There is still some vacant land in this country—about 900,000,000 acres. This includes 368,000,000 acres in Alaska. Of course the vacant lands are mostly desert and mountainous.

That was a sudden ending of life up in the Alaska Treadwell mine a few days ago when a miner carrying a case of dynamite stubbed his toe and fell. Not a particle of the man or his clothing could be found. There was nothing but a large hole in the ground.

A big fire in a Chinese city the other day burned all around the Christian mission, which escaped unscathed. As a result many Chinese came to the mission and were baptized. The Chinaman, like some white folks, is quick to move when satisfied that his material interests may be promoted.

Circuit Judge Sears of Multnomah County has ruled that a judge can grant a divorce on the uncorroborated testimony of one witness. There is not a little perjury in divorce cases already, but this ruling makes it plain sailing for parties who are willing to be sworn free of marital bonds.

An interesting bit of news comes from Vienna, and consists of the information that there will shortly be published in that city a newspaper for nervous persons. In this newspaper great catastrophes and other events calculated to disturb nervous persons will be treated in a soothing way with due regard to the nerves of its readers.

Now that Molinoux is free from the charge of murder his wife will sue for divorce. Having staid by him till proven innocent she will claim her freedom in the South Dakota divorce courts. She says her reasons for divorce are surprising, but personal. The filing of her papers will be awaited with interest by the curious.

Experts in bird talk are comparatively rare, but the Smithsonian Institution in Washington contains one, Dr. Nelson R. Wood, who has made a study of the conversation of many kinds of feathered creatures. Dr. Wood believes that the best conversationalists among birds are found in chickens and turkeys, these bipeds exceeding in this accomplishment even the parrot and the crow.

It is said that the withdrawal of timber lands from further public entry is in the interest of irrigation—to protect the sources of the streams, especially in semi-arid localities like those of Eastern Oregon. We cannot believe that Western Oregon may ever lack timber. The astonishing replanting of forests by Nature's hand where burnt clean by forest fires in the Cascade and Coast Range mountains not many years ago, is convincing proof.

Several American refugees from the volcano-ridden district about Santa Maria volcano, Guatemala, just arrived at San Francisco, tell of the awful destruction wrought by the recent eruption. Their coffee plantation was thirty miles from the volcano, yet for three days they were in total darkness. The country for miles about is covered with volcanic debris from the seven feet. It was a fairly populous district and thousands of natives perished.

An unusual case is reported from The Dalles. Hugh Hagan, a young man of a pioneer family of that city, robbed a nickel-in-the-slot machine of nearly a hundred dollars in a garage store about a month ago. On indictment and trial in the circuit court Judge Bradshaw instructed the jury that as the money was confessedly deposited in a gambling device the jury must find that it was in possession of the reputed owner before they could convict. The jury failed to agree. The defense held that it was not unlawful to rob a gambling machine.
