Paris, Nov 26.—The funeral of Mrs Gore this afternoon, the American woman shot through the head and killed in the Russian Delkiewski's apartment Saturday, was made the occasion of a great popular demonstration by Americans.

While no high official or notable American was present, American residents of Paris and nearby cities and the tourists' contingent attended in such numbers as to make the funeral a notable occasion.
