RICH BOHEMIA STRIKE

Big 26-Foot Ore Body Found at the Le Roy.

Said to Be One of the Richest Ever Made in Oregon—Eugene People Own Stock in the Mine.

Daily Guard, Dec. 31.
Dr. L. W. Brown, who was one of the thirty-five Eugene Odd Fellows who went up to Cottage Grove yesterday to institute a new I. O. O. F. encampment at that place last night, informed a GUARD reporter today that a report by telephone came down to Cottage Grove from the Bohemia mines Monday night that an immensely rich body of ore had just been uncovered in the Le Roy mine, in which several Eugene men are large stockholders.

Dr. Brown said that the body of ore is 26 feet wide, is solid galena and the foot wall has not yet been struck. The news of the strike caused great excitement in Cottage Grove and will cause a big boom for the Bohemia district.

It is said that nothing like it has heretofore been found in the district and seldom in the state.

If such a strike were made in Alaska or Colorado thousands and tens of thousands of men would at once be rushing pell-mell into the district.

The men in Eugene who own stock in the mine are feeling jubilant over the big find.

OREGON STATEHOOD.

Six Surviving Members of Constitutional Convention—Lane's Representatives all Dead.

Sunday's Oregonian had a very interesting remiscient article on the Oregon constitutional convention from the pen of John H. McBride, of Astoria, one of the few survivors of the men who so well laid the foundation for our state.

There are few of the sixty men who composed that convention which prepared Oregon for statehood left—and the weight of years are upon those. The surviving members number but seven and are: Henry B. Nichols, representing Benton county; William H. Packwood, Curry; George H. Williams, (present mayor of Portland), and Lafayette Grover, Marion; Reuben P. Bole, Polk; R. V. Short and John R. McBride, Yamhill.

Lane county was represented by six delegates, the same as Linn, being excluded only by Marion with seven. They were Enoch Hault, W. W. Bristol, Jesse Cox, A. J. Campbell, (father of the GUARD publishers), Paul Bratton and Isaac R. Moore. All have passed to that other shore, most of them not a few years ago.

The members of that convention were elected in June, 1857, and met in Salem the following August. Judge Deady, then of Douglas county, was president of the convention.
