HOTEL SAFE STOLEN

Seattle Robbers Carried Off 500-Pound Safe Today.

New York Stock Market Feverish—Another Folsom Escaped Captured

Seattle, Aug. 6.—The boldest crime of the many at the hands of the criminal element now operating in the main Northwest towns was perpetrated here this morning.

Shortly before five o'clock, unknown robbers entered the well-known Washington Hotel, located in the business center of the town.

They broke into the bar-room and stole and carried the five hundred pound safe to the sidewalk at Fourth and Madison streets. From that point they rolled it down Madison street to Third avenue then on to a vacant corner lot.

They inserted powder but the noise of the explosion brought the police to the scene when the robbers made a hasty escape without having obtained any booty.

The men left no clue, but the police believe three persons were engaged in the attempted robbery.

Roberts was dressed as a tramp and submitted to capture without a struggle. It is believed he formed a part of the Weber Creek gang.

Three other convicts are believed to be below Davisville and within sixty miles of San Francisco.

Halsey is Recovering From the Fire

Halsey, Or., Aug. 6.—Since the disastrous fire of Friday evening the business men have been at their wits' end to secure even temporary places to open up their stocks. Last Saturday Jeremiah's carriage shop was a behemoth of industry. For the time it accommodated the meat market, barber shop and shoe shop. H. W. Davis has just completed a temporary frame structure to be covered with cloth, which will enclose a stock of drugs now on the road. The post-office is in the harness shop, but Postmaster Stewart is making arrangements today to have it removed into a temporary building on Front street. The creamery, of which nothing was saved of value, except a cream testing apparatus, will likely be rebuilt in the fall.

Lack of Harmony.

Washington, Aug. 6.—President Roosevelt strongly disapproves of the kind of men that have been recommended for certain offices by senators of both Oregon and Washington, and unless these Senators can show that official information now in his possession is incorrect and does not fairly describe the men in question, they will have to make new recommendations.

The president is not willing to make John W. Knowles register of the La Grande land office, although repeatedly urged to do so by the two Oregon senators.

Cherry Pits in His Appendix.

New York, Aug. 4.—Nearly 100 cherry pits have been found in the appendix of a patient who was being operated upon in a Brooklyn hospital. The collection of the stones had not caused appendicitis however. Their discovery was due to an operation for cancer of the stomach. What might have been the ultimate effect the doctors are unwilling to guess. Not only the appendix, but a large space of the intestines were filled with the pits. After the cancerous growth had been cut away, the surgeons took away the pits, and the patient quickly recovered.

Crowning Next Sunday.

Rome, Aug. 6.—The coronation of Pius X. will take place next Sunday, according to the decision of the cardinals yesterday. The Pope can't sign bills until crowned, hence the early date has been decided upon.

MORE LANDS WITHDRAWN

Roseburg, Aug. 6.—Telegraphic instructions have been received at the U. S. land office in Roseburg from Acting U. S. Land Commissioner Fimple, at Washington, D. C., directing the withdrawal from entry of 380,100 acres of land, bordering on the Cascade Forest Reserve and situated in Linn, Lane and Douglas counties. The land withdrawn comprises the following townships:

Linn county—Township 14 and half of 15, in range 4 east.

Lane county—Half of townships 15, 16 and 17, in range 4 east; townships 22 and 23, in range 1 west.

Douglas county—Townships 25 to 31 inclusive, in range 1 west; townships 28 and 29 in range 2 west, and south half of township 28 in range 3 west.

All but four townships, two in Douglas and two in Linn, are unsurveyed land and most of it has been filed upon. Over 100 persons in Roseburg and vicinity have made filings on the Douglas county portion of the withdrawal. It is of course apparent that this land is set aside from entry to extend the Cascade reserve. The land is in the roughest section of the Cascade region, but the timber on it is of the very best quality. Much of the unsurveyed portions had been located on by squatters who had built cabins thereon.

