The Willamette Valley Baseball League arrived at its death yesterday afternoon with the defeat of Roseburg by Salem, the game being forfeited by the Southern aggregation because Jay McCormick, of Salem, the notorious arbitrator of the diamond, in the umpire's box, was pushed on to the umpire.

This makes twenty-four games played by all the clubs of the league. The percentage of victories places the teams of Salem first, Roseburg second, Eugene third and Albany at the foot. The outcome of the contests was not known until yesterday. Eugene had a chance for the pennant up to the last two games. Roseburg had a chance for the coveted trophy up to the last game. Salem played on defense and won. The Eagles had all kinds of players from Portland to back them up and with the umpire thrown in we do not blame Roseburg for not wishing to go against an unfair deal. The umpire might at least have been neutral.

The whole series has been a source of immense pleasure and amusement among the fans of the valley cities. While there is a slight deficit it will be made up cheerfully by the towns and every one will look forward to the opening of next season. It is hoped that Eugene will have as good a team as she had this year at the last. If they had been signed two weeks earlier, there would have been nothing but victory for us in the end.

However, we will try to take defeat gracefully, knowing that only superior teams were allowed to defeat us excepting on one or two occasions. We have a feeling of satisfaction of having done conscientious work and hope to be able to do the same next year.

NEW ELECTRIC COMPANY'S PLANT

(Daily Guard, August 3.)

A Guard reporter visited the thriving little city of Springfield yesterday and noted the various stages of improvements which have been going on recently in that burg. From the number of new roofs and unpainted houses, freshly gravelled streets, new sidewalks, cross-walks and other improvements, it was not hard to infer that Springfield is thriving.

The site of the Lane County Electric Company's new generating station showed that active work was well under way. The foundation of the building is about completed and the immense rock supporters for the heavy dynamos and engines are about done. The great boilers, which will generate the steam to run the dynamos are on the ground and the site is strewn with steel plates, jointures, cable, cement and all the building appliances which are necessary to the construction of such a big venture.

The line of poles which will support the cables which will transmit the electricity to Eugene for lighting and power purposes, have been erected from the site of the plant in Springfield, to Willamette street, on Thirtieth, Eugene. They make an imposing row of poles.

The company is employing men and the Springfield mill is engaged in getting out the big timbers for the building. The time necessary for the completion of the giant plant will not be long. It is said that the entire work will be completed in three months.

The big lake was being filled with logs from the tributaries of the Upper Willamette. The Hill drive of 3,000,000 feet was being floated in. This supply enables the big mill to commence sawing lumber again today. It has been idle for several days.

Citizens of Springfield can well feel that they have a substantial growth and a bright future. Real estate is on the move and bargains made every day with choice lots.

Another saloon man appeared this morning before City Recorder Dorris and plead guilty to being a proprietor of a house where gambling was conducted and paid his fine of \$50 for the offense.

The residents of East Eleventh street have secured sprinkling for the entire street, up to the University campus. Wagon hydrants have been erected at intervals of two blocks on that street.

Archie Vorce has commenced suit in the Lane county circuit court against Cassie Vorce for a decree to forever dissolve the bonds of matrimony existing between them. They were married in Lincoln, Neb., in April, 1900, and have no children. Vorce alleges that in June, 1901, his wife deserted him and has since lived apart and separate from him and refuses to live and cohabit with him. Chas. M. Kiesinger is his attorney.

The city has let the contract for the construction of three bridges, those crossing Patterson, Hilyard and Alder streets, which have been condemned by the street commissioner, to G. W. Taylor. Mr. Taylor's contract calls for \$505 for the three bridges. Mr. Taylor says he will have them done in two weeks. The specifications call for cement abutment work, 14 feet in width, to be 4½ feet above water and the tops to be painted.

LONG LIVE THE POPE

Cardinal Sarto of Venice Elected to Succeed Leo.

The Pope-Elect was Favorite of Dead Pope—Is Sixty-Eight Years of Age

(Scripps News Association.)

Rome, Aug. 4.—At 11:40 o'clock this forenoon Cardinal Macchi appeared on the outside portico of the vatican.

The multitude assembled in front thereof, estimated at twelve thousand, immediately became silent as the Cardinal's bearing with the feeling that another Pope had been elected. Cardinal Macchi at once announced that Joseph Sarto, Cardinal and Patriarch of Venice, had been elected Pope and had taken the name of Pius X.

Five minutes afterward the new Pope appeared on the portico and blessed the expectant throng.

Joseph Sarto was born at Riese, Italy, June 2nd, 1835, being now in his sixty-ninth year. He began to study for the priesthood at his native place and passed to the college of Castle, France, where he was ordained a priest.

Although young he was given the parish of Tombolo, then in 1867 transferred to a larger and more important parish.

Bishop Treviso recognizing the great merit of the young priest, made him canon of the cathedral, where he became vicar general.

Was made Bishop of Mantova in 1881. In this place his cleverness and understanding showed to such advantage that he soon came into prominence.

In 1893 Sarto was made Patriarch and Cardinal of Venice at the same time.

His great and unassuming charities have won him multitudes of friends among all classes.

Sarto was greatly loved by the late Pope Leo, who believed he would succeed him as head of the papacy.

Sarto was a compromise candidate. All the Rampolla votes, the leading candidate on previous ballots, went to Sarto and made his election assured. He received forty-five votes.

There is great rejoicing among the people over the choice. It is believed that he will end the friction between the Papacy and the Italian government by renouncing even the shadow of temporal power.

Eloped With Convict.

(Scripps News Association.)

Portland, August 4.—Mrs. Elliott Parkhurst, a young wife of twenty-six, eloped last night with Harry Riley, an ex-convict.

The police are looking for the eloping couple. They are thought to have gone to Seattle.

Mrs. Parkhurst is a daughter of ex-warden Jones of the Salem penitentiary, her mother being a sister of ex-Governor Geer's wife.

Riley served two years in San Quentin and was again sentenced to five years at Salem.

While incarcerated at Salem he first met Mrs. Parkhurst, who fell in love with the convict at first sight and thereafter made frequent and regular visits to the penitentiary whenever allowed to see Riley.

Last Saturday Riley was released from the penitentiary.

Presumably on his wife's initiative Mr. Parkhurst met Riley, in total ignorance of course of his wife's love for the man. Parkhurst became interested in the convict and took him to his home.

Late Saturday night while going home Parkhurst was assaulted by Riley and nearly beaten to death.

A cab drove up, Mrs. Parkhurst appeared on the scene, both as if by appointment, she and the convict got in and were driven off. That was the last seen of them.

Riley had told friends that he intended going to Seattle for a few days, then to his old home in Chicago. Parkhurst, who is well-to-do, is an ex-deputy sheriff and has a wide and favorable acquaintance about Salem.
