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OREGON'S SENATORSHIP

House and Senate Voted Separately for Senator at Noon.

Fulton of Clatsop the "High" Man—Ex-Governor Geer a Good Second.

SALEM, Jan 20, 12:30.—When the hands of the Senate clock showed noon today President Brownell announced the election of a United States senator in order. It resulted as follows: C W Fulton, Astoria.....9 T T Geer, Marion county.....8 Scattering.....12 Senator Fulton did not vote.

The House vote resulted: Fulton.....19 Geer.....12 Wood, (Democrat).....12 Scattering.....17 Representative Eddy of Tillamook, [Republican] voted for Hewitt.

The Multnomah county delegation (twelve) scattered its votes all about.

Abolishing State Printer. SALEM, Jan 20.—The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state printer at the end of the present term passed the Senate this afternoon.

As it passed both houses at the last session of the legislature, it will go to the people to be voted upon with its passage through the House, about which there is no doubt.

Deficiency Judgment. SALEM, Jan 20.—Representative J M Shelly of Lane county introduced a bill today providing that no deficiency judgment may be taken by a judgment creditor through bidding in real property under a foreclosure of mortgage at a less amount than that for which judgment is taken.

Rubbing Sore Spots. SALEM, Jan 20.—Senator Galloway, of Yamhill county, in nominating C. E. S Wood for United States senator this morning said that Wood had received the Democratic nomination in convention for senator and the Democratic vote at the polls, and the people expected the Democrats in the legislature to vote for him, which they would do to the end.

The people expected the Republican members of the legislature to vote for Senator, but only God knew what to expect from a Republican majority.

The Democrats voted solid for Wood in both House and Senate.

Lewis and Clark Fair Bill Passed the House.

SALEM, Jan 20, (4:15 p. m.) The bill appropriating \$500,000 for the Lewis and Clark Fair at Portland in 1904, passed the House this afternoon with but four dissenting votes.

PASSED TO THE GREAT BEYOND

Two Well Known Matrons of Eugene and a Pioneer of Elmira Are Dead.

MRS. ELIZABETH HENDERSON. After a lingering illness, prolonged for several weeks, Mrs Elizabeth Henderson passed away Sunday morning at 1 o'clock at the old home on Pearl street.

Mrs Elizabeth E. Schroeder-Henderson was born in McLeanstown, Pennsylvania, November 13, 1826, and was therefore 76 years, 2 months and 5 days old. These years were filled with deeds of kindness and the living of an exemplary life.

Mourning the loss which has befallen them remains Mrs. Marietta Thurston and King Henderson, of Eugene; Melvin Henderson, of Paisley, Eastern Oregon, and Chas. S. Henderson, of Silver Lake, daughter and sons of the deceased.

Mrs. Olive S. Adams. Mrs Olive S Adams expired suddenly at her home, 825 High street, at 8:30 o'clock Saturday night. She had been ill for several weeks but she was not considered in a dangerous condition until just before death.

Deceased was born in Drakeville, Iowa, February 21, 1857, and had resided in Eugene for the past eleven years and a half. She was a sister-in-law of Mrs J W Johnson of this city.

Missouri Boodler Sentenced—President Mitchell Demands Part of Coal Profits for Miners.

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan 20.—In his annual report to the United Mine Workers of America, given to the press today, President Mitchell recommends that the miners make concerted demands for higher wages.

President Mitchell submits figures showing that coal operators are making enormous profits from the sale of coal, while paying the miners barely enough to procure them the most ordinary living.

St Louis, Jan 20.—The jury in the case of the State of Missouri against Charles Kelly, ex-speaker of the House of Delegates, indicted and tried for perjury on account of testimony he gave in the investigation of the disposal of valuable streetcar franchises in this city without compensation, was found guilty by the jury today.

The jury, under the Missouri law, fixed the term of imprisonment at two years.

Kelly remained imperturbable during the time the finding of the jury was being read.

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CHANGE IN GROCERY BUSINESS

W M Green Purchased Interest of His Mother and is Now Sole Owner.

For some time past J U Green & Son, the grocers, located in the Titus block at 619 Willamette street, have announced that a change was soon to be made in their business.

This morning W M Green, the junior member and manager of the firm, informed the GUARD that the change had taken place. He has purchased the interest held by his mother, Mrs Martha Green, and is now sole owner. The name of the establishment is changed from J U Green & Son to W M Green. The old firm name was not changed after the death of J U Green several years ago.

