If this demand is not acceded to twenty-five hundred more men will go out Monday, effectually tying up the freight handling and shipping business of the city.

Territorial Land Sale.

BRUSSELS, Oct. 18.—The Petit Bleu newspaper announces that Great Britain has purchased the territorial possessions of Portugal in South Africa. This sale necessitates a new treaty between Germany and Portugal providing for the relinquishment of German claims and possession. The Kaiser and the King of Portugal will meet in England to arrange details of the transfer at a future date to be decided upon.

[This transfer was practically made during the Boer war, when Great Britain was enabled to reach the Transvaal country through Delagoa Bay and across Portuguese territory. The country sold lies on the east coast of South Africa, extending from a point about seven hundred miles up the coast from the Cape of Good Hope six hundred miles farther up the coast, with an average width of two hundred miles. Delagoa Bay is a very valuable harbor, twentyby sixty miles, and is accessible to large vessels at all seasons of the year.—EDITOR GUARD.]

SHERIFF ARRESTS A JAIL BIRD

Another Escape from the Albany County Jail Landed in Eugene.

If any other prisoners escape from the Albany jail they will lead in any other direction but toward Eugene. Today the second escape was arrested on the street by Sheriff Withers.

The sheriff received telephonic communication from Albany yesterday stating that a prisoner by name of Schofield, alias Green, had slipped from the gentle care of Sheriff Huston while doing some chores for that worthy and had stolen a wheel and made out of town. This happened at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. The man made his way toward Eugene, and must have abandoned the wheel and boarded the overland train at some point north of here and secured a ride to Eugene.

At any rate Sheriff Withers with his eagle eye was on the street at about 11 o'clock this forenoon and said, "I want you," to a young man of perhaps 26 years. The arrested man recoiled but the arm of the law was too heavy and he was put in jail to await the arrival of Albany officers. He admits he is the man and is extremely sore over his capture. About \$10 in cash was taken from him at the courthouse.

He said, "Tell Huston I am here safe and well," as the iron bars closed in front of him.

The charge against him at Albany was obtaining money under false pretenses.

OVER ONE THOUS- AND PUPILS

Superintendent Bechdolt Talks About the Need of a New High School Building.

Superintendent Bechdolt states that the public schools have just passed the 1000 mark in enrollment. The Catholic school has something like 160 pupils, making 1150 school children enrolled for the present year in the public schools. The end of five weeks of school, he says, finds all interest in work and doing well. The crowded rooms have been relieved.

In talking with a GUARD reporter today, Mr Bechdolt was very earnest in his desire that the community about here recognize the value of a new High School building. He said that with proper accommodations the enrollment in the High School would be 450 as easily as it is 250. Families would move into Eugene to reside for a number of years to let their children complete High School and University courses. This would bring ample return for any tax levy needed to erect the building. "It is a crying need," said Mr Bechdolt, "but the community does not want to recognize it. We need the building this minute."

THE FOOT- BALL GAME

U O and Albany Played Poor Ball This Afternoon

Game Was a Disappointment to Eugene Enthusiasts— A Big Score Expected But None Made.

The game this afternoon between Albany College and the 'Varsity was of more interest from the standpoint of finding the value of individual men on the 'Varsity eleven than from the contest alone. There were twenty men played on the U O team all together, Coach Dolph and Captain Watts changing the men frequently to find their value. The showing was not satisfactory but the first team will be picked from the bunch to go up against Whitman next week.

A study of the weights of varsity men will be quite interesting. Of the twenty men who were played today the average weight for the positions is as follows:

Center 186; guard 172; tackle 168; end 144; quarter 142; half back 155; full back 152. The average of the total is 160 pounds. This is not an extra heavy team. The eleven best men of the team, however, average 163 pounds. The star line men, McKinney, Kerron, Frizzell, Thayer and Watts average 178 pounds—a wall that proved easy for Albany. The ends bring down the average as among the six candidates the average is only 144. One of the best ends, Chandler, weighs but 138 pounds. The half backs could well carry 10 pounds apiece but 155 is a fast weight. Tenpleton at full back pushes down 160 pounds and the quarter back position only boasts of 142 pounds for an average.

The Albany boys arrived on the afternoon train. They are a lighter team than U O about 10 pounds to the man but put up a gritty game. They were taken immediately to the gymnasium at the University and were soon in battle array for the conflict. The first half opened a little after three o'clock with lively playing on both sides. The field was in superb condition for a beautiful contest and the boys made use of it to their best ability.

FIRST HALF.

Neither side scored in the first half. U O seemed slow, while Albany played a good game. The ball remained near the center of the field during the half. Score—U O 0; Albany 0.

SECOND HALF.

U O 0; Albany 0. The final result was 0 to 0. Albany is frantic with delight. Eugene put up a very poor game. No team work, no interference, little head work and small ambition seemed to put the boys out of business.
