliminary negotiations are closed and a willingness to sell is evinced.

Today's Oregonian contains an outline of the foregoing.
It is thought by several that the big on waterfalls of the McKenzie and Horse Creek by the Cascade Power Company through J. B. Rhinehart, the other day has something to do with the center of power for this community. The papers of the Cascade Company read "for the purpose of mining, irrigating, electrical power and culinary use." The attitude for operation is, as seen, very broad.

FIRST 1902 HOPS SOLD TODAY

Frank E. Dunn Touches Top Notch For Prices—Pays 25 Cents Per Pound.

The whole shipment of 38 bales of Early Fugles was purchased by Frank Dunn for 25 cents per pound, the highest price by three cents paid for hops to date. 18 bales were delivered today. FELL THROUGH A BRIDGE

Ed Andrews, Wife and Mrs. Riley Met With Nearly a Fatal Accident.

CORVALLIS, Aug. 28.—An accident which nearly proved fatal occurred to Ed Andrews and wife, of Corvallis, and the later's sister, Mr. L. N. Riley of Portland, Sunday afternoon, while the party was returning to Corvallis. Mrs. Andrews having met Mr. Riley on her way from Eugene. While passing over a trestle bridge four miles east of Corvallis, the center span of the structure collapsed, precipitating the team, buggy and occupants a distance of 18 feet into three feet of water, and a unknown depth of mud. In the fall, the three persons were turned underneath the vehicle. Mr. Andrews was the first to emerge from the critical situation, and fortunately he was enabled to promptly rescue his wife.

When she was safely on shore Mr. Andrews made a search for Mrs. Riley and presently saw a hand emerge from the muddy water, and in the face of much danger from the struggling horses plunged forward and successfully rescued her, but not before she was nearly drowned. She was unconscious but was soon revived.

All received injuries, none serious except those of Mrs. Riley, whose spine was injured between the shoulders, causing a partial paralysis of the arms.

A NEW LUMBER COMPANY

Daily Guard Aug. 28.
Articles of incorporation of the Cottage Grove Lumber Co. with a capital stock of \$100,000 were filed with County Clerk E. U. Lee this morning. The incorporators are F. D. Wheeler, F. P. Phillips and J. E. Young. The objects and business of the company, as given in the articles of incorporation, shall be to purchase, hold, mortgage, hypothecate and dispose of real estate and timber and to own and operate sawmills, shingle mills and other machinery and to build, construct and own such buildings, roads, dams and other appliances as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of the incorporation. The principal office and place of business is Cottage Grove, Ore. The capital stock is divided into 10,000 shares of par value of \$10 each.

Mr. Young is the well known Cottage Grove attorney and Messrs. Wheeler and Phillips are real estate men in business there. When asked by the GUARD what the plans of the new company are, Mr. Young replied that at present he is not authorized to make them known, but would be in a short time.

THURSTON REAL ESTATE DEALS

Dr. B. F. Russell, superintendent of the county poor farm at Thurston, was in the city today on his way to Goldson to take to the poor farm an old man by the name of Cantrell who is afflicted with paralysis and who is unable to support himself.

Dr. Russell told the GUARD of two important real estate deals that have been made at Thurston during the last few days. Martin Reese sold his 100-acre farm to Mr. Russell for \$40,000 and James Weaver sold his farm also of 100 acres to a Mr. Bunch for \$50,000, the difference in price being because of better buildings on the latter farm.

Dr. Russell, Anson Potter and wife and Fred Russell and wife returned a few days ago from a trip to Lamona, Crook county, having made the trip across the mountains. They found Dr. McKinney, formerly a practicing physician of Eugene located on a small farm six miles from Sisters which he had purchased for \$900.

Found Guilty.

Officer J. S. Stiles had a warrant out yesterday for the arrest of one John Davis charged with assault on B. J. Wattle, who lives out near Mound. The affair occurred Saturday morning in the Oregon saloon and resulted in a broken jaw for Wattle. Davis was located in Junction last night and brought to Eugene this morning. He was arraigned before Justice Wintermeier immediately and refused to plead. According to law the judge entered a plea of not guilty. The trial came up this afternoon at 2 o'clock and the prisoner was adjudged guilty of the charge. Sentence will be passed tomorrow.

