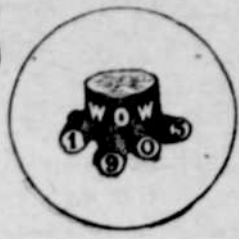


# PREPARATIONS WOODMEN

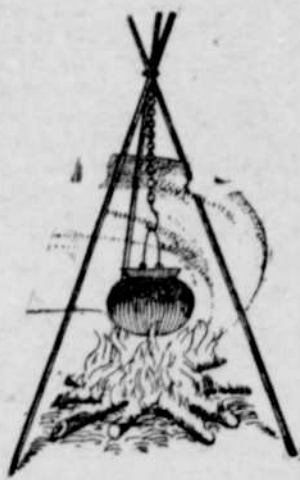
A very handsome and appropriate souvenir badge is being also gotten out. It will be printed on white silk ribbon. The words "W. O. W. Log-Rolling"

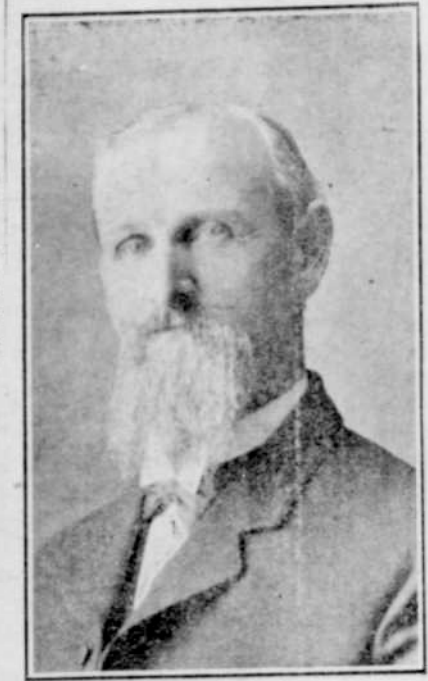