The firm has enjoyed a lucrative trade since commencing business in Eugene and is one of the oldest mercantile houses in the city. The GUARD bespeaks a continuation of prosperity for Mr Green.

Two Incorporated at Albany Saturday—One a Million Dollar Concern.

ALBANY, Jan 19.—Saturday the Oriental Mining Company filed articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office. The incorporators are Neal V Murray, J R Wyatt, J Otto Lee, J H Roberts, J F Vanner and C Sullivan.

The articles of incorporation recite that the capital stock of the new company is \$1,000,000, divided into one million assessable shares, valued at one dollar each.

The company has just purchased three of the best mining claims in the Blue River mining district, the Artie Vermont and Oriental.

The affairs of the corporation are to be managed by a board of five directors, or trustees. The principal office of the company is in Albany.

The Great Northern Mill and Flume Co has also been incorporated by W W Robb, W A Tompkins and J H Glass. The articles of incorporation state that the capital stock is \$120,000, divided into shares of one dollar each. The principal office is at Brownsville. This company also operates in the Blue River district.

LANE COUNTY PAYS BALANCE 1902 TAX

SALEM, Jan 20.—State Treasurer U M Moore Saturday received a remittance of \$1,284.47 from the treasurer of Lane county in full for the State, Agricultural College taxes for the year 1902, and interest thereon from December 1st, which was due the state from Lane county and withheld by his predecessor. The amount is segregated as follows:

RAILROAD TO THE SIUSLAW.

Arlington & Pacific Co. Incorporated at Portland.

To Build From Arlington to Florence.—J. E. Simmons, of Coal Mine and Oil Well Fame, one of the Promoters.

Articles incorporating the Arlington & Pacific Coast Railroad Company were filed in the county clerk's office yesterday by J P Finley, J R Smalles and J E Simmons, says today's Oregonian. The capital stock authorized is \$1,500,000. The objects announced are to construct and operate a railroad from Arlington to the Pacific Ocean.

J. P. Finley is a Portland undertaker and Coroner of Multnomah County; Mr Smalles is deputy organizer for a secret insurance order, and Mr Simmons appears in the city directory as "mining."

In speaking of the plans of the corporation last night, Mr Simmons said the object was not to parallel another railroad line, but to open a new country. The route outlined is from Arlington in Gilliam county, south to Fossil, a distance of about 60 miles; thence in a general southwesterly course across the Cascade to Florence, at the mouth of the Siuslaw river, in Lane county. The line thus described will be something like 300 miles long. Mr Simmons says surveys have been made for short distances on either end of the route, but the main middle stretch has not been surveyed, and it is not known just where it will cross the Cascades. He says ample New York capital is behind the enterprise, and actual construction will be under way before the end of the year. The company will perfect its organization within a week, and will then put surveying crews in the field.

While the proposed railroad will be a feeder for the O R & N by virtue of its connection at Arlington, and the nature of its traffic—mainly grain and lumber—Mr Simmons says there will be no corporate relations between his company and the O R & N or any other of the Harriman lines. The chief traffic in view for the new road is lumber from the Siuslaw country, the market for which is in the Mississippi Valley. Grain, livestock and mining freight will also give the new road a large volume of business.

Died.

Mrs Anna Green, wife of Matthew Green, died Saturday, Jan. 17, 1903, between Goshen and Springfield, from paralysis. She was aged 50 years and leaves a husband and one grown son. They had recently moved to this country, being Germans. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon. The remains were interred in Laurel Hill cemetery.

Fish Warden Here.

H G Van Dusen, state fish warden, came in this afternoon from a visit to the hatcheries along coast. He has also been in the Rogue River valley seeing to the proper construction of dams across the streams there. He will not visit the two hatcheries in this county this trip but goes on to Albany tonight.

Mr. and Mrs. Keeler Gabbert's Little Daughter Burned to Death.

It was a sad funeral party that left Eugene for the Pleasant Hill cemetery this morning. Saturday morning Mrs Gabbert, of St Helens, formerly Miss Stella Rowland, of Eugene, left her little daughter of two years crawling about on the floor as she left the room. She was out of the room not to exceed two minutes, but a horrible sight met the mother's gaze on returning. By some means—it will never be known for a certainty—the baby's dress had caught fire and was in full blaze.

The frantic mother extinguished the flames with a bedspread at hand, but it was too late. The child lived but four hours afterward, apparently not suffering to any great extent. It is a mystery how the child's clothing caught fire as the stove was of alright manufacture and it would seem impossible that flames could have been communicated to the clothing by that means. It is possible that a match was ignited by the child crawling over it.
