DOES HIMSELF NO CREDIT.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The following statement was made public at the White House this afternoon: "On Monday, Oct. 6 Hon. Carroll D. Wright, Commissioner of Labor, went to Philadelphia and gave to Mr. John Mitchell the following from the President: 'If Mr. Mitchell will secure the immediate return to work of the miners in the anthracite regions, the President will at once appoint a committee to investigate thoroughly into all matters at issue between the operators and miners, and will do all in his power to obtain the settlement of those questions in accordance with the report of the committee.'"

It is not to the credit of President Roosevelt that he makes such an offer. Look at the facts. The coalminers have been out on a strike three months. During that time practically no coal has been mined and stocks have diminished to such an extent that European shipments become necessary; the mineowners—several great railroad corporations—absolutely refuse to treat or arbitrate the wage question with their employees; public sympathy is with the miners.

President Roosevelt is aware of these facts. He has been accused of having an abnormal bump of self esteem and his proposition seems to bear the accusation out. The idea that the miners should throw away all the advantage they have gained on the promise of a "committee" and to "do all in his power to obtain a settlement of the questions at issue in accordance with the report of the committee" is preposterous. The President has lowered himself in the estimation of thinking people, however they may view the strike, by making such an offer. It is no wonder that the Executive Council of the Federation of Labor, in charge of the miners' interests, refused to accept the President's offer for the pertinent reason that "the proposition contains no tangible advantage to the miners, being dependent on future action." A "Rough Rider," not a statesman, occupies the presidential chair.

WHAT IS TIMBER WORTH?

In an editorial on "The Timber Market" yesterday's GUARD our mathematics got sadly mixed. Referring to the price to which logs have been advanced over on Gray's Harbor—six dollars a thousand—we stated that a five million-foot quarter section of timber land should be worth \$3000 to a Lane county owner, less extra logging expenses and differences in lumber transportation charges between here and the Gray's Harbor country. It should have been \$30,000.

Even a third of the sum net would seem a fabulous price, but the difference in logging expenses added to transportation charges to the seaboard certainly would not take off more than two-thirds of the Gray's Harbor market price.

Such figures will make every owner of and seeker after timber land pause and ask himself as to what timber is really worth. We do not believe that we underestimate the possibilities of the timber market, even for the near future when we assert that sellers are practically giving their timber away at present prices.

Albany Democrat: Now it is reported that Republicans of the East are taking a gloomy view of affairs. The failure to settle the big coal strike has opened the eyes of the people to the true condition of affairs, showing them the real position of the Republican party and emphasizing the fact that trusts are not in the interest of the people. The fact is being appreciated that a high tariff is a trust breeder, and that only by reducing the tariff on trust goods, if not by taking it off entirely, can the trusts be brought to time. Whatever the talk, it is known that the real position of the Republican party as an organization is one of friendliness to the trusts. This is shown in the most emphatic manner possible by the acts of the legislators, which speak louder than words. Whenever we really wish to make a strike at the trusts we will place the government in the hands of a party antagonistic to them, not in the hands of their friends.
