LAMBERTY SENT TO THE ASYLUM

The irrepressible John Lamberty, the German baker, like the proverbial cat, couldn't stay away, and as a result he was examined this morning for insanity by Drs W L Cheshire and L W Brown before Judge Kincaid and sentenced to the insane asylum at Salem. He was taken below this afternoon.
It will be remembered that Lamberty was ordered to leave the county the other day, and he started for Southern Oregon, Medford being the point of his destination. It seems as though he did not go far but showed up over at Springfield yesterday. Sheriff Withers was notified of his presence there and he was brought to Eugene last evening by that official and placed in the county jail.
Lamberty's divorced wife, whom he had threatened to kill, was very badly frightened upon hearing that he was at Springfield, but naturally feels easier today, knowing that her tormenter is now under the watchful keeping of the state.

A Co-operative Store.

The Federated Trades Union and the various organizations of labor at Grants Pass are preparing to establish a co-operative store, similar to those in towns in the Eastern and Middle states that are controlled by the Grange, Farmers Alliance and Patrons of Husbandry. Stock is being liberally taken up by the members of the local organizations, and by the citizens of the county, and those who have the matter in charge feel confident that they will have no trouble in getting a store started. Only groceries will be handled at first, but it is the intention of the promoters to branch out and handle all lines of merchandise. The combining of all the Grants Pass stores and a mutual agreement to keep prices at a high mark is the labor organization's reason for establishing a co-operative store.

Little Girl to Asylum.

Florence Grigby, aged 8 years, daughter of Mrs A M Grigby, of Springfield, was taken to the insane asylum at Salem this afternoon by sheriff Withers, Mrs J E Robberson going along as assistant.
The little girl was examined before Judge Kincaid by Dr W L Cheshire this morning and sentenced. She has been an idiot all her life and at times violent.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan 8.--The Central building, the most prominent of the group on the grounds of the Young Men's Christian Association, was partly destroyed by fire this morning. The loss will reach \$40,000.

Germans After Panama Canal.

WASHINGTON, Jan 8.--It is guardedly admitted in high government official circles that there is some foundation for the statement that German influence is secretly at work to secure control of the Panama canal.

It is thought that German residents of Colombia are endeavoring to wrest control from the United States.

Fighting Coal Trust.

CHICAGO, Jan 8.--The retail coal dealers have been added to the list of those who are waging war against and endeavoring to break the combine between the coal railroads, mine operators and wholesale dealers.

The retailers are bringing suits for damages for non-delivery of coal, for which orders have been given.

The railroad yards are filled with long trains of cars loaded with coal and at the same time the city is beginning to suffer from lack of fuel.

Assaulted a Pen Guard.

SALEM, Or Jan 7.--John McMahas, the most desperate criminal in the Oregon Penitentiary, made an assault yesterday upon Chapel Guard Jay McCormick with intent to kill the guard. McCormick saved his life by besting his assailant into insensibility, but he accomplished this only after receiving several severe blows upon the head with a brick in the hands of the convict.