Erma and Freds Laird, whose home is across the river from Jasper, had a heavy gate fall on them while passing through it a few days ago, and it was a wonder they were not seriously injured.

PRESIDENT COMING

Roosevelt Will Visit Oregon This Coming Autumn.

The Two Street Car Systems of Portland to Be Combined—Boy Drowned at Roseburg.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—United States Senator A. G. Foster, of Washington, who is in this city, is authority for the statement that President Roosevelt will visit this coast this fall. The chief executive will be accompanied by his wife and family and will remain, it is said, in San Francisco for at least three days. Senator Foster was here on his way to Honolulu where he will meet other members of a committee appointed to look into affairs of the crown lands. He expects the arrival of Senator Mitchell today.

In speaking of the intended visit of President Roosevelt to San Francisco and the Pacific coast in general, Senator Foster stated that affairs are at present being arranged for the proposed trip. The president will visit during his tour, all cities by the way of Oregon, Washington and Montana and will return via the Union Pacific.

Boy Drowned.

ROSEBURG, Aug. 28.—Carlin Kent Lovell, aged 15 years, was drowned in the South Umpqua at Roseburg Sunday afternoon while in swimming. Tommy Fletcher, aged 11 years, made a heroic attempt to rescue him and was drawn under the water by the Lovell boy three times, but was unable to render him any assistance. The body was found in a hole 8 or 10 feet deep but efforts to revive him were fruitless. The victim is the son of T. H. Lovell, who is now in jail in Roseburg for the killing of Horace Roadman, near Willamette last July.

Street Railway Merger.

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—Negotiations are now said to be pending for the consolidation of the Portland Railway Company, the City & Suburban Railway Company and the various electric and gas companies of the city into one large organization. A number of influential capitalists are back of the scheme, and they propose that the new company shall have a capitalization of about \$100,000, and will bear some such names as the United Railroad & Electric Company of Portland.

Murderer White Caught.

PORTLAND, Aug. 28.—Andrew White, the slayer of Peter Beuchene, the Frenchman, who was found dead on the street the other night, was arrested at Vancouver, Wash. last night and brought to Portland today.

Ten Years in Pen.

WHATCOMB, Wash., Aug. 28.—Judge Neuner yesterday sentenced H. St. John Dix to ten years in the penitentiary, the limit under the laws of Washington.

From Professor Carson.

Clay Carson, of the Oregon State University, who is making a trip through Europe, remembered many Oregon friends and yesterday post cards were received by many of them, written from Cambridge, England, says the Oregonian. On one of the cards was a picture of Edinburgh Castle, and the following inscription in her own handwriting: "This castle was once the home of the Kings of Scotland. It looks down upon one of the most beautiful cities in the world. It looks off on many battle-fields where England and Scotland fought. The crown of the old Scotch Kings is here."

LONG TRAMP OF TWO U O STUDENTS

SALEM, Aug. 28.—Ralph A. Fenton, son of Attorney W. D. Fenton, and Ralph Dolph, youngest son of the late Senator Dolph, both of Portland, spent a portion of yesterday in Salem, where they attracted not a little attention. They were just finishing a 600-mile tramp through probably the most picturesque region of the state.

The boys left Eugene on July 8 n., walking over the mountains by way of the Siuslaw country district to the coast. A week was spent at Newport, and they then proceeded along the coast to Astoria and Seaside, thence to Portland. The distance of 120 miles from Astoria to Portland was made in four days. A tramp to Mount Hood followed. The ascent of the peak was made Tuesday, August 19. The boys returned to the Willamette valley via Oregon City, thence to Salem along the Southern Pacific track. Having spent Sunday with S. L. M. friends, they left early this morning for Eugene via Mouthout and Corvallis. They carried their cooking utensils and blankets in a pack, and enjoyed an ideal outing with all the attending hardships and inconveniences. In the absence of bridges they frequently swam streams, pushing their clothing and personal effects across on an improvised raft.

The members of the crew, who have searched faithfully all week, found the body, which was in a bad state of decomposition. Relatives of the deceased were notified from here by telephone, and the answer came back that an undertaker would leave at once to take charge of the remains.
