

MEMORIAL CEREMONIES

The Day Fittingly Observed by Eugene Organizations.

Large Crowd Attended the Services at the Cemeteries—Graves of the Fallen Heroes Decorated.

Saturday was a memorable day in the annals of the Lane County G. A. R. and kindred organizations which had charge of the exercises which commemorated the lives of those who gave their service to their country.

The city was thronged with a mass of people from the surrounding country and when the imposing parade marched along the line of march to the cemetery it was greeted by hundreds of visitors.

A wealth of flowers had been scattered over the graves of loved ones and the ceremonies conducted by officers of the G. A. R., assisted by school children, were impressively rendered.

Misses Faith Lister and Effie McCallum sang a pretty duet while the school children deposited their floral offerings to the "unknown dead," after which the grizzled soldiers of long ago strewed flowers on the graves of their comrades.

The exercises were completed at noon.

At the Christian church in the evening there was presented a program worthy of special mention. Appropriate recitations and songs were recited and sung. Rev. G. N. Wall made the principal address of the evening to the assembled organizations.

The decorations were beautiful in the extreme. Flowers were banked here and there and lavish distribution of nature's wealth made a richness hard to equal. The stars and stripes formed a chief means of decoration.

Miss Henrietta Bloom was enthroned as Goddess of Liberty on a great mass of flowers. The exercises were attended by a large audience. They were closed with the audience singing America, and the annual services of remembrance went on record as being the best Eugene has experienced in many years.

CLEVER SWINDLER IS AT WORK

A clever swindler is doing the road between here and San Francisco. He passed through Eugene last Monday and was in Albany the previous Saturday, victimizing his patrons in the most artistic manner.

His system was to go into a store and state that he was a representative of some house, any house suited him, and wished to sell a bill of goods. If an order was made he suddenly remembered that he was out of cash and would like to be aided until he could telegraph the "house." A few dollars would be handed the man with a will as he usually succeeded in convincing his friends that he was the real thing.

The city officers along the line have been notified. Marshal Stiles came near getting the man in Eugene, but, owing to a delay in receiving a telegram he was put off the track. It is supposed that the swindler is now in California.

Sheriff of Douglas Nails the Imitation Drummer for Marshal Stiles.

Sheriff Parrott, of Roseburg, today telephoned Chief of Police Stiles that he had his swindler who has been passing himself as a drummer on the road and getting money from the merchants, an account of which has appeared in the Guard. He will be examined tomorrow by Prosecuting Attorney Brown on a charge made against him in Roseburg.

Parrott caught his man as he was about to board the train at Glendale for the south. He had detoured into the country and laid low in the hopes of escaping the minions of the law.

In Eugene he represented himself as a drummer for Waddams & Kerr, A. Shilling & Co., and J. A. Folger & Co. He found that Wilson, the grocery here, owed a small amount to Folger & Company, and collected it, giving a receipt to which he signed the firm name and endorsed as Ben Meyer. This is what he is wanted for here. If he is not convicted in Roseburg he will be turned over to the Lane county authorities.

He gives the name of A. L. Stewart in Roseburg.

SOUTH LANE LUMBER ITEMS

Many New Mills—Lumber Business Booming—Sewer System.

(Guard Special Service.)

Cottage Grove, May 29.—The Woolley-Houston sawmill only two miles from the O. & S. B. Railroad at Dorena, will be pushed along as rapidly as possible.

A flume will be built out to the road, there being plenty of fall and no high trestle is needed.

Your correspondent learns that a mill is to be put in on the creek above Frank Veatch's (the old Marion Martin place). There a flume can also be built out to the S. P. railroad, south of Latham. This will reach a body of timber that has never before been drawn upon for milling.

The Pacific Timber Company are carrying on considerable work, running piling and ties down the Coast Fork taking them out at the old Vaughan mill site near Latham, where they have done much work in the way of flood dams to facilitate the running of timber.

The proposed mill on Row River at the Anderson place, 12 miles from here is at a stand still, it is learned, on account of the inability of the promoters, Messrs. Bingham, Stock & Harlow, to secure favorable freight contract with the railroad. This site is the key to a very fine body of mill-timber.

SEWER SYSTEM.
Engineer Collier has completed the survey for Cottage Grove's sewer system and as soon as the profiles are completed, the council will push the matter as rapidly as possible.

A prominent physician of this place says that unless Cottage Grove puts in a sewer system soon we are certain to have an epidemic of typhoid.

NEW BRIDGE.
Two big hewn timbers are on the ground for the new bridge across the river at this place. They are 94 feet long and were hewn and hauled in from Silk Creek by Wheeler & Owens.

S. P. CO.'S TIE PLANT.
Time was (and only 25 years ago) when Cottage Grove was only a flag station and Latham the regular station where mails for this place were received. Now Latham is the scene of the annual winter sojourn of the wood-preserving plant and the S. P. Co. is cramped for yard room there. They have just lengthened the old siding about a thousand feet and have a steam shovel crew filling up the grade to the level of the main line. And they will need more soon.

THE NEW HARRISBURG SAWMILL

Harrisburg Bulletin: The matter of a mammoth and record-breaking sawmill to be established here by the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company is now determined. The mill will be built. This information comes to the Bulletin direct from Hon. R. A. Booth, general manager of the company. Mr. Booth was here Tuesday, accompanied by Mr. S. Klov Dahl, a civil engineer, who, with the assistance of Surveyor Riggs of this city, will survey a site for the big structure, and will also run lines for land purchase for the purpose of doubling the capacity of the Harrisburg water ditch.

As a precautionary move, they are buying a strip of land on each side of the slough from which their supply of water is obtained, for two purposes, first, that their right-of-way cannot be interfered with, and second, that the timber may stand intact on the banks of the water course for protection.
