No Punishment Too Severe.

Three cases in one day of attacks by negroes upon white girls—two in New Jersey and in New York state—brings home to us the problem that is troubling the south. One of these cases, near Albany, was so diabolic in its cruelty that only the quick wit and courage of a deputy sheriff saved the wretch from lynching by a mob of New York farmers.

These cases enforce the warning just given by Booker Washington to the members of his race. "We should," he said, "let the world know on all proper occasions that we consider no legal punishment too severe for the wretch of any race who attempts to outrage a woman."

The severest legal punishment—even the death penalty—is not enough. It should be as swiftly executed as is consistent with the "due process of law." The law in every state should provide for an immediate trial in these cases. The deterrent effect of legal punishment is greatly enhanced by having it follow the crime quickly. "Justice delayed is justice denied" in these cases, both to the state and to the poor victims and their parents and friends.

Some severe examples of the swiftness and extreme rigor of the law such as recorder Hackett gave to the garroters some years ago, breaking up the gang in terror, are now needed alike for the protection of women and for the prevention of lynchings.

Newspaper Misfits.

There are occasional instances where people in possession of some type, a printing press and the other adjuncts used in publishing a newspaper, imagine that the only way they can get up in the world is by pulling someone else down. Or, like the cur, are not content unless nagging at the heels and by bark calling attention to their absorbing personality—and their business, yet as if the public cared one whit.

Self respecting people don't do it—it is not done in other business. The merchant does not go about with a chip on his shoulder inviting someone to knock it off or talking so the town can hear it that Tom, Dick and Harry, his competitors, don't do much, keep a rotten class of goods in fact, by inference, should not be patronized.

No, business men don't do that. They consider their own affairs sufficient to engage their attention. And the public is not blind, is aware of the motive that prompts such selfish, unkind and entirely uncalled for newspaper conduct.
