The land office does not survey timber lands, as such lands are never opened for homesteaders. Therefore no record of these timber lands is kept for the general public.

The demand for them and the ease with which they are located and entries made led to the suspicion that some one acquainted with the records of the land office had been giving out information not generally disclosed.

The law was intended to give the limber entered to the person making the entry and for his own benefit and to prevent the very system that has been built up through collusion and fraud. This system, it is said, could not have prospered if the rights of the people had been protected during the administration of former Commissioner Hermann.
