# THE INDIAN WAR PENSIONS

Has His Difficulties, But Commissioner Promises Prompt Action.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15. - Sepator Mitchell recently called the attention of Pension Commissioner Ware to s letter received from Judge J C rullerton, of Rosebury, stating that some 50 Indian War veterans in his immediate neighborhood had applied for pensions under the Indian War veteran act of list session; that many of them are poor, and all are in need of the little sum that will come to them each quar-He stated that if the censions were not allowed soon many of the veterans will not be there to receive them. He therefore urges the early adjudication of all claims filed under that act. In reply to this statement Commissioner Ware tays:

There will be no unnecessary delay n the part of this bureau in adjudicatthis does of cisims. I fully realize that these claimants are advanced in so, and also appreciate what Judge Fullerton says regarding their flusneis! condition. It may be of interest to on to know that up to date \$054 laims of this character bave been filed. No little amount of trouble and delay is experienced in getting the military service of these distants, by remeon of their failure to give in their techrations, the special information Decembery to enalle tale office to corretir desermine their service. Phere nime will be given all the attention which they require, and me expeditionely as the work to the bureau will permit."