WAGON ROAD COMPLETED

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 5.—The \$200,000 road improvement from the Red Bridge, end of the Bohemia railroad, to the Bohemia warehouse, a distance of 12 miles, has just been completed. The county cost furnished \$1000 and the citizens of Cottage Grove subscribed the balance. This is a very valuable improvement for the Bohemia district and a large amount of mining machinery now at the depot in this city for the Bohemia district will be shipped to the end of the railroad, which is now completed 18 miles out, and thence be taken into the mines by teams over the new wagon road. A carload of machinery for the electric plant that is being installed in the Bohemia mining district by the Oregon Securities Company, has been side tracked here and will leave shortly for the mines.

TEACHRE'S INSTITUTE

Good Attendance, Interest and Enthusiasm During the First Day's Sessions.

(Daily Guard, August 4.)

The annual Lane county teachers' institute opened this morning under the direction of County Superintendent W. M. Miller in the courthouse. The registration certificates filed with the superintendent show an attendance of 84 teachers at the morning session. More than this number will be in attendance registered by night. It is thought that at least 100 teachers will be in attendance tomorrow.

This is an excellent showing among the educators of Lane county and the superintendent is pleased with the record.

The exercises opened with singing "America," which was followed by an interesting reading by President B. F. Mulkey, principal speaker of the first day. City Superintendent Bechtold conducted a High School department for the benefit of the teachers of the higher grades, separately from the main institute. All the subjects treated in the institute were well handled by those assigned to their presentation.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Superintendent Adams, a well known instructor, ably discussed various methods of instruction of the youth shortly after the opening of the afternoon session, at 1:30 o'clock. President Mulkey discussed "Nature work in the schools."

The second day of the Lane county teachers' institute has passed and another successful session recorded. This morning President Mulkey, of Ashland, treated the subjects of Reading and Algebra; Superintendent Ackerman spoke on and illustrated his methods of instruction in Spelling and Geography. Superintendent Adams, of Albany, was an interesting speaker on the English branches. This afternoon the feature of the session was the lecture of Mr. Ackerman on "Methods." He also made a clear statement regarding a uniform course of study which he has been trying to establish over the state for several years.

LECTURES THIS EVENING.
Mr. Ackerman will lecture in the courthouse this evening on the subject, "The Trend, What is It?" The public is invited as well as the teachers.

Today ends the three days' session of the Lane county teachers' institute and it proved to be one of the most interesting sessions of the series. The subjects treated were of vital interest, well handled and full of meat to the young men and women whose duties consist of directing the education of the youth of the county.

Last evening Superintendent Ackerman's address on "The Trend; What is It?" was attended by all the teachers and a number of residents of Eugene. It was an instructive lecture and showed the trend of the times toward better things, better education, less illiteracy, more ambition and greater achievements. Mr. Ackerman is a pleasant speaker and was followed with close attention.

At the close of the session this afternoon the teachers were shown about the city, visited the University and listened to Dr. Thos. Condon, the veteran geologist, explain his wonderful collection of specimens in his line. They also visited the Patterson and Geary schools, inspected the new High School and several took the trip to the summit of Skinner's Butte.

All the teachers visiting here have expressed themselves as being delighted with their visit and pleased with Eugene. The homes of the city have been thrown open and hospitality extended right royally. In all, the impression has been a good one for our city.

The register of teachers showed a total of 176 in attendance at the institute.

There will be no lecture this evening. The final session ended this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

TO THE NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT

Commander John Ingham, of the J. W. Geary Post, G. A. R., Eugene, has succeeded in inducing the railway companies to extend the limit time of excursion tickets to the national encampment of the G. A. R. to be held in San Francisco the latter part of this month.

Originally the tickets were good for August only and return had to be made before the 31st of this month. The change adds a month and a half to the value of the tickets and returns from the encampment do not now have to be made before the 15th of October. The extension is a most welcome one because many who wished to spend a longer time in the Golden State could not see their way clear to buy the excursion ticket and have to return immediately after the encampment.

The tickets will be on sale at the Southern Pacific depot for three days, August 13, 14 and 15, Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week. The trip can be commenced on any of these days to San Francisco from Eugene.

GREAT PREPARATIONS IN OREGON.

Mr. Ingham says that he has assurances from about 30 veterans who are intending to take the trip from Eugene. This number will probably be greatly increased when the information that the time on tickets has been extended to the middle of October.

