DISTRICT CONVENTION

Report of the Christian Meeting at Fern Ridge.

Three Days' Interesting Sessions Were Held—Reports of Churches Indicate Growth and Prosperity.

Guard Special Service. JUNCTION CITY, Oct. 8.—The annual convention of the Christian church for district No. 6, Lane county, Oregon, met and was called to order Friday, Oct. 3, at 11:15 a. m. in the Christian church at Fern Ridge. The president, W. H. Baughman, being absent, Rev. M. F. Horn, of Eugene, secretary, led in a short praise service, after which Rev. J. S. McCallum, of Eugene, delivered a soul-stirring sermon.

After adjournment for dinner the convention met at 1:30 p. m. Mrs. Anna Bailey, of Junction City, was elected president pro tem.

Written reports were handed in from the Elmira and Hadleyville churches and schools. These were quite flattering, showing them to be in good condition and increasing in membership.

The evening session met at 7:30 when Rev. D. C. Kellums delivered a sermon in his usual scholarly manner and held the attention of the entire audience.

SATURDAY'S MEETING.

The convention reconvened Saturday at 10 a. m. After preliminary exercises, under the head of unfinished business verbal reports from the following churches were handed in: Fern Ridge church and school reported as wide awake, out of debt and Rev. David Olsen employed as pastor for the following year. Though there is no regular pastor of the Franklin church yet the elders keep up their regular Lord's Day service and their school is doing flourishing. The banner report in all lines of work came from Pleasant Hill. Coburg reported all right and doing good work; Jasper the same; Walerville doing excellent work; Cottage Grove doing a grand work, in fact storming the castle; Lancaster going steadily ahead; Rev. Lobdell doing fine work for Junction. Eugene was not reported but everyone aware that Eugene is all right with a grand past and a grand future.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

Election of officers for the ensuing year was held as follows: President, Mrs. Anna Bailey, of Junction; secretary, Rev. David Olsen, of Eugene; treasurer, A. J. Bushnell, Junction, (re-elected).

On a hearty invitation from the delegates from Franklin it was decided to hold the next convention at that place, beginning on Thursday before the second Sunday in October, 1903, at 11 a. m. and holding over Sunday.

Saturday afternoon's service was taken up with an eloquent sermon by Rev. Olsen which touched the hearts of all present.

In the evening Dean Sanderson, of the Eugene Divinity School, gave a sketch of his tour of the Holy Land.

SUNDAY'S SERVICES.

At 11 a. m. Sunday Dean Sanderson preached to a large audience. His earnest plea was for more and better educated young men for the ministry, unity in all lines of Christian work and a thorough evangelization of the entire Northwest. In the afternoon he gave another interesting talk on his tour through the Holy Land.

This closed the convention, and though it was not as largely attended as it might have been and was expected yet a great deal of consecrated work was accomplished.

BANK IN PROSPEROUS CONDITION

Large Increase in Business of Eugene Loan and Savings Bank.

LARGE AMOUNT OF DELINQUENT TAXES

Taxes became delinquent on Monday, October 6th, and hereafter those who did not pay before that date will be levied upon and the costs of the levy will be added to the penalty already attached under the new law.

The amount of Lane county taxes which became delinquent on Monday is, according to the figures in the sheriff's office, \$7,484.42, which is a very large delinquency, more than for any year in several years past.

The only way of accounting for this large delinquency is that the new law is unsatisfactory or is misunderstood.

To Patrons of the City Schools.

The number of pupils in actual attendance on Monday last was 969. The number in average attendance for the first school month of last year was 831. Certain grades of the schools are at present so crowded that applicants for admission have been refused admission at this time for lack of room. The board of directors anticipate that this condition may become general. In order that the board may have all the facts before them, so that they may make some provision in so far as our congested condition make it necessary, the undersigned has been instructed to urge all parents whose children are not yet in school to have them report at their respective schools on Monday the 13th inst. for enrollment. Where this for any reason is not possible they are urged to notify me by letter or in person, naming the children, the grade affected, and when they propose to enter. This will materially help the board to information necessary for proper action.

George L. Hastings Dead.

George L. Hastings, an old resident of the Thurston neighborhood, died at his home at 10:30 o'clock Tuesday night, Oct 7, 1902, from typhoid pneumonia. The funeral will be held Thursday at 10 a. m. and interment will take place in Mt Vernon cemetery, Rev Platt to conduct the services.

The deceased was aged 60 years, having been born in Ohio. He came to Oregon about 20 years ago, having lived near Thurston since that time. His wife died five years ago the 22nd day of last March. He leaves two sons, Charles, of Thurston, and John, of Seattle, and one daughter, Mrs Fred Gray, of Thurston.

