A Great Discovery.

B. J. Casterline of Portland, a toolmaker by trade, has rediscovered the lost art of tempering steel. An Oregonian reporter saw some astonishing tests yesterday.

Fastening a large nail in a vise he took a shaving off it with a draw-knife tempered by his process, the tool remaining sharp. Also took an ax thus tempered and cut into a bar of tool steel a sixteenth of an inch without turning the edge of the ax.

The secret of the process lies in the chemical into which he dips the iron after bringing it to a red heat. There is no way to patent his discovery, as patenting would give the secret to the public and anyone could use it without asking or leave.
