NO RACE IS DECLARED

Reliance Makes the best Showing in the Yacht Races.

Twenty-six Thousand People on Craft of All Kinds Watch the Great International Sporting Event.

New York, Aug. 20.—After a long slow try at completing the 30-mile course inside the prescribed six-hour limit, the officials declared no race for the day between the Reliance, defender of the cup, and Shamrock III, the British challenger.

There were immense throngs in the city especially to watch the contest which is international in interest. From river and ocean craft alone fully 26,000 people watched the dim outlines of the competing yachts through the rain which fell during the early part of the race.

The Waldorf Astoria Hotel has the biggest registration in its history. Six hundred guests from all parts of the world are housed there. One party is all the way from Japan purposely to watch the race.

THE RACE.

The boats took their positions tacking to and fro before the wind before the starting gun was fired. The Reliance was in first and Shamrock followed closely. The starting gun was fired at 11:06 amid the cheering of thousands. The Shamrock was as loudly cheered as the Reliance.

11:30—Hard rain has commenced falling, obscuring the view of the boats. Wireless messages from aboard steam yacht says wind is dying and the boats are almost drifting.

12:30—A sheen of misty outlines could be made out. The boats are beating to seaward, close together.

12:45—Impossible to see yacht. Wireless says Reliance is leading by one minute.

2:10—Wireless says that Reliance has an easy lead but the only trouble will be to finish inside the time limit. The wind suddenly increased in velocity, giving the Reliance greater lead.

3:37—The Reliance rounded the outer mark.

3:46—Race called off on account of the inability of yachts to finish inside the time limit. Reliance made a splendid showing in the Shamrock's own weather. Captain Barr of the Reliance, outgeneraled Captain Swing on board the Shamrock and secured every advantage.

A Swell Thug Caught.

The insurgents, however, are known to be very active and heavy fighting news is expected.

ON VERGE OF STARVATION

Several Hundred Miners of the Tanana District.

Several have Already Died and Many are Living only on Berries in the Woods.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 20.—A special dispatch to the Province from Dawson says that H. Bratnoder, a miner, arrived yesterday from the American Tanana with the story that several hundred miners are on the verge of starvation in the northern part of Tanana district. Several are said already to have died, and many of the living are sustaining their existence on berries.

Bratnoder passed through the district a fortnight ago, and he reports the condition of the miners as pitiable. He says that action was being taken to secure assistance from the United States Government.

Must be New Trial.

Portland, Aug. 19.—Judge Bellinger has set aside the verdict of the jury that awarded \$22,500 to Miss Birdie McCarty, against James Hereford, stock raiser and banker of Lake county, for breach of promise Judge Bellinger says:

"My conclusion is that this verdict is so grossly excessive as to imply that the jury acted under the influence of passion or prejudice and that it should be set aside. The motion to set aside the verdict and for a new trial is allowed."

A Brutal Murder.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 19.—When the moulders went to work in the Michigan Stone Works yesterday they found the body of 4-year-old Alphonse Welmsol lying back of the shop, both his hands tied behind him. There was a gag in his mouth, and he was disemboweled. His back was slashed open by a knife in a dozen places, and one eye was gouged out. No motive for the crime is known. His parents identified the body at the morgue.

Big Yield.

Salem, Aug. 19.—C. L. Humphreys, a farmer near Macleay, reports a yield from one of his fields of 52½ bushels of wheat per acre. The field contained 20 acres of summer fallow, which threshed out 1048 bushels of choice, full wheat. It was pastured down by sheep during the winter. Harvest is in full blast and grains turning out exceedingly well.

Sleepy Albany.

Here is a good one on Albany. It shows how slow the people are down there: Not long ago a party of Eugene people stopped in that city one morning on their way to Newport. They were walking around the town when they noticed a dense smoke in a certain part of the city. Surmising that a house was on fire the party ran to the scene of the smoke, a distance of several blocks. They found a house completely enveloped in flames, and Morris Schwarzschild, one of the party, ran back to the courthouse and rang the fire bell before there was a fire at all. The house was completely destroyed before the fire department arrived.

Eugene Ward, of Kings Valley, and Miss Rena Wood were married at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Brown, at Wells, Sunday. The ceremony was performed by Rev. S. M. Wood at 2:30 p. m., in the presence of a pleasant party of guests. Miss Wood is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Wood formerly of Benton, but now of the vicinity of Portland. Mr. and Mrs. Ward are to leave in a fortnight for Lowell, Lane county, to reside.—Corvallis Times.

Roy Hurlbut Again.

WATER COMPANY TAKES EXCEPTION

Dr. T. W. Harris, president of the Eugene Water Company, takes exception to the article appearing in the Portland Telegram the other day, written by that paper's Eugene correspondent, in which it is stated that the city water here is directly responsible for a great deal of sickness.

Dr. Harris brands the article in question as a malicious falsehood and declares the water furnished by the company to be pure.

He told a Guard reporter today that the water has time and again been analyzed and nothing wrong has been found with it.

"Prof. F. L. Washburn has analyzed the water both biologically and chemically and declared it to be pure; the state board of health has made an analysis of it and Dr. F. W. Prentice, of this city, has analyzed it almost every month for several years and found nothing wrong with it," said Dr. Harris.

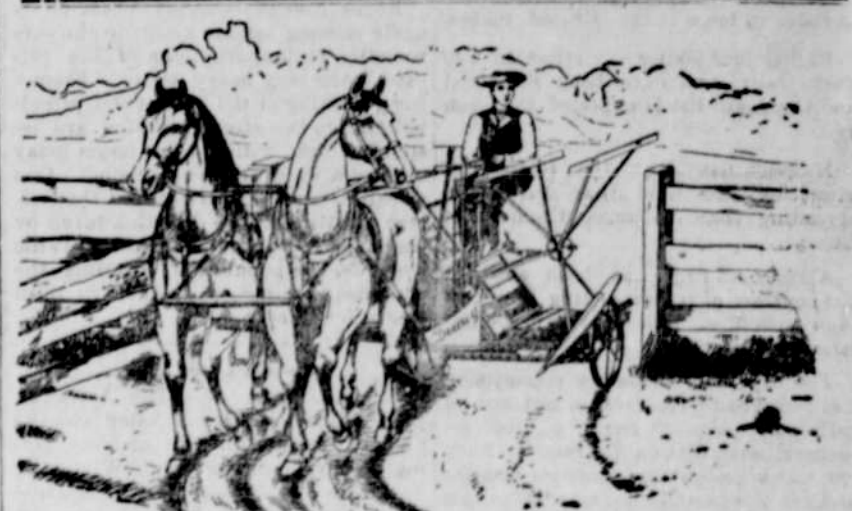
