PURCHASED WATER POWER

Hendricks and Chambers Bought Property on McKenzie.

One of the Finest Water Powers in the State Will Be Improved By These Gentlemen.

Daily Guard, Aug 27. One of the most valuable water powers in the state, that of the McKenzie river at Hayden Bridge, has just been purchased by T G Hendricks and F L Chambers, two of Eugene's best known and most public spirited capitalists.

As seen by the list of deeds filed for record in the county clerk's office today, Messrs Hendricks and Chambers have acquired title to the land, amounting to a large acreage, on each side of the McKenzie in this vicinity and are now absolute owners of this fine water power. It is located about six miles east of Eugene where the Mohawk branch of the S P railroad crosses the McKenzie.

A GUARD reporter in an interview with Mr Hendricks this afternoon learned that they contemplate improvements on the property, but they have no plans to make public at this time. Mr Hendricks said that they consider their purchase a very valuable franchise.

The purchase of this splendid power by these two gentlemen is a very important deal. It no doubt means in time the erection of a great electric power plant and the transmission of the power to Eugene, Springfield and perhaps other towns by wire for the operation of factories, mills, etc.

Jerry Dammon Wants Divorce

Jeremiah Dammon, the well known timber cruiser, has instituted divorce proceedings against his wife, Mary E Dammon, on the ground of desertion. In his complaint Mr Dammon alleges as follows: That he and his wife were married at Eau Claire, Wis, in May, 1880; that there are no minor children; that the plaintiff is now a resident of Lane county and has been for more than a year; that the plaintiff was the defendant's kind and affectionate husband and furnished the defendant with a good home and provided suitable food and clothing; that he performed the duties as husband will and faithfully; that the defendant in September, 1900, willfully deserted the plaintiff and has lived separate and apart from him since. Chas M Kinsinger is the plaintiff's attorney in the case.

Changed Ownership.

The Bohemian Nugget, published at Cottage Grove by C J Howard and Lee Henry, is now under sole ownership of Lee Henry, formerly of Eugene, where he was reporter on the Register for a few weeks. Mr Henry went from here last winter to buy half interest in the Nugget, which has prospered under the partnership. C J Howard will devote his entire time to his duties as postmaster.

The famed lot of Early Fugle hops purchased yesterday by Frank Dunn, were shipped today to Livestock Bros, of New York City, at a slightly advanced figure. They will be rushed through by fast freight so as to reach the market earlier than any other 1902 hops. There were 38 bales in the lot.

Joel Haskell has sold his Crescent blacksmith business and moved to Harrisburg where he bought out an established shop.

THE POWERS PLACE SOLD

The Well Known Upper McKenzie Camping Place Changes Hands.

Nearly twenty years ago A S Powers, and family located a homestead on the banks of the McKenzie River at the new McKenzie Bridge post-office. He cleared a piece out of the timber, planted an orchard and built substantial improvements. A ditch brings water through the place from farther up the river and the water makes the light soil produce good crops of excellent vegetables and hay.

The other day Mr Powers sold the place to John O'Leary, a substantial business man of Eastern Oregon, who has pastured several thousand sheep on the reserve in the McKenzie road vicinity for two seasons past, and camped with his family during the summer months at one or other of the hot springs on McKenzie Bridge. Then they would return to their Eastern Oregon home in the fall. We are informed that Mr Powers will move to Eugene for the winter.

SPRINGFIELD SAWMILL

New Mill to Have Capacity of 250,000 Feet in 22 Hours.

All Accessory Buildings for a Thoroughly Modern Plant-- A Twenty-Five Acre Log Pond.

Daily Guard Aug 28. A GUARD representative made a visit to the big sawmill being built by the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company at Springfield yesterday, and was shown about and informed as to the scope of the work.

LOCATION. The new mill, with land for lumber yards, railroads tracks and a mammoth artificial excavated millpond for holding logs, occupies about forty acres of the flat between the millrace on the north, the Thurston butte on the south and Springfield on the west. The west line being several hundred yards up the millrace from the old sawmill.

MILL AND POND. The sawmill building covers a space 56 by 252 feet. The main floor of the mill stands ten feet above the ground, being supported by rows of 16 by 16 inch timbers which stand on mudsills. This basement will be used for planers, bath machines and other small machinery connected with the plant. Above this basement the frame of the mill stands sixteen feet high. The roof is made of solidly laid flooring which will be covered with terra cotta, rendering it fireproof. Workmen are now engaged laying the terra cotta.

ACCESSORY BUILDINGS. A lumber shed 180 by 240 feet for finishing lumber, the dressed product, is partially completed next the butte on the south, far enough away from the mill to be safe from fire in case of accident. Adjacent to the north, a mess house with sleeping quarters will be provided, while the engine and boiler rooms will be built on the south.

While the mill building itself is of proportions required for a first-class modern sawmill, the ground staked out for the pond--for the pond must be "built" too--brings the more special attention of the novice in modern saw-milling to the magnitude of the work has the Booth-Kelly Company have planned to conduct at this place. This pond, which must at one time hold the logs required to operate the mill for the spring and winter seasons at least, is laid out east and south of the mill, extending to the butte on the south, comprising twenty-five acres. A vast amount of excavation will be required as about four feet of depth must be made through removal of the soil. This will be scraped and carted to the four sides, but is not necessary for retaining embankments, except in the case of flood, as the surface of the millrace is about eight inches below the level of the ground. At present but little excavation work has been done and that on the north side of the millrace. The removal of four feet of soil from a twenty-five acre tract of land is no small job of itself. It is estimated the pond will retain 75,000,000 feet of timber, it is measured in the log.

While noting the size of the mill building and storage pond for logs no doubt the reader has been figuring on the amount of lumber that will be turned out. Machinery will be supplied the mill capable of cutting 150,000 feet per day of twelve hours or 250,000 feet if run to its full capacity of twenty-two hours, allowing probably two hours for making changes of workmen and the two meals in middle of shifts.

RAILROAD FACILITIES. Two railroad switches will be built for the accommodation of the mill. One along the mill structure directly on the north for handling the bulk of the product, the rough and unfinished lumber, logs, etc. The other around on the east side of the hill by the sheds that will hold the finished lumber.

WILLAMETTE RAILROAD BRIDGE. It is intended to work the Southern Pacific Railroad Company will bridge the Willamette nearby and connect with the main track a mile away with westerly, in order to save the useless haul of all this lumber. Forty miles north to Astoria and back again within easy ride of the place whence it started.

Truly the Booth-Kelly Company are laying out broad grounds for work at the little town three miles above Eugene.
