## DIED FROM A PARALYTIC STROKE

### William West Passed Away at Pleasant Hill Yesterday Afternoon.

William West, for 18 years an honored citizen and resident of Pleasant Hill, yesterday afternoon at the ripe old age of 82 years, 11 months and 13 days, succumbed to an attack of paralysis which his age prevented him from enduring. The deceased came with his family from Canada in 1884, locating at Pleasant Hill immediately. He was born in Scotland in 1819 and crossed the waters when 20 years of age. He was the father of John and William West, of West Bros' Livery Stable of Eugene. Beside these sons his widow, four daughters, Mesdames Jane Emblirst and Lizzie Short, of Canada; Anna Walker and Mary Bristow, of Pleasant Hill; and another son, David, who is also in Canada survive him.

Rev D C Kellems, pastor of the Christian church of Pleasant Hill, conducted the funeral services today at 2 o'clock at the home. Interment be made in the Pleasant Hill cemetery.

### Faithful Horse Sold.

About as good and true a horse as ever pulled in single harness was the old bay owned by H C Humphrey, and which traveled many hundreds of miles on Eugene streets and Lane county roads. He never balked or ran away, however careless the driver might be. Kept the middle of the road regardless of rocks, rut-stumps, which had rendered him a desirable animal for a single buggy. On the death of Mr Humphrey, W R Walker fell heir to the old horse, (he is about twenty years of age.) He gave him a home on his Bear Creek ranch, where for several years he has been a horse of pleasure. Yesterday he sold him and this old fellow must again don harness and take up the burdens of life.

### Fell Down Stairs.

Mrs Ellen Willoughby, the aged mother of Dr L R Willoughby, last night about ten o'clock, after she had retired, arose and in entering a room to raise a window she missed her footing and fell half way down the stairs, fracturing her right wrist and bruising her face and body quite extensively. ## JONATHAN CARMAN WANTS A DIVORCE

Jonathan Carman has commenced action in the Lane county circuit court against his wife, Mary Carman, for a divorce.

The plaintiff alleges that he and the defendant were married in Lane county in October, 1891, and the issue of said marriage is one child, Maud E Carman, aged 9 years. That about Jan 10, 1898, the defendant left the plaintiff and has not lived with the plaintiff since said time. That the defendant disordered her marriage vows and has been guilty of adultery with one James McCaulum at Portland and with other men whose names are unknown to plaintiff. That said defendant during the months of June, July and August, 1902, lived and cohabited with said James McCaulum. That the plaintiff always treated the defendant with kindness and affection and has been a dutiful husband. J J Walton is the plaintiff's attorney.

## ANOTHER NEW SAWMILL

### An Eastern Company Will Build One at Natron.

### Contracts Have Been Signed, Leasing Twenty Acres From Jesse Smith for a Mill Site.

NATRON, Aug 22.—Contracts have been signed between Jesse Smith, of this place, and a large Eastern lumbering firm, leasing 20 acres of land for 50 years on which a sawmill with a capacity of 175,000 feet per day will be built at once.

The new company has acquired 500 acres of timber land, have an option on a large tract and is also negotiating with the railroad company for another tract.

Active work on the new mill site and surroundings will commence within the next ten days and the mill will be rushed to completion. It is the intention of the company to place a modern plant with dry-houses and planers and they expect to be in operation this fall.

#### PROBABLY A SECOND MILL.

It is also stated that this company has an eye on large tracts of timber on the McKenzie and have cruisers on the land at present. If they are successful in securing it, it is probable that they will have another big mill in operation in this county within a year.

The mill at Natron will be placed about a quarter of a mile above the depot. The old river channel which is a natural mill pond will be improved upon and used as a pond.

### High Priced Hop Contract.

SALEM, Aug 23.—The top notch in prices for the 1902 crop of hops was reached in this city this week when Andy Cune, of Macleay, sold to a Lehman & Co. of New York, through the latter's local agent, George L Rose, 10,000 pounds of this year's growth for a consideration of 22 cents per pound. This contract was entered into on Monday last, but has not as yet been filed for record. The grower was paid 24 cents per pound, or \$226, upon signing the contract and will receive an advance of 5 cents per pound at picking time.

### The Springfield Mill.

The Booth-Kelly Co's new sawmill at Springfield is progressing in fine shape. The main building is now nearly covered with sheeting and in a few days will be shingled. The other buildings are progressing in good shape and the new mill pond of 15 or 20 acres is about completed. Springfield is enjoying a veritable boom. Values have enhanced and building is the order of the day.

### Carnival Banners.

Eugene's carnival and a root fair to be held September 24-25-26-27 will be well advertised in surrounding towns. Besides placing advertisements in the newspapers and sending out literature, the general committee is having painted four large street banners, similar to the ones here, and will have them hung across the principal business streets of each of the following towns: Albany, Junction City, Cottage Grove and Roseburg.

### Married.

A very quiet wedding was solemnized at the residence of Mr and Mrs W T Lewis at Junction City Wednesday evening, uniting their daughter Miss Leah Lewis and Mr Horatio Skaggs. Rev Skaggs, father of the groom, performed the ceremony. Only the immediate relatives of the contracting parties were present.

Junction City Times: The Harburt-Nicklin Mercantile Co has rented the adjoining room on the south formerly occupied by Mrs Sibbett's millinery store and will fit out the room as an annex. An arch will be made in the wall through which entrance will be made, as the front door will be closed. This will give much additional room for the display and sale of goods.

## WALLA WALLA HARVESTING

### Three Combined Harvesters Cut 100 Acres a Day--36 Horses Pull Each of Them.

An Oregonian staff correspondent writing from Walla Walla, Aug 12, gives an account of the latest evolution in the wheat-growing business, the combined harvester. He writes:

"There are some very interesting sights on the big wheat farms of this country now that the harvest is in full blast. The working of a single combined harvester, if it were near a city, would draw a crowd like a circus parade and it is a sight worth seeing. Out a few miles from Walla Walla today three of these combines, one following the other in the same field, are working on one of the Drumhelle farms. Over 100 horses are at work on the three machines and they are cutting nearly one hundred acres per day.

A combine drawn by a 60-horsepower traction engine is one of the star features of Eugene Flat this season, and it is said to be as perfect a success as the machines operated by horse power. The steam combine is larger than anything ever before turned out in a Northwestern wheat field and will cut a swath 42 feet wide and when worked to the limit will handle 100 acres of wheat per day.

"If the steam machines should come into general use it would have quite an effect on the horse market, for in this county alone there are nearly 50 combines, requiring the services of over 1500 horses. Practically all of the combines in use in Oregon and Washington are made by one firm, the Holt Manufacturing Co, which has a larger plant here at Walla Walla. They have sold in the two states this season 110 machines. To operate these machines will require the services of about 3500 horses and 500 men."

Mrs Alexander Patterson read a splendid paper on "The Story of a Great Feat in American Politics." ## IN THE JUNCTION POLICE COURT

### A Eugene Harness Maker Paints the Town Red and Lands in Jail.

Business in the police court has been remarkably brisk during the past week, says the Junction Times. A harness maker from Eugene threw himself out side of a large quantity of red liquor and as he persisted in making himself obnoxious, he was placed in the city bastille and Recorder Clark assessed him \$8 which included trimmings.
