#### Women Scrambled and Fought for Admission.

COVINGTON, Va., Nov. 1.—Willie McClain, aged thirteen years, lies dead shot by his mother on Hallowe'en.

The boy scared his mother very badly, when the frightened woman fired the fatal shot.

#### The Molineux Trial.

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Women fought madly to the great damage and disarrangements of hats and dresses this morning, to secure seats in the courtroom where Roland B. Molineux is being tried for the murder of Mrs. Katherine J. Adams by a poison package sent the woman through the mails.

The defense had handwriting experts on the witness stand, their opinion being that Molineux did not write the incriminating letters, nor the address on the poison package.

Molineux took the proceedings coolly, showing no indication of any unusual mental strain or excitement. The acquittal of the prisoner seems likely, as his appearance on the witness stand was in his favor.

## HOP CULTIVATION.

George A. Dorris tells How to Get the Best Results.

Now that the hop crop is fully warehoused and the growers have either gathered in the profits or are waiting for still higher prices, it is of interest to the people who are engaged in growing hops to give the method of cultivation employed by one of the most successful growers in the county.

In a recent conversation with Geo. A. Dorris, who has a ten-acre hopyard in the bottom up the river from Springfield, he gave his ideas and method of working hops. Mr. Dorris is a firm believer in making a hopyard conform to the English name thereof, a "hop-garden." To start with he grubbs in March—does not believe in winter grubbing, as the cutting of the crown leaves the injured part to freeze and rot for two or three months before the time of growth when the root can repair the damages.

He is a believer in thorough work; would not have a man who grubs more than two hundred hills a day, where not a few growers expect a man to go over six or eight hundred a day. Then when training time comes he does not depend on surface indications as to the proper vines to train. He uncovers the crown-head and takes thrifty shoots from well down the crown. By this precaution the vines are not liable to be torn away by wind or jerk as they are when grown from the top edge of the crown. Besides are not so liable to suffer from heat or drought, being well covered with soil. He covers the grubbed crown with two or three inches of fine soil. Then he cultivates till late in July, when many growers stop by the first of the month.

Mr. Dorris says the cost of his careful method will not exceed that of the slovenly, slipshod grower in any greater sum than ten dollars an acre. Any way, the extra cost of grubbing and cultivation is a trifle when the grower considers his investment in land, poles or post and wire and hop house.

## LEWIS STILL-

### WELL CORYELL.

Old Pioneer 82 Years Old One of the First White Persons in Lane County.

Among the earliest pioneers of Lane county the name of Lewis Stillwell Coryell may be mentioned. When he arrived at what is now the site of Eugene on Oct. 25, 1847, the only white persons in Lane county, aside from the company with which he came were Eugene F. Skinner, Elijah Bristow and William Dodson.

Mr. Coryell was born in Hunterdon county, N. J., Sept. 19, 1820. Thus it may be seen that he has a good part of his 83d year. Physically and mentally he seems good for a score of years. On his father's side he descends from Denmark, and on his mother's side from Germany and Scotland. The parents of both ancestors came to America before the Revolution, and fought through that great struggle for human rights on the side of Liberty.

The first work Mr. Coryell did after arriving here, aside from building his own cabin just south of this city at Coryell's Point and assisting others of the 1844 immigration in erecting their cabins, was to split one thousand rails for Eugene Skinner for one hundred pounds of flour. Wheat at that time was worth \$1 per bushel, and the nearest point at which flour could be obtained was O'Neill's mill, on the River, near the present city of Dallas in Polk county. Sugar could not be had, but there was plenty of venison. Mr. Coryell was an excellent shot and killed many deer, and the early settlers for miles around were supplied with meat without cost. He killed a number of grizzly bears in this vicinity. The first one was back in the hills near Spencer's Butte, the next was near the Long Tom, and two at the foot of Mt. Pisgah, near Pleasant Hill. To such men the present and all future generations owe a debt which can never be repaid, and no effort should be spared to perpetuate their memories. They came here to improve their own condition, it is true; but in doing so they secured for the United States a splendid commonwealth—one of the best in the union of States.

## NEW FIRE PROTECTION LAWS

Hon. R. A. Booth Chairman of Committee to Draft Law.

Better Protection Contemplated for Oregon Timber Interests—To Limit Fires to Certain Dates.

Last Tuesday in Portland there was a session of the committee on the part of the state who had gathered to discuss the new laws of Oregon and to see if the same could not be improved.

At this meeting, which was unofficial in its character, it was decided to select a committee of representative timber men from over the state to formulate a law covering the proposed legislation and repealing present laws, to be presented at the next session of the legislature.

W. W. Curtis, chairman, has appointed Hon. R. A. Booth chairman of the committee with Geo. H. Andrews, S. Benson, W. B. Ayer and Geo. M. Cornwell as colleagues, to draft the proposed law.

When seen this morning by a GUARD reporter, Mr. Booth spoke as follows:

"I have accepted the appointment on the committee to draft a new law protecting timber interests over the state. The contemplated legislation is quite necessary and at the next session the law upon which the committee is to report by the 25th of December will be presented."

"The main difficulty to be encountered is to secure the views of all interested parties in order to formulate a law which will accommodate the largest portion of the people. You see there are different interests at stake. The eastern timber buyer who is speculating wants laws prohibiting all fires, slashing included. The operating mill men of the state want the privilege of firing certain portions of their lands and the hill ranchers and homesteaders want permission to burn slashing at all times."

"The best way, it seems to me, is to pass a law allowing slashing to be burnt only between certain dates with the condition that the dates in any locality may be changed by the county court."

Mr. Booth is enthusiastic for the welfare of Lane county, "soon to be the center of the lumber world," as he expressed it, and wants to know the wishes of all interested parties as to the proposed legislation. He suggested that a call be issued for a convention of Lane county claim holders, homesteaders and mill men to discuss the issue.

The GUARD will be glad to hear from any one regarding the matter.

## LAND OFFICE SENSATIONS

Looked Upon By Some as a Scheme to Grab the Best Timber.

ALBANY, Nov. 1.—The action of the secretary of the interior with regard to filings on timber lands is looked upon by local timber men here as a scheme to "gobble" the best timber claims with scrip. The action stops all filings on timber claims until the pending investigation is settled. The investigation might be held up for six months or, at any rate, long enough for men who hold scrip to lay it on the best claims and in this way scoop the individual claimtakers of their best interests.

This alleged sentiment may also prove to have been installed with a view to diverting attention from the pending investigation concerning rumored timber frauds. Agents of the government are soon expected here and a good deal of interest is taken in the coming inquiry.

Capt. S. B. Ormsby, superintendent of the forest rangers for the protection of Oregon timber which is in the government reserve, is in Albany taking evidence on government land claims.
