There is, approximately, 310 children in the Springfield school district who are of school age. This is a gain of about 60 over last year.

Recorder Roberts tendered his resignation to the town council Monday evening, and L. F. Thompson was unanimously elected to fill the vacancy.

The surveyors left behind to finish the plans for the Springfield-Henderson connection will leave tomorrow for San Francisco. The plans have been completed and turned in to the company.

Fin Roberts, who has been employed in the postoffice, left yesterday for Marcola, where he has accepted a position in the Hyland lumber yard. Mr. Roberts is a good accountant and will make a valuable employee for that company. He will move his family there shortly.

It is reported that a large number of poles, for the electric light plant at this place, will be taken out of the river near the old mill, shortly, by the Booth-Kelly Company.

The engine that has been used in Mr. Walker's shop, was sold last week to the Hyland lumber company of Marcola. It was taken to the foundry at Eugene where it will be converted into a locomotive to be used to haul cars from the mill to the yards, a distance of about 2 miles.

E. C. Martin, foreman of the planing mill, had his foot badly crushed by getting it entangled under one of the planers. He had stopped the machine to adjust something about it and while thus engaged the feeder mistook a signal to start. The injury is a painful one and it will be some time before he can again use the foot.

Mohawk Logs for Corvallis.

A Corvallis dispatch of June 12 says: A large drive of logs is due to arrive at Corvallis about the 15th of July. They are the property of the Corvallis Sawmill Company, and are now in the Mohawk river. Harold Strong, representing the company went to Blodgett a few days ago to arrange for a shipment of logs from that point daily. He will return today and proceed immediately to the point on the Mohawk from which the drive will start some time this week. He will spend a few days flailing, and will be on the ground to see that no time is lost in getting the logs started. The drive consists of 3,000,000 feet of fir and 1,000,000 feet of hard wood, and several months will be required to convert into lumber.
