BOSTON SENSATION

Heavy Vote Cast in California—
Examiner Came Out for
Republican Governor
This Morning.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 4.—The state election is progressing very quietly here today, although there is great interest. A very heavy vote is being cast.

The saloons are closed, under instructions to the police to arrest on slightest infraction of the law.

A policeman is present at every voting precinct to preserve order and arrest possible illegal voters.

The Examiner, Democratic, came out this morning in favor of Dr. Pardee, the Republican candidate for governor, and against its party nominee, Frank K. Lane. The Examiner has been lukewarm and gave Lane little if any substantial support, and thoughts eleven-hour advocacy of Pardee has caused a sensation, it is not thought any material change will result therefrom.

A Harvard Graduate Arrested.

BOSTON, Nov. 4.—Alan C. Mason, a prominent clubman of this city, also a graduate of Harvard University, was arrested today and charged in the police court with being "Jack the Sluggo."

For months the city has been terrorized by murderous assaults on lone pedestrians, the guilty party seemingly contriving to select his safety through selecting spots where there would be no interference, or from which he could easily get away and escape pursuit.

Nine murderous attacks on men and the murder of two women are laid to his charge. He invariably beat the victim on the head with a piece of gas pipe.

The arrest has caused a great sensation.

British Aid for Boers.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The British parliament today passed a bill appropriating eight million pounds, [\$35,720,000] to aid the Boers in re-establishing their homes. The bill provides for a liberal system of advances on long term payments with light interest charges.

It is thought this measure will go far towards reconciling the Boer people to British rule.

The miners demand an eight hour day with a twenty per cent increase in wages, in order to avoid forcing immature children to work in the mines.

THREE NEW COMPANIES FORMED

Lumbering and Shingle Concerns
File Articles of Incorporation.

Monday articles of incorporation of the Drain Lumber Co., the Roseburg Lumber Co., and the Pacific Cedar and Shingle Co. filed articles of incorporation with County Clerk E. U. Lee, the same articles having been previously filed with Secretary of State F. I. Dunbar.

The incorporators of each of these companies are Geo. Kerr, W. C. Johnson, and F. M. Rhy, all substantial citizens of Cottage Grove, and the principal office and place of business is given as Cottage Grove. The capital stock of each company is \$25,000, divided into 250 shares of \$100 each.

The objects of each company, as given in the articles of incorporation are identical, to manufacture, sell, buy and deal in all kinds of building material; to have power to buy land; to lease, operate and build plants for the manufacture of all kinds of building material; to erect wharves, etc.; to own and operate steamboats, barges, wharves, boarding houses, hotels; to engage in the general merchandise business, etc.

It is understood that this company, or companies, will engage in the lumber and shingle business on quite an extensive scale in Lane and Douglas counties, no doubt to erect mills at Roseburg, Drain and other points. It is also said their operations will extend to the coast, probably to Coos Bay or Gardiner and along the line of the proposed Great Central railway.
