SAME FELLOW WHO HELD UP S. P. TRAIN

**Makes a Daring Holdup of a
N. P. Train in Mon-
tana.**

Yesterday's GUARD contained a brief telegraphic report of a holdup on the Northern Pacific railroad near Butte, Montana, yesterday morning. The train was the North Coast Limited. The express and mail cars were rifled, with little success, but the passengers were not molested. The holdup was by a lone man, who shot and killed Engineer O'Neill, who grappled with the robber and tried to overpower him.

The robber talked freely with the train crew while he was at work at his nefarious business. Among other things he said: "If anybody wants to know who I am, tell 'em I'm the same fellow who held up the Southern Pacific south of Portland last fall."

This is the holdup which occurred just south of Eugene a little over a year ago. Bloodhounds are in pursuit and it is believed the robber will be captured.

From reports of the affair, the work was done just in such a manner as the holdup near here a year ago, and no doubt it is the same fellow.

RAILROAD CON- TRACTOR HERE

E T Johnson, a prominent railroad contractor of Portland, was in the city Thursday and Friday. While here he gathered information concerning the proposed railroad connection between Eugene and the Siuslaw valley, talk of which is now being revived. The GUARD discussed the question at length a few months ago. He had noticed the discussion and, on the lookout for new developments, he came to Eugene.

Mr Johnson was very much impressed with the route of Lane county, saying there was not a richer county in the state. He says there is no doubt as to the feasibility of the proposed road as there is immense wealth along the route to make it pay.

He left for Portland yesterday and will look into the government record of harbors and find the standing of Siuslaw Bay.

HAS REACHED MILLION MARK

**Business of First National

**Lamberty, the Baker, Sent Vile
Letters to His Divorced
Wife.**

For several years past John Lamberty, the German baker, who has conducted a bakery and restaurant in different parts of town, and at present located just south of J U Green's grocery store on Willamette street, has been more or less before the public eye on account of domestic troubles, he and his wife, Louisa Lamberty, never seeming to agree. About a year ago Mrs Lamberty obtained a divorce from her husband on the ground of cruel and inhuman treatment.

Ever since then Lamberty has annoyed her by calling at her small bakery at West Seventh and Olive streets at frequent intervals and abusing her, heaping all kinds of vile epithets upon her and threatening to do her harm. For some time he has been writing vile and obscene letters to her, sending them by one of their little boys, being wise enough not to send them through the mail. This sort of persecution becoming unbearable, Mrs Lamberty this morning swore out a warrant for his arrest. Constable Smith made the arrest and Lamberty was given a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace C A Wintermeier this afternoon. He was bound over Saturday evening to answer the charge before the circuit court.

The penalty for Lamberty's offense is from one to three years in the penitentiary.

IMPORTANT HOP DECISION

**Judge Burnett, Third District
Decides Hop Contracts Not
Legal.**

HALEM, Oct. 25.—In a decision today in a case where a hopgrower refused to surrender his crop of hops to a buyer under a contract money advances having been made during the seasons of cultivation and picking, Circuit Judge Burnett, of this district, held that such contracts are void and cannot be enforced.

[This decision comes too late to benefit Lane county and most other valley growers who were so unfortunate as to contract their hops at twelve cents and thereabouts, while now they are worth in the neighborhood of twenty-five cents, as buyers having contracts anticipated litigation on account of the wide difference between the contract and market prices and took possession at the first possible moment, in some instances in the bins before the hops were baled.—EDITOR GUARD.]

NEW SCALE OF WAGES ADOPTED

**Grants Pass Federated Trades
Union Gets in Its
Work.**

GRANTS PASS, Oct. 24.—The Grants Pass Federated Trades has adopted a scale of wages which is to govern employers and employees in this city and Josephine county after Nov 1. The scale as adopted is as follows:

Common laborers, per day, \$2 to \$2.25; blacksmiths, per day, \$2.50 to \$3; blacksmith helpers, per day, \$2.25; engineers, stationary, per day, \$3; firemen, stationary, per day, \$2.50; lathe men, per day, \$3.50; brick handlers, \$2.50; brick layers, nine hour day, \$5; plasterers, nine hour day, \$5; mortar men, hod-carriers, per day, \$3; painters, per day, \$3; teamsters, two horse, \$4; teamsters, one horse, per day, \$3; graders, lumbermen, per day, \$2.30; planers, surface, per day, \$2.50; planer, four sided, per day, \$2.75; stick-ermes, per day, \$2.75; outfitman, \$2.25; scrap cutoff, \$1.75; resaw men, \$2.25; lathers, per 1000, \$3; farm laborers \$1.25 with board, \$1.75 without board.

In all cases Sunday and overtime work to be paid at the rate of time of one and one-half.
