A Lively Strike.

Chicago, July 16.—The strike at the Kellogg Switchboard Company's factory broke out worse than ever this morning. The police attempted to disperse the mob, which numbered at least two thousand men and boys, but they threw available stones at the officers and for a time defied all efforts to disperse them.

The police finally won but the mob threatens to destroy the Kellogg factory in spite of police and militia and their protection.

The Dalles Tragedy.

The Dalles, July 16.—Mrs. Louis Comine lies on her bed fearfully burned and nearly sure to die as the result of an accident last night. At eleven o'clock while going up stairs to bed she fell back down the stairs breaking the lamp under her. The oil took fire and ignited her clothing when she ran screaming into the street. A stable employee, attracted by her screams put out what was left of her burning clothing with a bucket of water. She was taken back into her home, which failed to take fire, but the terrible pain caused her to lose her reason and she continually moans and calls for her five little children that were alone with her at the time of the accident, the father being absent in the Cascade Mountains.

She suffers awfully and will die.

At the Cannery.

The cannery is having a run on Black Republican cherries today. Mr. Allen states that the cherry crop this year was a full crop, taking it on the average, and the finest cherries he ever beheld. The cannery has about 14 carloads of cherries up and anticipates at least two more carloads. About 5000 cases in all.

Harvey Brehaut, Dell Morgan, E. J. Fay, G. A. Peel and F. G. Eby, all of Cottage Grove, to-day filed articles of incorporation for the Phosco Manufacturing Company. The purpose of the company is to manufacture and sell the new beverage known as Phosco, declared in their articles as being a "healthful, beneficial and delightful drink."

The company is incorporated for \$25,000, divided into 25,000 shares. The stock is non-assessable. The head of the office is at Cottage Grove.

The Portland Streetcar Shooting.

Fred Day, the twenty-two year old electrician shot on a suburban street at Portland Tuesday night by robbers without even being warned, gives this account of the occurrence:

"I was going home, standing on the rear platform. I had my back to the side of the car on which the highway men boarded the steps; before I knew they were there I heard the report of the pistol and instantly felt the pain in my back. I ran into the car and sank into a seat. The thugs followed me, and while I was compelled to stand up they were young men although they all wore masks and it was difficult to get a look at them."

The Daily Journal of Wednesday evening says: "The ball from the thug's pistol is a lead bullet of .38 calibre. It entered the right side of the back about eight inches from the spine, fracturing the tenth rib and lodged against the spine. It carried with it a piece of the coat and lining with two pieces of clothing, making four thickness of cloth three-fourths of an inch in length."

"The physicians discovered the bullet two inches beneath the surface of the flesh, lodged against the vertebrae. The doctors state that the injury is not as serious as at first thought and they have every reason to believe that their patient will make a quick recovery."

Two Hoboes Arrested Here This Morning Bear a Relation to Car Hold-Up.

Two itinerant strangers, bearing the manner and dress of "gentlemen of the road" applied this morning before breakfast to J. N. Nichols, the Junction City liveryman, for a horse and buggy. They were in with the spirits of the bottle, reeling a little too far to the north while making the request. They were refused the rig. They returned later while Nichols was at his breakfast and secured the rig from the proprietor's son and drove out of town on a gallop.

Nichols telephoned to the Eugene police to take the rig away from them and this was accomplished with some difficulty. Both men were on a glorious drunk and were ordered out of town. The rig was taken to Bang's stables, the horse being much the worse for the drive.

Later the prospectors, who seemed to have a little ready cash, stocked up with a gallon of beer and esconced themselves in the wooded back of the postoffice, intent on a grand climax in the path of spirituous joy.

Marshal Eastland soon learned of their condition and when he faced them again both made a final grab at the can of beer and took long sweet draughts before being marched to the city jail.

The men when searched this afternoon were found to have a small diamond ring, gold watch, razor and strap and a few trinkets. They gave names of W. Smith and Wm. Stewart. Smith carries a union card issued by Portland Bricklayers' Union No. 1402. They tried to give the impression that they came from the south but finally admitted that they had ridden a freight out of Portland.

A Nehalem Dolly Varden.

Yesterday's Oregonian had a picture of a thirty-one inch Dolly Varden caught in the Nehalem. He is a slim looking fellow, little like the broad, fat ones caught in the McKenzie. But the coast streams are warm at this season, while the magnificent Lane county river comes from snow and glacier, and big lakes but recently filled with snow-water, and keeps cold all summer.

That champion trout fisherman Geo. Frissell, of McKenzie Bridge, can go the Nehalem trout several inches better, his record fish measuring thirty-five inches. 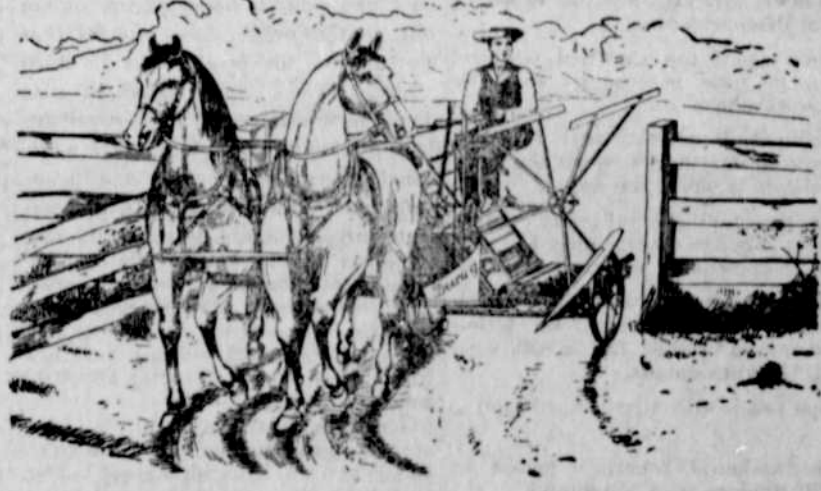
