SUPPOSED SUI- CIDE AT ROSEBURG

**Miss Ida Page's Body Found By
Side of Railroad Track This
Morning.**

(Guard Special Service.)

Roseburg, Aug. 5.—The dead body
of Miss Ida Page, aged 18 years, re-
siding in Roseburg, was found by pas-
senger early this morning half a mile
south of the city lying by the side of
the railroad track.

There were no marks on the body
indicating violence nor no signs of
a struggle.

It is supposed she took poison with
suicidal intent, but no reason is as-
signed for the act.

To ascertain the cause of death a
post mortem examination of the body
will be held this afternoon.

Crops Around Junction.

Junction City, Or., Aug. 4.—Hay
harvest is now about over and thresh-
ing will begin next week. Already
the hum of the thresher has been
heard here, but the only thing doing
the clearing of grass seeds. Peaches,
plums and watermelons are on the
market, and are all plentiful. New
potatoes are in fine condition and the
yield is up to the average. The
prune and pear crops will be heavy
and in many instances the trees are
being shaken by hand to remove a
portion of the fruit so the size will
be increased of that which remains.

Bloodhounds on Trail.

Placerville, Cal., Aug. 4.—C. C.
Senett arrived here yesterday with
two bloodhounds which are the same
which trailed Tracy through the wilds
of Washington and Oregon. The
dogs will be put on the freest scent
obtainable.

POPE PIUS THE TENTH

Rome, Aug. 4.—"We firmly be-
lieve that he will be our successor."

So said Pope Leo XIII early in
April referring to Cardinal Priest
Giuseppe Sarto, Patriarch of Venice.
The aged Pontiff is known to have
meditated long and earnestly on the
choice of a new Pope. The circum-
stance of His Holiness' mention of
Cardinal Sarto are interesting.
Father Lorenzo Perosi, musical direc-
tor of the Sistine Chapel, and a favor-
ite of the Pope, was conversing with
him, when the Pope asked for news
of Cardinal Sarto.

"Hold him very dear, Perosi,"
said Leo XIII. "In the future he
will be able to do much for you." Then
followed the definite prediction of
his succession.

Cardinal Sarto is a great preacher,
and a reformer of a type after the
former Pontiff's own heart. As a
member of the congregation of Sacred
Relics and Studies he caused the des-
truction of many so called relics ven-
erated as remains of saintly persons,
because their authenticity was open
to doubt. He is also a member of the
congregations of Bishops and
Regulars, Sacred Rites and Indul-
gences.

Cardinal Sarto's whole life in the
church has been that of a parish
priest. Born at Reize, in Northern
Italy, in 1835, he was educated first in
the seminary of the home diocese and
then at the Sacred Theological, in
Rome. He began work as a priest in
Venice and became cardinal and
patriarch of that province as late as
1893. He is well known as a writer
and has shown a genius for organiza-
tion.

It was Sarto who turned the career
of Don Lorenzo Perosi to the church.
Perosi has won great fame as a com-
poser of sacred music, and encouraged
by Pope Leo and Cardinal Sarto he
has worked a definite reform in the
music of the Catholic church at large.

COURT GIVES \$1000 FOR ROAD

(Daily Guard, August 5.)

The county commissioners' court is
now in monthly session. About the
most important matter attended to
today was the giving of \$1000 towards
building the road from Cottage Grove
to the Black Butte mines, a distance
of 16 1/2 miles.

A committee of citizens interested
in the road, consisting of W. B. Den-
nis, Darwin Bristow, Messrs Geer
and Woodward, appeared before the
court and stated that over \$1100 had
been raised by private subscription
and asked the court to appropriate
\$1250. The court, however, decided
that \$1000 was all that would be ex-
pendable to give.

SCHOOL DISTRICT DIVISION.

The matter of dividing the Bethel
school district northwest of town, was
brought up. A petition for and a
remonstrance against division were
presented. The remonstrance contained
more names than the petition and the
matter was postponed. L. Bilyeu ap-
peared as attorney for the petitioners.

ROAD DAMAGES.

In the matter of \$100 damages
claimed by F. B. Chase in the build-
ing of the Patterson road north of
Eugene, the court agreed to allow \$50
if the petitioners would pay the
other \$50. The matter was laid over
till some other time.

Jerome Knox, representing the
Veatch estate, appeared before the
court in regard to the claim for \$500
damages asked by the estate in build-
ing the road from Cottage Grove to
Lucerne. The court asked for more
time to consider the matter.

Foreign Corporation Certificate.

There was filed with County Clerk
Lee yesterday by the Oregon Securi-
ties Company, the big Bohemia min-
ing concern, a certificate of authority
to transact business in this state, in
accordance with the foreign corpora-
tion law passed at the last session of
the legislature.

This is the first certificate of this
kind filed here. The document shows
that the company has paid to Secre-
tary of State Dunbar the \$50 filing
fee and the annual license of \$200, the
amount required on the company's
\$5,000,000 capital.

The Oregon Securities Company is
incorporated under the laws of the
state of New Jersey.

Taken to Frisco.

Ed. L. Gibson, sergeant of police in
San Francisco, arrived in Eugene Sun-
day, armed with the necessary requi-
sition papers from Gov. Chamberlain,
and left that afternoon with E. B.
Honsaker, who is wanted in the Bay
City for embezzlement, and who was
arrested and detained here last week
by the local officers.

