Portland Gamblers to be Routed—Mysterious Disappearances in Portland—Jewish Petition Ready.

Washington, D. C. July 9.—Simon Wolff Eggrith told Secretary Hay this morning that the Jewish petition would be ready for President Roosevelt on next Tuesday. As soon as the petition reaches him the President will forward it to the czar at once.

Like Tracy in Oregon.

Tacoma, Wash., July 9.—A bold holdup was perpetrated at Auburn, Washington, this morning. The holdup was committed by three highwaymen who were fully prepared for their work. A few hours after the first holdup the city marshal of Auburn was held up and relieved of his gun, his club and his light.

Sheriff Cuddehe of Seattle, and a large posse of deputies are on the ground and the criminals who did the work are now surrounded in a small patch of woods near Auburn. The robbers have notified the sheriff and his posse that they will not be taken alive and it is expected that a deadly combat will take place between the officers and the ambushed outlaws.

(Sheriff Cuddehe, of Seattle, will be remembered by the people as the sheriff of King county, who had such a vigorous trial with the Oregon outlaw Tracy, who escaped from the Oregon state penitentiary and fled to Washington and was killed later in Eastern Washington.—Ed.)

Another Mysterious Disappearance from Portland.

Portland, July 9.—L. J. Zumwalt, of Vancouver, Wash., a well known timber cruiser, came to Portland about ten days ago and has mysteriously disappeared. It is known that Zumwalt had a large sum of money on his person and it is believed he was murdered. His brother notified the police today and it is thought he was murdered last Saturday night and his body thrown in the Willamette river.

Another Mysterious Disappearance from Portland.

Portland, July 9.—Mrs. Martha Blanchard, of New Era, Oregon, came to this city a week ago to visit friends and relatives. It is known she had money on her person.

No one has seen her since she arrived at the union depot in this city. Her case has been reported to the police who are entirely baffled. No clue at all.

It is believed that an active gang of murderers are making this city their headquarters and looking for strangers with money.

This is the fourth mysterious disappearance of parties with money from this city within the last ten days.

Forest Grove, Or., July 9.—The football management has just announced that R. J. McFadden of Stanford University, will coach Pacific's team during the coming season. Mr. McFadden has been signed only after the list of available men was carefully considered, and it is believed that in the selection one of the very best coaches on the coast will be brought to Pacific University.

To Stop Gambling.

Portland, July 9.—Mayor Williams called Chief Hunt to his office today and they held a long consultation. It is believed here that the Mayor has ordered the Chief of Police to take active steps against all classes of gambling in this city. Mayor Williams and Chief Hunt both declined talking for publication regarding their recent conference.

NOT TOGETHER.

Miss Ware in Denver, McKinley in La Crosse.

"Dah W. Tarpley, one of the bondsmen for Miss Marie Ware, came down from Eugene this morning and informed his brother, Lewis H. Tarpley, attorney for Horace G. McKinley, that McKinley and Miss Ware did not go to Denver together, as has been reported. Mr. Tarpley said Miss Ware left the state two days after McKinley, and that her destination was Denver. Of McKinley's whereabouts, he knew nothing, and he did not believe she did.

"Lewis H. Tarpley said he was positive McKinley had left for La Crosse, Wis., and that he is now in that city. Business matters, Mr. Tarpley said called McKinley, and he did not go in company with his accomplice in the alleged timber land frauds."—Portland Journal.

The Cayuse war veterans are few and far between now. This war commenced with the massacre of Dr. Whitman, the noted missionary, in 1847, and lasted nearly three years.

Trying New Wheat.

The famous German seven-headed wheat is being tried near Junction City and the results so far obtained are very satisfactory indeed, says the correspondent to the Portland Journal. The growth has been far ahead of other kinds of wheat during the recent dry spell and the multiple heads are very large and vigorous. It is estimated that the yield here will be more than double that of other wheat and it is stated by those interested that the grain is very hard and will make the best of flour. The height of this grain is greater than is that of the ordinary wheat, and the stalk is very similar to that of the famous bluestem.

The peculiarity of Eshom's case is that he can remember no names. He is not what would be called insane, but as mad. Looking at a buggy he knows what it is, but is liable to call it a dishpan or anything else that comes on his tongue's end. A stick of wood he will pick up and put in the stove, but cannot give the name of either the stove or the wood. If he wants anything he is liable to call for the moon. Everything that he sees is known, and comprehended, but expression is impossible.

When he undertakes to tell anything about himself his sentences are simply jumbles of words, a veritable dictionary hash. Yet in other ways he is perfectly sane. He sees everything that is going on around him, and comprehends the situation, but cannot describe it.

In the medical profession the disease is termed "word blindness," the loss of the use of words. The connection between the vocal organs and the brain have become affected, and refuse to respond. This is the reason that the words and sentences are so unintelligible. The vocal organs are in perfect condition, and respond to the desire to speak, but they do not respond to the impressions of the mind.