In San Francisco magnificent preparations are being made for the entertainment of the G. A. R. veterans. The state has appropriated several thousand dollars, the city of San Francisco has added to this and in all \$75,000 has been raised for the entertainment of the members of the National Encampment. This means that the veterans are to be treated in royal style during their stay in California. That state has entertained thousands of visitors satisfactorily and will make no exception of this event.

BUSINESS COLLEGE'S PROSPECTS BRIGHT

Prof. F. S. Haroun, principal of the new Eugene Business College, today informed a Guard reporter that the prospects for a large attendance at the college this fall are exceedingly bright.

The professor said: "I have been figuring on securing 50 students for the opening of the college the middle of next month and have already secured about 35. That many I am sure of. I have no doubt that by the time the school opens there will be many more students enrolled than I anticipated."

Took Carbolic Acid.

The post mortem examination of Ida Page, whose body was found near Roseburg yesterday morning, was conducted by Drs. Twitchell, DuGas and Fisher. Evidence of carbolic acid was discovered in the girl's stomach, which undoubtedly disclosed the agency of death. The bottle which had contained the deadly liquid had previously been found near the spot where the body lay.

Deceased was the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Page, of North Roseburg, and was born Jan. 7, 1885.

So far the only theory advanced for the girl's despondency, is unrequited affection. The funeral was held from the family residence this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Leased Hotel.

C. D. Edwards, the well known former Eugene newspaper man, at one time city editor of the Guard, writes us that he has leased the Hotel Sparks at Blue River, and places an advertisement in the Daily Guard. Mr. Edwards no doubt will make a success of the business. He intends to make the Sparks the most popular stopping place on the upper McKenzie.

Sam Morris, the Indian pitcher of the Salem team, won the game for Portland from Sacramento yesterday by the score of 9 to 8 in ten innings. Morris distinguished himself by making a home run, a double play unassisted and a two-base hit. Morris had hard work for his victory as the Portland team bunched viciously and allowed Sacramento to tie the score in the eighth. Had not the errors been so numerous Sacramento's score would have been very much smaller.

THE FIRE BUG AT ASHLAND

Set Three Fires Last Night With \$5000 Loss.

People Were Placed in a State of Nervousness for Fear the Town Would be Wiped Out.

Ashland, Or., Aug. 6.—Three incendiary fires occurred in Ashland last night, the last one near midnight, and the townspeople, when it was realized that some incendiary fiends were trying to burn it out, were placed in a state of nervousness never before experienced.

About 10 o'clock the storeroom of the Ashland Manufacturing Company was discovered on fire, plainly incendiary, and \$2000 worth of doors and sash went up in smoke very quickly. The water service of the company alone prevented the destruction of the big plant with thousands of dollars worth of lumber this fire been extinguished when an alarm was called to the Hammond Meat Packing Company's warehouse. Here the fire was happily discovered in its incipency, and it was shown by the arrangements to have been a carefully planned incendiarism.

Immediately afterward the fire companies were summoned to a fire at F. H. Carter's place in the north suburban district. Mr. Carter is vice-president of the Ashland bank and had a finely equipped barn. This had been set on fire in three places, and a fine team of horses and a large amount of farming machinery and vehicles were licked up in the flames.

The losses for the night will amount to over \$5000, insurance partial.

SEWER CUTTINGS.

Show How the River Ran Through Eugene Many Years Ago.

Some day, how long ago is immaterial, the Willamette river had its channel through the central and business part of Eugene.

The sewer excavation through the alley between Oak and Pearl street gives incontestable evidence that the main channel of the river once ran through the courthouse and park lots. Why the assertion? Simply because the gravel in the sewer trench for about a block there is very large while on each side north and south, it is fine. This far up the valley the Willamette and other streams having their source in the Cascade mountains carry little fine gravel in their channels, it is nearly all coarse rock. What becomes of the finer gravel? It is washed down the river to find lodgment where the current is no longer strong enough to carry it, else carried over the banks during flood stages to settle in slacker currents. That very coarse washed rock you see about the courthouse part of the sewer could not have been moved otherwise than by strong currents. It never was out of the main channel of the river till the river changed that channel to some other locality.

Oregon Mineral Springs.

Levi Geer, proprietor of the Oregon Mineral Springs at London, twelve miles south of Cottage Grove, was in Eugene yesterday.
