## A REVIVAL SENSATION

Santiam Woman Broke  
Into "Meeting" and  
Struck the Preacher.

Spokane Man Accused of Large  
Forgeries—Telegraph Line-  
man Being Eaten up by  
Minute Worms.

San Bernardino, Cal., June 3.—The  
medical fraternity of this city are  
greatly interested in the case of  
George Madden, who was brought  
here the other day suffering from a  
loathsome and painful complaint. He  
is actually being eaten alive by thou-  
sands of minute worms, hatched  
from guinea eggs that supposedly  
were deposited in his nostrils while  
he slept. The doctors say there is no  
hope for the man, that he will surely  
die.

Convert's Wife on War Path.

(Scripps News Association.)  
Salem, June 3.—A revival meeting  
on the Santiam was brought to a sen-  
sational close last night. The wife of  
a German convert objected to her hus-  
band attending the meetings, where  
he had been converted.  
She rushed into the church last  
night, went forward to where the  
preacher was exhorting and struck  
him several times with her fists. The  
incident caused great excitement.

Forged Mining Stock.

(Scripps News Association.)  
Spokane, Wash., June 3.—Howard  
J. Kressly, a prominent mining pro-  
moter of this section, is accused of  
forging immense issues of mining  
stock, thereby wrongfully procuring  
fifty thousand dollars in cash.  
It is thought wealthy eastern rela-  
tives will make his speculations good,  
in which event he may not be prose-  
cuted.

Note and Comment.

normal vote at the late election of 25  
per cent, Hermann still lost 4700  
votes to Reames. No amount of fig-  
uring can make any other result.

## EUGENE GIRL KILLED BY CARS

Dispatch From Santa Rosa, Cali-  
fornia, Imparts Bad News to  
Friends in Eugene

(Guard Special Service.)  
Santa Rosa, Cal., June 3.—Miss  
Gertrude Sovren was killed near here  
this afternoon by a train on the  
Southern Pacific track. She was  
walking on the road bed and the en-  
gine was upon her before she realized  
her danger.

Miss Sovren left Eugene last fall  
with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Braun-  
ton, former residents of College Hill,  
south of Eugene, for California, to  
spend the winter. The news comes  
as a blow to her many friends here.  
The young lady was nineteen years  
of age.

## TWO MEN ROB THEIR HOST

(Daily Guard, June 3.)  
Constable B. K. Lawson, of Cottage  
Grove, brought down from that city  
this afternoon two prisoners, George  
Rowen and James Hollandsworth,  
charged with stealing between \$135  
and \$140 from Wm. Moore, the South-  
ren Pacific section foreman at Cres-  
well, Monday.

It seems that Rowen and Hollands-  
worth, who are transients passing  
through the country, scraped up an  
acquaintance with Moore, and seem-  
ing to be "good fellows," he invited  
them to his house. After pleasantly  
spending some time the strangers sud-  
denly disappeared. Nothing was  
thought of the occurrence until Mr.  
Moore missed his money, when he  
notified the officers up and down the  
line. The thieves were caught by  
Constable Lawson at Cottage Grove  
the same day the crime was commit-  
ted. They were examined and bound  
over. They are now in the county  
jail.

An Old Wreck.

Astoria, Or., June 3.—An obstruc-  
tion was found on Tallanta's seining  
grounds, which are located on the  
sands formed on the north side of the  
jetty at the mouth of the river, and  
a diver was sent down to make an  
examination of what it was. He  
found that it was the wreck of a two-  
masted schooner or some other small  
vessel that protruded from the bottom  
of the river, and an attempt will be  
made to blow it up with dynamite.  
There is no record of any vessel hav-  
ing been wrecked in the vicinity of  
where this one was found, so it must  
have been many years ago.

Pacific Cable.

Manila, June 3.—The British cable  
steamer Angella, engaged in laying  
the Commercial Pacific cable, arrived  
at Guam at midnight Monday. She  
had good weather throughout and her  
trip from this port was entirely suc-  
cessful. It was expected that the  
Guam end of the cable would be  
spliced yesterday, completing con-  
nections between Manila and Guam.

## CONFESSED TO AWFUL CRIME

Young Man Sentenced  
to Hang Tells of Ter-  
rible Murder.

Murdered His Wife to Obtain a  
Little Money—Wife Begged  
Piteously for Mercy.

