WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—President Roosevelt threw his crutches aside this morning, going about with the aid of a cane, though with a decided limp.

Cholera in Palestine.

JERUSALEM, Oct. 16.—Cholera has broken out in a very virulent form. There are about forty deaths daily from the disease. It is spreading rapidly.

Mitchell Makes Statement.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 16.—President Mitchell of the United Mineworkers gave this statement to the press this morning.

"I was unalterably opposed to acceptance of the proposal made by the operators for the reason that it restricted the President to the appointment of certain men as arbitrators and a line of action mapped out by the operators.

"Now that the terms of settlement have been modified I give full personal approval, and will immediately issue a call for a meeting of the district presidents to ratify my actions.

"I hope the people will be patient. We are working as rapidly as possible to bring the strike to an end."

Stocks Respond Lively.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Stocks are jumping in price this morning as a result of the settlement of the coal strike. There is a tremendous buying all along the line.

Atlantic Liner Ashore.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 16.—The Houston liner Heraclides went ashore last night during a tempest. One life was lost. The steamer and her cargo will prove total losses.

Woman Burned to Death.

ROSEBURG, Oct. 16.—Mrs. William Marshman was burned to death at Wardon yesterday. She was subject to spasms and while sitting before an open fireplace while the other members of the family were temporarily absent fell into the fire.

On their return to the house Mrs. Marshman was found in the fire, horribly burned. Life was extinct.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Oct. 16.—The people all through the coal region are wild with joy over the promised resumption of coal mining Monday. Women are going about crying for joy, even men shedding tears.

Good Words From a Corvallis Citizen Who Visited Eugene.

The following is part of a letter appearing in this week's Corvallis Gazette:

Editor Gazette:—It has been one and a half years since I have been in Eugene, and when I arrived here and took a survey of the young and beautiful city, I was surprised at the rapidity of its growth, the beauty and taste manifested in its improvement, and the extent of its business. The city is certainly making a very fast and permanent growth. I notice quite a number of new business structures here, that would not be a discredit to the great city of Portland. The merchants in all lines appear to be loaded up with heavy stocks, and their places are dressed up in a tasty and inviting manner, holding out to the public all the inducements they can for their patronage.

In passing through the court house, I notice that a large amount of reality is changing hands, and they report that a large number of Eastern people, mostly from Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota, are drifting into this country and investing in farms and town property. The real estate agents are reaping their harvest and rubbing their hands with great satisfaction as they count up the profits.

How local interest changes in a short distance. Here you can hear more talk about mines, timber and sawmills in one day than you would hear in Corvallis in three months. Quite a number of rustling men living here have interests in these branches; talk is a part of the stock in trade.
