ANDREW JACKSON.

Jackson Day! On January 8th, 1815, eighty-eight years ago, the American forces under General Andrew Jackson inflicted a crushing defeat on the British at New Orleans.

It made the iron-hearted general president, of whom it may be said that he went out of office more popular than when he entered. He left his party strong, perfectly organized on a platform of low expenditures and nothing for glory or display in any form, and low taxes. For years his name remained a spell to conjure the Democratic hosts. He was vigorous, brash, unsmooth, implacable, straightforward and open.

He crushed the incipient rebellion of South Carolina with the same mailed hand that destroyed the United States bank and held the pistol on his duellist opponent after he had drawn the fire of that adversary, then coolly and deliberately shot him through the heart. But he had reason for being implacable in that instance. The man had slandered his wife, the one creature in all the world that Jackson showed tenderness for. He was determined to take that life and gave his opponent the first shot that he might be sure of the life he hated with deadly enmity—in expiation of the offense for which there was no forgiveness.

VOLCANIC EJECTION.

Few persons have any idea of the prodigious quantity of lava and hot ashes which a volcano in a state of eruption can vomit in a few hours.

The matter which was discharged in 1669 from Mount Etna, and which threatened to overwhelm Catania, forms a mass the extent of which has been estimated as being not less than 1,000,000,000 cubic yards.

From the immense crater of Kilauea, in Hawaii, there was vomited in 1840 during a single eruption a mass of lava equivalent to 50 times the volume of earth which it was necessary to remove in order to form the Suez canal.

In 1873 the Skaptar-Jökull, one of the most redoubtable volcanoes in Iceland, sent forth two rivers of fire, one of which ran along a valley for 80 miles—its depth along the entire distance being 30 yards. Finally, it is estimated that from the mass of stones and ashes which were discharged in 1883 from Krakatoa, New Zealand, could be formed a mountain higher and wider at the base than Mount Blanc.

Governor Van Sant of Minnesota well says in his message to the legislature regarding the suits brought by the government against the combination and merger of the northern transcontinental railroad lines, that "whatever the result there need be no apprehension, for there is a power greater than corporate wealth, greater than the Supreme Court of the United States, and that is the power of the American people, and when once aroused no evil can resist this mighty force."

It is not often a private citizen serves his country for the greater part of half a century in positions of distinction. Ex-Premier Sagasta of Spain, just dead, entered the cortex in 1854. He recently retired from the premiership.

That terrible bubonic plague that ran its course among the rats and their Chinese co-tenants in China some two years ago has worked its way into the several west ports of Mexico. It is still terribly fatal, though not attended with anything like the mortality when it originated in Asia. Then ninety per cent or more died. In Mexico the deaths reach about fifty per cent. Following the law of all infectious diseases the plague is wearing itself out by constant transmissions.

The government took a very effective method of purifying the moral atmosphere at the Puget Sound navy yard. No more ships will be sent there, says the Secretary of the Navy, until the disreputable element is removed from the neighborhood. The order, very naturally, alarmed the people of Washington, for a navy yard brings a large volume of business into a community, and as a consequence vigorous repressive measures have already been taken by the local authorities.

Another "oldest citizen" is dead, this time an Indian woman down in the mountains of California. The dispatch from Gridley says she was one hundred and thirty years old, and though totally blind and unable to stand upright crawled about her home and cooked her own meals. There's the difference between a man and a woman. In such a case a man would have gone to the poorhouse many years before death. Woman's nature, maybe, training and education, impels her to cling to home, however humble, to the last.

Mr and Mrs W. L. Ford entertained company on Christmas day.

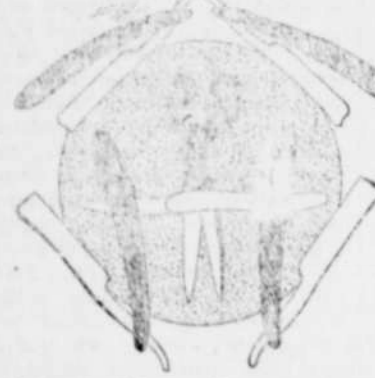