Riverside, Cal., June 3.—Fischer,  
the young degenerate who killed his  
wife here in April by choking her into  
insensibility, chloroforming her and  
then pouring gasoline over her clothes  
and touching off a match, thereby  
hoping to destroy all trace of the  
crime, has made a full confession at  
San Quentin, from which place he is  
sentenced to be hanged July 1.  
In his admission Fischer says: "I  
sprang upon Mrs. Fischer just as we  
had returned from a walk through the  
city, and three minutes after we en-  
tered our rooms the deed was done  
and she was insensible on the floor with  
her clothes soaked in gasoline ready  
for the match."

BROKE HER WRIST.

"I seized her and threw her across  
the table, and if her wrist was broken  
it was done when she struggled  
against me and threw her arm back  
to protect herself as I pressed the  
cloth soaked with chloroform over  
her mouth. I did not know her arm  
was broken, as I had no time to ex-  
amine for broken bones, and the whole  
act taking not more than three  
minutes. She must have thrown it  
across the edge of the table, for when  
I seized her, I threw her on the table  
to complete the work with the chlo-  
roform bottles, of which there were  
two. I killed her deliberately to get  
a few hundred dollars she possessed,  
intending to use half of it for my two  
children, whom I had deserted in  
Texas with their mother, my other  
wife."

BEGGED PITEOUSLY.

"The girl I killed was young and  
good looking and I believe loved me.  
I acted cruelly towards her many  
times. The afternoon of the murder  
she refused to give me her money,  
saying that I would not even thank  
her for it. I acted kind that day,  
knowing that I would kill her before  
night. She begged piteously while  
I was murdering her."

Wilkes Booth Lived?

Enid, O. T., June 3.—Junius  
Brutus Booth, actor and nephew of  
John Wilkes Booth, the assassin of  
President Lincoln, identified the man  
who committed suicide here January  
14, as his uncle, the assassin. The  
man lived here as David George and  
on his death, K. L. Bates, an attor-  
ney in Memphis, came here and fully  
identified the body and then went  
east, and has obtained positive iden-  
tification from the nephew and also  
of Joseph Jefferson, Clara Morris and  
a score of others. Bates claims to have  
been a confidential agent of Booth,  
the assassin, for years. Bates says the  
man supposed to have been killed in  
place of the assassin was Ruddy  
Booth, who settled in Glenrose Mills,  
Texas, and conducted a store there  
as John St. Helen.

## MISS WARE ARRESTED

McKinley and the Ex-  
Commissioner in the  
Toils at Portland.

Charged with Perjury, Forgery  
and Conspiracy to Defraud  
the Government of Pub-  
lic Lands.

(Scripps News Association.)  
Portland, Or., June 3.—Miss Marie  
Ware, ex-commissioner of the land  
office in Eugene, was arrested this  
morning on a charge of fraud in  
office on a warrant issued in the fed-  
eral court.

Horace McKinley, her close friend,  
who is generally believed to have  
prospered over her speculations, was  
arrested last evening. They have been  
released on bonds of \$2000.

Horace McKinley was arrested yester-  
day afternoon in Portland on a  
charge of perjury, forgery and con-  
spiracy to defraud the United States  
by fictitious and fraudulent entry  
papers. The specific charges against  
McKinley are that he "filed false  
affidavit papers in the office of the  
register of the land office of the  
United States in Eugene."

Special Agent Green, who discov-  
ered irregularities enough to force  
Binger Hermann out of the office of  
commissioner in Washington, has  
worked up this case and it is supposed  
that he has many others and is now  
ready to make the arrests of the  
offending parties. These arrests are  
supposed to have commenced with  
the arrest of McKinley.

LLOYD'S CONNECTION.

McKinley was released upon fur-  
nishing \$2000 bonds. He claimed that  
the whole thing was a put up job and  
a conspiracy against him, at the  
bottom of which was Clyde Lloyd,  
who is at present the defendant in a  
suit for \$20,000 brought by McKin-  
ley. Lloyd and McKinley have been  
at swords points for months and it  
is known that the former has aided  
the government officials to obtain  
all the information possible against  
Miss Ware and McKinley.

PROBABLY WILL NOT PROSE-  
CUTE.

The government officers who are  
running down land frauds in this  
state are of the opinion that Miss  
Ware has surrendered herself to the  
influences of designing speculators,  
who have found her a ready tool.  
Government officers do not desire to  
prosecute her, if she will become a  
witness for the government. They  
believe that speculators who have used  
her to further their designs should  
rather be brought to justice.

The charges are such that they  
might frighten a woman who was less  
gifted with temerity, or who was not  
supported in her courage by others.  
If any of the charges against her  
can be substantiated, it will probably  
be manifest that she has not made  
herself liable by acts of her own ini-  
tiative, but by the promptings of per-  
sons who have found her plastic in  
their hands.
