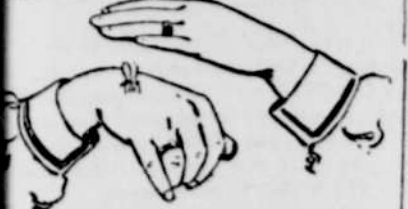


MALARIA AND YELLOW JACK

U. O. FINANCES AND ENROLLMENT

Interesting Figures From Reports of President and Regents—Some Needs.

In the report of President Campbell of the U. O. and Judge Bean, president of the board of regents, read at the meeting of the regents in Portland Tuesday afternoon, some interesting figures as follows were obtainable:

Total enrollment at Eugene (not including School of Music)..... 347

Women..... 86

College of Literature, Science and the Arts..... 124
College of Science and Engineering..... 37
Special students..... 40
Graduate students..... 9

It is noteworthy fact that the enrollment in the University proper shows a marked gain, 25 students over last year, and is probably the largest in the University's history. With a continued rapid growth of high schools, the number of freshmen will steadily decrease, and the number of students of college rank will correspondingly increase.

EUGENE'S NEW PLAY-HOUSE

What the Structure Will be Like According to Present Plans.

Board Meeting Tomorrow Evening to Discuss the Plans and Specifications of the Architect.

A GUARD reporter was privileged this morning by the courtesy of Contractor L. N. Roney to minutely examine the plans and specifications for the new playhouse, which now seems to be well on the way toward construction. The architect, W. D. Fugh, of Salem, last week forwarded the plans to Eugene, and F. P. Carey is here to represent him. He has established his office in the Dunn building. The plans arrived about two weeks before the directors expected them to be ready, showing that Mr. Fugh is a man of prompt habits, which will be agreeable to the public when construction commences.

A general idea as to the appearance of the building may be obtained by following a few figures and facts.

The location is on L. N. Roney's lot, directly north of Day & Henderson's building on Willamette street. The front will be an even 100 feet. The main space on the ground floor is to be occupied in the forepart of the building by three store rooms, as illustrated by the accompanying outline. The main entrance and corridor will be 15 feet wide, one of the best points about the structure. The arrangement of the big auditorium can also be seen by the diagram. The seating capacity will be about 800—all seated. No doubt at a rough the real capacity of the building would admit 1100 people.

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PRESIDENT'S WESTERN TRIP

President's Secretary Acknowledges Receipt of Invitation to Visit Eugene.

MY DEAR SIR:—Your favor of the 10th inst. has been received and the invitation which you extend to the President on behalf of the citizens of Eugene is cordially appreciated.

It is impossible at present to send you a definite response as no plans for the Pacific coast trip have yet been made, but I may say that if it is found feasible to include Eugene in the itinerary the details of the President's stay there will necessarily be left largely in the hands of the local committee.
