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TERRIBLE MURDER AND SUICIDE

George Carter in a Jealous Frenzy Shoots His Wife, then Turns the Pistol on Himself Christmas Afternoon.

GEO CARTER ON CHRISTMAS AFTERNOON SHOT AND KILLED HIS WIFE AND COMMITTED SUICIDE. She died instantly and the murderer died half an hour after the shooting which occurred at 1:35.

The couple lived across the street from the U O gymnasium.

They had been married twelve years and had three children.

The motive for the crime is said to have been JEALOUSY.

Both shots were fired into the right temples.

He was aged 36 and she 25.

H R Ross, who lives next door, saw Carter follow his wife into the front yard, struggle with her and shoot her in the temple, then turn the gun upon himself and fire another fatal shot.

GYMNASIUM PROJECT REVIVED.

FAIRMOUNT. EUGENE

Fairmount's Assessment \$45,000--Eugene's \$1,500,000.

Union is Best for Both--The Committee Has Compiled Data to Present at Mass Meeting.

In compiling data to be used in arguing the extension of the city limits of Eugene to include Fairmount, M Seward informs us that Assessor Burton has made a careful summary of the assessable property in Fairmount as found on the county assessment roll. The figures are rather surprising, showing a valuation of \$45,000.

The GUARD on this showing cannot but favor making Fairmount a part of Eugene. It is urged that if taken in Eugene would be taxed for Fairmount light, street improvements and police protection. While this is true we believe the taxes collected from the suburb would pay at least the greater portion of the added city expenses. Then, too, under city protection Fairmount could not but make more rapid growth. The location near the University and Patterson school makes it desirable property for people who write to come here for school advantages, at the same time preferring to keep their children away from the business portion of the town. At present there is no way to compel grading of streets or construction of sidewalks. Once part of Eugene, with their improvements made, the suburb would secure home-builders who could not be induced under any consideration to make homes there under present conditions.

Then for taxes. Eugene has an assessment of \$1,500,000 in round numbers. Fairmount \$45,000. Fairmount would pay a considerable part of the expenses that could be taxed up to it, and would probably soon pay its due proportion. And the present taxpayers of Eugene would not be appreciably hurt by the temporary increase of expenses. And in helping to build Fairmount up Eugene will be helping itself. It is for the best interests of both places.
