The ocean-liners are not leaving New York on time in all instances these days. The sailing of two of them were delayed several hours each Saturday on account of waiting for coal.

General Chaffee is the latest prohibitionist. He has issued an order prohibiting the importation of liquor into Corregidor Island in the Philippines. With the military in control there will be no "back-door" evasions. The natives and soldiers will go dry except for home manufacture.

In the last twelve years the number of workers in the anthracite coal mines has increased from 128,000 in 1890 to 145,308 in 1901, or over 15 per cent. During the same period the number of men in the bituminous mines has increased from 192,304 to 304,235, or a little over 77 per cent.

Why will courts of appeal give convicted or sentenced men their liberty under bonds, pending appeal? Here comes a case from Kansas where a man convicted of murder with a twenty-year sentence was given temporary release on \$7500 bonds. Now he cannot be found. No one may blame the criminal. Self-preservation is the first law of nature. The censure belongs to the easy-going judge.

Another "semi-centennial" is on hand. The Masonic grand lodge of Pennsylvania will celebrate the making of George Washington a Mason, that event having occurred at Fredericksburg, Virginia, November 4, 1752. The last President is expected to be present and deliver an address commemorative of the man who was "First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his fellow-citizens."

That terrible cholera! The American consul at Cairo cables this government that during the week October 12th to 18th, inclusive, there were 705 cases of cholera in that city and—think of it—636 deaths. Only one out of ten survived. And the survivors, likely will be little better than dead for months, perhaps for life.

Portland police officers got very close to Chinese gamblers the other night. They got \$100.75 which the Chinamen could not care for in their haste to escape. This was not the first hundred dollars the police got from the Chinamen. No one, not even the police, know how many hundreds and thousands of dollars have been slipped into officials hands that nothing might be seen.

The Vatican should get a schoolmaster for one of its subordinates. Archbishop Chapelle just returned to Rome from the Philippines. He complains that the Americans set their interests in politics and personal aims above the advancement of church and religion. It looks as if that ecclesiastic is ignorant of the fact that the people of this country went out of the church and state partnership business July 4th, 1776. In this country the church is no exception to the rule that it is a free field for honest endeavor.

Norway people will go hungry—at least they will if dependent on pickled cabbage meat. The horse-pickling factory down the river from Portland burst down Saturday night. Nearly all the product went to Norway.

SUMMER FANCY WORK

Of course every woman wants a bit of fancy work to take away with her in the summer. It may be on her lap idle half the time, but it serves as an excuse for sitting on the piazza and joining the circle of gossipers.

Embroidery has ceased to be impractical. This year many of the newest specimens of fancy work are to be used on dresses or shirt waists. So much embroidery is now being utilized on fashionable costumes and it costs so much less than it used to.

The clever girl with a small income is learning to do these little things for herself. For example, take the embroidered medallions with a lace border. Pale tinted mousseline de sole is cut out in an odd shape and beaded in the center of a design for renaissance lace; then the lace is made all around this and joined daintily to it. The center of the mousseline disk is sometimes ornamented with a tiny embroidered conventional figure or flower done in white or colored silk. Two or three of these medallions make a handsome trimming for a silk or chiffon waist. They are not much trouble to make, but cost a pretty penny if bought in the shops.

Then there are the new colored linen shirt waist sets. These comprise a dainty turnover collar, two cuffs and a long strip for the front of the waist. The set in the illustration is for a matching costume. The material is blue linen, embroidered in heavy white silk. The edges are scalloped with a heavy buttonhole edge.

This year collars of colored linen are considered smarter than those of lace. These collars come already stamped on pink, pale blue, green and ecru linen, and all one has to do is work out the design. They only cost from 10 to 15 cents apiece. The stitches used are buttonhole for the edges and satin and outline stitch for the figures. French knots are very dainty and popular just now. Sometimes the whole pattern is made of these.

To make a French knot the needle is brought up through the cloth, then the thread is wound three times around it, and lastly the point of the needle is passed through directly under the place where it first came up. The thread meanwhile must be held down gently but firmly with the other hand.

Satin stitch is used to work in the more solid parts of a design. It is a straight, simple stitch brought across from side to side of the figure so that it gives a smooth satiny surface, whence its name.

Renaissance lace is now being made into charming hair ornaments. The latterly and the coronation are the latest ones. The butterfly is made with a linen braid having a fancy edge. When the butterfly is completed, it is wired with fine silk hat wire. Sometimes the lace is sewed with tiny spangles.

The coronation hair ornament consists of three upright pieces simulating plumes and four more clustered at the base to form a rosette. These pieces are all wired.

Irish crocheted lace is taking the place of the smoother renaissance, and charming effects may be contrived by combining this lace with heavy embroidery in white silk. The Marie Antoinette lace is supposed to be really the latest thing. It is a fanciful application of ecru satin braid on yellow net. This makes charming blouse waists, toilet table scarfs and lace panels for windows.

Fichus and Fancy Collars.

Boss naturally are for street wear, but fashion has graciously provided for home wear the loveliest of fichus and fancy collars to take their places. One style has a scarf two yards long and ten inches wide, the whole made of white net, and the ends are appliqued with Irish point. This is brought around the neck twice and tied in a bow in front. Another has a flat sailor collar of black net, with white applique on it, and at the joining there is a white net scarf two yards long tied in one bow, the ends reaching the knees, where they finish with a ruffle of the net, with a lace ruffle at the bottom of this. Still another is a ten inch scarf of dotted white net, with narrow Valenciennes at each edge and crossing the ends several times. This is still longer than the others and goes twice around the neck and ties, the ends falling below the knees.

The Law Enforcement League of Portland has bumped up against the several city and state peace officials in the effort to compel Sunday closing of Portland saloons, with little satisfaction. 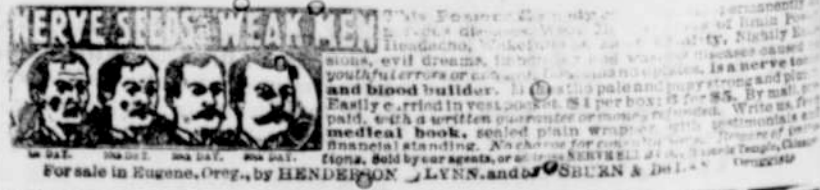
