NEW YORK PASTORS DISCUSSED POLITICS.

Politics was discussed in many pulpits in New York City last Sunday, while lessons were drawn from the conflict then being waged. Rev. Robert Paddock in an address before the Y M C A, said:

It is strange that ministers do not talk politics. It is a pathetic condition of society and Christianity if preachers fail to take their part in the discussion of political subjects. These signals had no sooner been sent and received than it occurred to both their imperial majesties that possibly England and France might not be pleased to find themselves clean swept from all the seas, both east and west. Hence the censored signals.

A GREAT ENTERPRISE

Oregon Land & Livestock Co. File Articles of Incorporation.

Booth-Kelly People and Others Will Operate on Military Road Grant in Eastern Oregon.

The Oregon Land and Livestock Co filed articles of incorporation with County Clerk Lee this morning. The names of R A Booth, John F Kelly and Geo H Kelly are given as incorporators. The principal office and place of business is Eugene and the capital stock is \$1,000,000, divided into shares of \$100 each.

The objects of the corporation as given in the articles are in substance as follows: To raise, keep, produce and market livestock, consisting of cattle, sheep, goats, hogs, horses, etc; to construct and maintain buildings, roads and other necessary improvements; to reclaim and irrigate arid lands; to acquire water rights, build ditches, flumes, reservoirs, etc, on lands of the Military Wagon Road grant and on other lands that the corporation may lease or purchase.

R A Booth was asked by a GUARD reporter today concerning this new company. He stated that the company was formed for the purpose of handling all that part of the Military wagon road of the east line of the forest reserve—to be explicit, from the Des Chutes to the Idaho line. When the grant was acquired recently this indicates secured that portion of it through R A Booth, trustee, while the Booth-Kelly Co secured the western end, on which most of the timber is located.

Besides Messrs Booth, J F and Geo H Kelly, the following gentlemen are stockholders in the new company: F H Back, A J Hechtman, J A Chanler and Herbert Felsbacher, all of San Francisco; Frank Miller, president of the National bank of D O Mills & Co, of Sacramento; Adolph Heibron, director of the California State Bank of Sacramento; H A Heibron, a wholesale hardware merchant of Sacramento and J H Booth of Roseburg.

Mr Booth stated that the organization of the company will be completed next week, and he left this afternoon for Grants Pass to look after matters connected with the business.

The plans of the company have not yet been definitely outlined, but suffice it to say they will be on a large scale, as there is opportunity for an immense business.

Having the immense acreage of the Military grant, besides other lands purchased, at its command, the company will probably be the heaviest operator of its kind on the coast. The country through which the grant runs is the finest in the world for grazing, and other lands which will be secured, when irrigated, will produce some of the finest crops that grow.

Eugene being the head office of this immense concern, will reap a share of the benefits of its operations.

The Spencer farm of 40 acres, located six miles north of Eugene on the river road, was sold today by its owner, Jeff D Spencer, to Edward Quinn and Charles Severson, late of Minnesota. The price paid was thirty dollars an acre, \$12,000. C S Farrow & Co engineered the deal.

PORTLAND WILL ENTERTAIN.

Railroads Make Low Rates on Occasion of Oregon Irrigation Association Convention.

The Oregon Irrigation Association convention of over 400 delegates will assemble in Portland Tuesday and Wednesday, November 18 and 19; also the Oregon Bar Association meets there on the same days, on which occasions the railroads have made reduced rates, tickets good for six days on all lines from points in Oregon to Portland.

Portland proposes to entertain all visitors over the railroads on the occasion with a ball or concert, free theatre, with visits to wheat ships, public library, Oregon Historical Society rooms, the \$500,000 City Hall and the \$1,000,000 Federal custom house, a steamboat ride on the Willamette and Columbia rivers, and in other ways as will best show Portland's enterprise, hospitality and desire to become better acquainted with the people of the whole state and they with it.

It is expected several thousand people from all over Oregon will take advantage of the cheap excursion rates announced by the O R & N, Southern Pacific and Northern Pacific to visit Portland irrigation week, and it is the intention of the business men of Portland to give these a royal welcome and free entertainment regardless of whether they come as regularly appointed delegates or simply as visitors.
