JUNCTION CITY CASUALTIES

Strome Boy's Experience in an Exciting Runaway—Two Accidents.

Junction City, Or., Aug. 5.—Glenn, the eight-year-old son of Chris Strome, took a wild ride behind a runaway team at an early hour Monday morning. The team was hitched to a hay wagon and the driver, noticing something wrong with the harness, got down to adjust the harness, leaving Glenn on the wagon. The horses at once dashed away, headed for Junction City, over two miles away, and in their flight turned sharp curves, crossing railway tracks and passed teams in the road. The boy held on until the wagon bounced over the Southern Pacific tracks here, when he lost his hold and fell far enough away to insure safety. No damage was sustained.

A kick from a colt laid open the flesh on the forehead of the two-year-old boy of George Templeton Sunday. Several stitches by a surgeon were required to remedy the accident. The same day the little daughter of Willis Miller held open a gate, through which her father attempted to drive with a team and wagon. CAPITALISTS TO VISIT BOHEMIA

Heavily Interested in the Oregon Securities Co.—Will be There by the 12th.

A party of twelve heavy capitalists of New York, Boston, Philadelphia and North Adams, is booked to arrive at Cottage Grove on the 12th inst., and at that point will be met by Portland citizens who will join them in an excursion to the Bohemia gold mines, says the Telegram. Among the Portlanders of the party will be Frederick Eggert, C. H. Thompson, L. Y. Keady and others interested largely in the gold mines in that portion of Lane county.
The visitors are all stockholders in what is known as the Oregon Securities Company, which, last year, absorbed the mines known as Helena No. 1, Helena No. 2, Musick and Cornucopia. The eastern men are said to represent capital well up among the millions, and their idea is to examine the conditions with a view to developing the mines on a large scale. They are already largely interested in the Oregon & Southeastern Railroad Company, which is building the railroad up Row River to a point 20 miles east of Cottage Grove.