Trent Lumber Company.

The Trent Lumber Company's mill is situated in the Mohawk valley two miles above the point where the railroad turns up Mill creek. To save expenses hauling the output of their mill by ordinary wagon conveyance they built a tramway down the valley to the railroad and established their yard at that point. All the lumber they manufacture goes down this tramway. Ross Matthews has been in charge of the lumber yard since the 1st of September.

COAL STRIKE HAPPENINGS

A Conference Between Platt, Quay, Odell and Mitchell.

Governor Crane, of Massachusetts, For Secretary of Treasury — French Coalminers' Strike.

By Scripps News Association. PARIS, Oct 9.—The strike among French coalminers is growing rapidly, new accessions to the ranks of the strikers being reported daily. There seems to be possibilities of great social disturbances throughout the country consequent on the agitation.

Secretary of Treasuryship.

By Scripps News Association. NEW YORK, Oct 9.—Secretary of the Treasury Shaw will retire from the cabinet as soon as the money market regains its normal condition. He will be succeeded by Governor Crane of Massachusetts.

Mitchell Stands Firm.

By Scripps News Association. WASHINGTON, Oct 9.—The reply of President Mitchell of the Association of Mine Workers to the appeal of President Roosevelt for a resumption of work among the coalminers, has been made public.

President Mitchell deprecates the unfairness of the coal operators; says he has no confidence in their doing justice to the miners through appeals to their sense of right and equity between employer and employee; that the miners' demands are only fair and reasonable and the wages asked are no more than enough to insure a decent living.

President Mitchell assures President Roosevelt that he appreciates his solicitude for a fair and speedy settlement of the strike, but insists that he would be recreant to the trust imposed on him should he even so much as advise the miners to return to work without a settlement of the questions involved.

Foreign Element Ugly.

By Scripps News Association. SCRANTON, Pa., Oct 9.—The striking foreign coalminers are in an ugly mood. They are in possession of Winchester rifles and are drilling nightly.

The authorities confiscated a thousand rounds of ammunition this morning. Grave trouble is impending. The community is strained almost to the breaking point, and cautious men are fearful that a deadly collision may occur between the coalminers and militia at any moment.

Strike Conference.

NEW YORK, Oct 9, 1 p. m.—An important conference as to the strike situation is now in progress in this city at the office of the senior United States senator from New York, Thomas C Platt. Those present are President Mitchell of the United Mine Workers, Governor Odell of New York, Senator Platt, Senator Quay of Pennsylvania. The conference met secretly.

News has reached the financial district of the city that something big is impending and in consequence a large crowd has gathered on the street in front of Platt's office. No inkling as to the scope of the discussion has been given out.

Militia Killed a Miner.

By Scripps News Association. SHERMAN, W Va, Oct 9.—John Durham, a coalminer was killed by militiamen last night. He was inside the picket lines and refused to stop when ordered. The strikers claimed the body. This is the first killing by the troops.

GOV. WHITEAKER'S WILL

The Total Value of Property Left Is \$26,375.17.

Bequeaths the Property to His Wife, Children and Grandchildren—Will Executed in 1897.

Daily Guard Oct 9. The will of the late Ex-Governor John Whiteaker was filed for probate today. It was executed December 3, 1897, in the presence of Joel Ware and E R Skipworth and was drawn up by Mr Skipworth who is the attorney for the estate. The appraisers, B D Paine, F W Osburn and J L Page, estimated the value of the estate to be \$26,375.17, of which \$6,000 is real property and the remainder personal property. The will in substance provides as follows:

First—Provides for a decent burial. Second—Funeral expenses and just debts to be paid.

Third—Bequeaths to his wife, Nancy J Whiteaker, all property of whatsoever value and kind for her use and benefit during her natural life and as her death all property remaining shall be the property of his children and grandchildren, divided as follows:

Fourth—To his daughters, Nancy Ann Whiteaker and Mary E Jarvis, \$2000 each.

Fifth—To his grand-children, John C Whiteaker, Lulu F Whiteaker, Junius W Jarvis, Opal A Jarvis, James Giltry Whiteaker and Charles Whiteaker \$500 each.

Sixth—To his son, James H Whiteaker, \$500, and a further bequest of \$1000 subject to certain restrictions and conditions. All notes or claims held against his son, James H Whiteaker, are hereby cancelled.

Seventh—To his son, Ben Whiteaker, \$2500, with certain conditions and provisions.

Eighth—All the residue of his property to his daughter, Nancy Ann Whiteaker and Mary E Jarvis.

Ninth—Directs that the executrix of his estate have full power and authority to sell, dispose of, convey and deed property of estate without an order or decree of any court and that she not be required to give bonds.

