HAS CHANGED FRONT.

"Before taking" office President Roosevelt was firm in the opinion that the trust situation could only be met by lessening tariff duties so the pressure of outside competition would hold such combinations in check. "After taking" office, with another term in view, he is willing that the trusts shall have about all the benefits excessive tariffs give them.

He affects fear of menacing our prosperity through new tariff legislation, yet obligingly shuts his eyes to the fact that prosperity is world-wide at the present time—that our producers have not for many years found such markets abroad for their grains, cotton, wool, hops, etc. as at present. That world-wide demand has brought us prosperity, not the robbing tariff that allows trust manufacturers to fitch the substance that has come to our producers through a combination of circumstances with which the tariff has as little to do as the fly on the rim of the coach wheel has in making it turn.

President Roosevelt knows better. As vice-president he had no political ambitions—could speak the plain unvarnished truth. As president he is bound to the trusts. He may not escape his bonds.

A LONG AND POPULAR FOREIGN SERVICE.

The impending departure for home of Henry White, the first secretary of the American embassy, will remove from English society the most popular American in London.

Mr White has penetrated into and is popular in exclusive circles of aristocratic society that William Waldorf Astor never has entered. The secretary is a big man, physically, and a good sportsman.

He plays golf like a Scotchman, and shoots and rides to hounds with the skill of a Yorkshire county magnate. He chums with the prime minister of England, and can summon to his country house for a week-end party a longer and more glittering array of titles than any American in England.

Mr White has served under all American ambassadors since James Russell Lowell, [1880], but despite his long residence in England he never lost any of his Americanism. Mrs White is lavish in her entertainments, which often rival in splendor those of the ambassador himself.

NATURE AT WORK.

Man plumes himself on his intellectual aristocracy among the members of the animal world, yet realizes his insignificance when face to face with the awful and sublime workings of nature. A steamer passenger who passed up the coast off Santa Maria volcano gives this description of the surroundings:

As far as the eye can reach from Champerico there is nothing to be seen but ashes and pumice stone. We sailed for miles through a sea of ashes. From the sea to Santa Maria the country looked as if visited by a snow-storm, and the mountain itself looked like a huge boiling caldera. At short intervals the volcano vomited smoke and ashes. At times this discharge would be carried up a short distance into the air, when it would spread out like an umbrella and fall to the earth, covering trees, bushes and hills with a white shroud. At other times the discharge would seem to leap high into the air as if propelled by some gigantic force.

Whether Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma shall be admitted as states seems to be merely a question of politics as viewed by our narrow-minded congressmen. It should not be considered a matter of politics at all, but one of right. Whenever they are entitled to be admitted as states they should be given statehood regardless of what the political complexion of the territory is.