MAGNIFICENT BARS OF PURE GOLD

The sight of over \$10,000 in pure
gold, virgin gold, without the stamp
of the government on, in bars yet
begrimed with the smoke of the
smelter, attracted a crowd about the
windows of Luckey's jewelry store
this morning.

It was the exhibition of July clean-
up of the Lucky Boy mines of the
Blue River district. The two gold
bars weighed 40 pounds and are
valued at more than \$11,000 rough
weight.

Frank Sharkey arrived from the
mines this morning with the month's
clean up. He reports the mines
flourishing and exhibited the pure
gold to back up his assertion.
Blue River will come to the front in short
order at this rate. The exhibition
of the bars of gold in a conspicuous
place in San Francisco or Seattle
would bring a rush to Lane county
that would remind one of the days of
'49 in California, or the more recent
rushes to the Klondike regions.

The mines have not been given the
proper publicity but, in spite of this
fact, they are well known through-
out the state as valuable properties
and are destined to become more
and more famous as the months roll by.

The cleanup is nothing unusual.
The mines produce sometimes more
and sometimes less than the July
output. It is an average cleanup and
has been going on for the past
year and more. The Lucky Boy
property is well developed and doing
fine work. It is being improved by
its owners continually and the camp
is always the scene of great activity.
There should be forty such camps in
the Blue River district.

C. C. HAMMOND ELECTED CAPTAIN

(Daily Guard, August 5.)

As announced Company "A," First
Separate Battalion, O. N. G., held
an election of officers last evening in
the company room. Captain J. M.
Williams, of Company "C," con-
ducted the election which resulted
in naming Creed C. Hammond,
first lieutenant of the company, for
captain and Ray Babb and Frank
Drew for first and second lieutenants
respectively.

The selection of Mr. Hammond for
the important post is the reward of
merit for he has always shown a deep
interest in the welfare of the com-
pany and since he has been lieuten-
ant in the company has exhibited a
complete knowledge of military tac-
tics and knows how to command his
men properly.

All three of the newly elected offi-
cers served with distinction in the U.
S. volunteer army in the Philippines
during the war with Spain and the
Filipino insurrection.

Captain-elect Hammond was a mem-
ber of the First Nebraska regiment
and Lieutenants-elect Babb and Drew
of the Second Oregon, the former a
member of Co. "C" and the latter of
Co. "B." Like Capt. Hammond, the
new lieutenants have always taken
great interest in promoting the wel-
fare of the company.

There is no doubt but that the
newly elected officers will qualify
before the examiners.

After the election the members of
the company were treated to a first-
class banquet at the Banquet Cafe.
The bill of fare was most elaborate
and the enjoyment of the same was
unlimited. Speeches by the newly
elected officers present were made and
rousing responses by loyal subordi-
nates were the order of the evening.

In the weekly bulletin of the U. S.

MURDERER LYNCHED

William Hamilton Strung
Up at Asotin, Wash.,
Last Night.

Confessed the Murder of Little
abel Richards Near An-
atone, Idaho, Last
Sunday.

Lewiston, Idaho, Aug. 5.—William
Hamilton, aged 24 years, confessed
yesterday to murder and mutilation
of Mabel Richards, the 13-year-old
girl, whose body was found near
Anatone Monday afternoon. The
child was waylaid by Hamilton while
en route to Sunday school. Hamil-
ton is in jail at Asotin. In all prob-
abilities he will be mobbed tonight,
as hundreds of people are now re-
ported to be assembling in the town.
The dead girl was the daughter of
Sheriff Richards, of Asotin county.
Hamilton is a farmer, who has resided
in the county for a number of years.

The body was found in a thicket
near Anatone by a party of searchers.
The girl had been killed by a blow
on the head with a heavy club which
was lying near the body. She lay in
a pool of blood, while all around
were traces of a terrible struggle,
showing that the girl had fought for
her honor.

MURDERER LYNCHED.

LATER.—A mob broke into the jail
at Asotin, Wash., about 12-15 last
night and lynched Hamilton by
strangling him up across a guy wire
which crosses the street and joins
electric light poles. Sheriff Richards,
father of the murdered girl, early in
the evening swore in 25 deputies to
guard the murderer from the fury of
the mob, but the officers were swept
aside as chaff in the wild rush of the
excited populace. Crowds from sur-
rounding villages augmented by over
500 men from Lewiston filled Asotin
until nothing short of soldiery could
have saved Hamilton's neck.

kinds of picnic enjoyments to all who
go. There will, no doubt, be a huge
attendance from Eugene on both
these excursions.

The time of the trains will be an-
nounced later. The officials have
dubbed the event the "Harvest excur-
sion."

HORACE MCKINLEY WILL RETURN

Portland Journal: A letter re-
ceived by Dan Tarpley, who is associ-
ated with Horace G. McKinley in the
timber business, states that Mr.
McKinley expected to leave La
Crosse, Wis., on July 31 or August
1, and will therefore be in Portland
not later than the middle of this
week. He will be accompanied by
Abner Withee, son of the well known
Wisconsin timberman, Senator Withee,
and Hascal and Ted Withee, nephews
of the senator. Senator Withee is
owner of large tracts of Oregon tim-
ber land, and Hascal Withee, his
nephew, has not less than half a mil-
lion dollars worth of timber lands in
this state.

Mr. McKinley has been in La
Crosse since leaving Portland, that
city being his home. Mr. Tarpley
has also received word from Miss
Marie Ware, who is in Denver, and
has been there since she went from
here. Miss Ware expects to come to
Portland during the coming month
or two, before the time set for the
case in which she is a defendant in
the Federal court.
