EUGENE BRIDGE APPROACH

It has been suggested that the county build another span on the north end of the Eugene bridge. What for? An approach from the end of the extended bridge would not be safer than one built from the present end of the bridge. The drift that is piled against the brush and timber just below the proposed approach site is ample proof of this assertion.

The best—the only thing for the county to do, is to replace the approach as before the flood. And it may be ten years before it will go out again. That has been about the lapse of time between our big floods. And if it should not go out for ten years it would about need rebuilding anyway.

SQUANDERED NEARLY A MILLION.

John L. Sullivan for years the champion of the prize ring has the distinction of having squandered a million or nearly of dollars since he commenced his pugilistic career in 1881. His latest escapade was in Boston where he spent a whole day throwing money about the streets. It is needless to say he has little left. Here is a list of his ring winnings since that memorable day when he defeated Paddy Ryan at Richburg, Mississippi, and awoke next morning to find himself famous—at least talked about all over the country, even in European capitals:
