BUSINESS COLLEGE ESTABLISHED HERE

T. S. Haroun, L. L. D., today informed a Guard reporter that he intended establishing a business college in Eugene. The school will be ready for business on or about the 15th of September, the beginning of the school year in this city.

Mr. Haroun is a graduate of some of the best schools and is fully capable of conducting such an institution in our midst.

He has not completed arrangements for the location of the college but the old Christian church, on East Ninth street, is about the only place to open up and the first of the term will probably be held there.

The courses will be the standard business courses used in Armstrong's business colleges throughout the United States. Penmanship, stenography, book-keeping and type-writing will be among these.

The school is the only thing needed to complete the list of educational advantages in Eugene. The High School, University and public schools make a complete education in the classics, but the business education is not to be had here. The establishment of the business college will, indeed, be the filling of a "long felt want."
