HEPPNER CALAMITY

Bodies Being Continually Found Under Debris and Drift.

Horror of Calamity Steadily Grows—Relief is Urgently Needed—Scores Homeless, Sick and Destitute.

Water Bad, Weather Hot and Stench from Decomposing Bodies.

(Scripps News Association.)
Heppner, June 18.—The sanitary conditions here are truly appalling. The water is so filled with sediment and is so warm that it is not fit for drinking purposes even when boiled. The weather has turned off very hot and the bodies under the drifts along the creek are sending out strong odors. Free lunch counters are feeding the destitute and volunteer workers.

All a Tale of Woe.
(Scripps News Association.)
Heppner, June 18.—Many bodies are still buried under the volunteer forces are placing them in graves as rapidly as the force available is capable of doing.

Other bodies are continually being found under debris. To anything like fully recover the dead involves the removal of hundreds of thousands of tons.

Money, tools, teams and food are urgently needed for relief purposes and to effect the recovery of the dead. Scores are homeless, sick and destitute, most of them women and children.

HOW PENDLETON RESPONDED.
Pendleton furnished five hundred men to assist in clearing the tons of debris and in search for the dead. And they worked, so hard that they were exhausted and had to return.

The telegraph operators are breaking down under the strain. They worked three days and nights without sleep, except in their chairs, and with but little food.

Railroad Nearing Town.

Heppner, June 18.—The O. R. & N. railroad officials are straining every nerve to re-establish communications. The track will be repaired four miles this side of Lexington before night (Lexington is ten miles from Heppner.—Ed. Guard.)

Another Cloudburst

Pendleton, June 18.—Mark P. Carrigan of Umatilla county, was drowned by a cloudburst in Comb's canyon yesterday evening. His body was recovered eight miles down the canyon.

SCHOOL CENSUS OF EUGENE

The school census of Eugene which has just been completed, shows an increase of nearly 200 over the census of a year ago. The number of school children in the district is as follows: 860 males and 861 females, a total of 1721.

The growth of a city is well shown by the increase in number of its school children. Eugene has a school system of which any city might be proud. But on account of the crowded condition numbers have been kept from attending the Eugene schools who would otherwise have come. With the erection of the new High School and the consequent throwing open of another building for the lower grades, the congested condition will be relieved. The growth of the schools during the coming year will be greater than ever before.

DISTRICT FAIR FOR EUGENE

Will Be Held Here During the Latter Part of September.

Messrs Wilkins and Rankin Successful in Their Efforts to Secure Fair for This Place.

Amos Wilkins, who with F. A. Rankin went to Cottage Grove yesterday to attend a meeting of the board of directors of the Second Southern Oregon Agricultural Society, returned to Eugene this morning.

He informed the Guard that at the meeting it was decided to hold the next fair at Eugene, probably during the week commencing Tuesday, Sept. 29th, although that has not been definitely decided upon.

The fair will be held at Bangs' Park, which is an ideal place for it, and it is the intention of the promoters to make it one of the best fairs ever held in the state. The park is a splendid camping place, the track is good, and with a little work can be made first-class, and there are many other conveniences.

MEETING WILL BE HELD.

A meeting of the citizens of Eugene will be called immediately to begin the work of preparing for the fair. It is the intention to advertise it liberally, and those who have hold of the matter will spare no time and effort to make it a big success.

OFFICERS ELECTED.

The board also revised the premium list and has sent the copy to the state printer.

INCREASED PREMIUMS.

It will be remembered that the last legislature increased the appropriation for the fair in this district from \$800 to \$1800. This will allow the board to give larger premiums and to add 3rd prizes. Mr. Wilkins says the premiums on stock will be increased 50 per cent and other premiums in proportion.