Tenth—His daughter, Nancy Ann Whiteaker, is nominated and appointed executrix.

Eleventh—All former wills are hereby revoked.

NEW SAW MILLS BEING BUILT

Small Concerns of 10,000 Feet Daily Capacity on Triangle Lake.

Wm W Post, of Blachley, is in our city. He has just proved up on one of the finest timber claims in the Lake Creek region. Fifteen years ago when everybody was ridding themselves of timber property he secured a claim on the shores of Triangle Lake. He had his pick of claims and staid with it. He has built a nice house there and lives comfortably.

He is now engaged in building a sawmill on his property. It will be a small concern but will be valuable to him. The capacity will be but 10,000 feet per day and he will team his lumber both ways, to Florence and over the mountain this way. His claim alone has between 12,000,000 and 15,000,000 feet of timber on it and there are dozens like it in the Lake Creek region.

Some time ago the GUARD printed an article containing a suggestion that a huge mill be built on the shores of Triangle Lake to handle the immense surrounding timber.

Mr Post informs us that a Washington syndicate is buying and offering to buy quietly all the adjacent timber. He has been offered \$5000 for his claim but would not take \$10,000 for it now.

In addition to his mill there are others preparing to build sawmills on the lake. A P Syster, the Wolf Bros and a Mr Johnson will all build mills this winter which will be ready for operation by January 1, 1903. The Wolf boys lately hauled up a 44 horse power boiler for their mill. The Horton brothers, who operate a 15,000-foot per-day mill west of Junction are talking of moving their mill to Triangle Lake. The change will be made this winter or next spring.

This will make five mills with a combined capacity of about 75,000 feet per day. Not very large, but small mills precede larger ones and all this means "something doing" in the magnificent Lake creek timber region.

Some Hops on Hand.

Daily Guard Oct. At Frank Dunn's warehouse there is a constant scene of activity, weighing, trucking and storing hops. He has 1500 bales in the warehouse now and more coming every day. This represents about \$72,000 at the market price of 20 cents per pound.

Mr. Dunn today took in the Wisconsin lot of hops, 99 bales, and the Brighton crop at 20 cents per pound.

JUNCTION CITY RURAL ROUTES

Approved by the Department at Washington, Service— Begins Dec 1st.

Guard Special Service. JUNCTION CITY, Ore, Oct 9.—The postmaster at this place has received notice from Washington, D C, that the three rural free mail routes recently petitioned for from this place have been approved and that the service is to commence on Dec 1st. The mail boxes will probably be delivered this week to the patrons of the routes. Route No 1 goes to Lancaster, thence west 8 miles to Horton's sawmill, thence south one mile to O P Mays schoolhouse, thence 3 miles east to town. Route 2 goes up the river road until it meets the Eugene route, thence crosses to the prairie road, thence west 2 miles to Bond's corner, thence north 2 miles, thence east 2 miles to the prairie road thence north to Junction City. Route No 3 goes out west to the Allen school house, thence south through Franklin to Richardson corner, thence east to the Mahon corner, thence north through Fern Ridge on the Hill road to Junction City. Names of carriers are not obtainable yet.

SAWMILL TO BE MOVED

Booth-Kelly Saginaw Property to Be Taken to Gettings Creek.

Will Float Sawed Lumber by Flume to the Railroad —Rights Secured Today.

As will be seen by the transactions among the courthouse items the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company has secured right-of-way for a flume which they will build from Gettings Creek to Saginaw.

Their purpose is to move their big Saginaw sawmill from its present location about three miles further south so as to command a better supply of timber. The supply for the mill in its present position has been about exhausted.

The new location will be on Gettings creek and will be as fine a mill as the company owns. The work of moving the machinery will be commenced soon. The flume will be built immediately. As the new location is off the railroad the flume method will be employed to chute the sawed lumber to the Saginaw yards where it will be stacked.

The yard there has been cleaned up of extra sticks, some of this being shipped to Eugene for wood.

This new location for the mill means the upbuilding of a new, rustling village on Gettings creek. It also places the company in direct touch with one of their large timber holdings in that part of the country.

Asylum Statistics.

Guard Special Service.

SALIM, Oct 9.—The statistical report of Superintendent J F Calbreath, of the state insane asylum, submitted at the monthly meeting of the board of that institution, Monday afternoon, shows that on September 30th there were 1256 patients receiving treatment there, this number being three less than on August 31st. During the month 35 patients were received and four escapes returned, while 49 were discharged. The expenses for supplies for the month was \$6208.97, while the salaries for the same period amounted to \$5498.61, or a total expense of \$11,707.58, or a per capita monthly expense of \$9.38.
