THE SOLID SOUTH AND THE WHEREFORE.

The Oregonian has no just cause for complaint because the South stands solidly Democratic. The same reason that throws it on that side of the political fence—the negro—largely and potentially assists in electing Republican presidents and making the eastern states Republican. The negro vote gave New York a Republican governor last week, and turned the scale in a sufficient number of close districts to give a Republican majority in the lower branch of congress. The South had an experience with negro rule—a terribly costly one. Her white men cannot be blamed for not allowing a repetition of the negro and "carpet-bag" government that added woeful burdens on their country, already devastated by four years of terrible warfare.

Politicians and impracticable so-called philanthropists may object to the practical elimination of the negro vote as a controlling influence in the Southern states, but to no avail. Self preservation is the first law of nature. And no thoughtful, unprejudiced Northern man, apart from politics, will say that brute force instead of brains should rule the South.

Governor Geer takes six closely typewritten pages to tell why he declines to call a special session of the legislature to kill himself as a senatorial possibility. The Governor does not propose to carry any extra weight if he can help it in his race for the senate. The Republican electors voted for him as their choice for United States senator at the same time the members elect were voted for. He does not propose to give those members the least possible excuse to fail to register the choice made by the last Republican state convention and the people at the polls.

After four years of imprisonment, two trials, one a verdict of "guilty" the other a disagreement, a sentence of hanging, then another trial lasting nearly a month, Roland Molineux was acquitted of the murder charge yesterday afternoon the jury having been out only twenty-five minutes. If this jury is right the other juries were wrong. It is such results that tend to discredit trial by jury. Still it is the best scheme, not only for the community but for the protection of the individual, that has been devised.

President Baer of the Pennsylvania coal railroads says his company "has no disagreement with any of its employees about the weighing of coal, the quantity being usually determined by measurement." He is a very ingenious gentleman. By a system of measurement introduced by the mine operators the miners have the privilege of digging about three thousand pounds of coal for a ton's pay. Disagreement about weighing? Certainly not! It is the measurement that robs the miner.

Mrs Bradbury of California will sue her millionaire husband, from whom she has been separated four years, for divorce. Curious people are speculating about the nature of the complaint she will make to the court, seeing that the separation was brought about through her elopement with a sprig of the English aristocracy. How can she claim it was her husband's fault?

President Roosevelt says he is out for a hunt and doesn't want to be bothered with business. That all depends on the kind of business and the man that talks it to him. You may be sure that any talk as to his prospects for bagging some very big game—the presidency in 1904—will be eagerly listened to coming from the right source.

Too many warships for available men and officers is causing the naval authorities of this country no little concern just now. At the present rate of naval construction and graduation of officers there will be a shortage of over a thousand officers by July 1906.

It need not worry anyone out here in Oregon that New York's smart millionaire set of fashionable ladies wear hundred-dollar a pair evening slippers. The fashion will not become general, for obvious reasons.
