

Miles as a Vote Getter.

General Miles' qualifications as a vote getter may be tested this fall in the state of Massachusetts, of which state he is a native and which is regarded as his home, although in his forty years of active service, he has been necessarily out of the state a great deal of the time.

The suggestion is made that General Miles be nominated for governor by the Democrats and from present indications this may be done. Col. William Gaston made the race last year and is very anxious to do so again, but may be induced to stand aside for General Miles.

The friends of General Miles point out that he would get the old soldier vote almost solid, regardless of party, and that public sympathy, resulting from the circumstances attending his retirement from the army, would operate greatly to his advantage at the polls. Further, that the Republican element which is opposed to Governor Bates would as willingly vote for General Miles as for Colonel Gaston.

These enthusiasts figure that under present conditions, while Colonel Gaston might win, General Miles would sweep the state and put him in line for the Democratic nomination for president or vice president. If elected governor of Massachusetts it is believed that he could carry the national convention in 1904 and as against President Roosevelt stand an excellent chance of winning the presidency. George Fred Williams, the Massachusetts member of the Democratic national committee, has not been favorable to the renomination of Colonel Gaston and his friends say he would welcome the advent of General Miles as a candidate.

A School of Journalism.

They may teach journalism, but they cannot make a journalist, says the Portland Telegram.

Appropos of the Pulitzer newspaper college, this represents the summary of the verdict reached by Chicago newspaper men—that which there are none brighter nor brainer in the country—when, some years ago, that astute Rockefeller advertiser, Dr. Harper, brought up the question of teaching newspaper work in Chicago University.

Savants in the business long ago concluded that the only way to learn journalism was to learn it in a newspaper office, where actual conditions, not theories, are met. The proposition of the publisher of the New York World to endow a \$2,000,000 school will arouse only languid interest among the members of the craft, for it will be extraordinary, indeed, if in forming the faculty journalists of the acceptable stripe are employed to direct the elementary training of the students.

It may be admitted that the standard of qualifications for newspaper workers might be elevated through an institution such as this. College-bred journalists are not notable successes on any of the leading dailies, and some of the most important positions in the professions are held by men who claim no alma mater.

There is nothing like the school of experience, the touch of Things as They Are—and men and the world at large—for instructing a writer in observation and the ability to write cleverly and easily comes from within not outwardly in.

Whitelaw Reid, named as one of the trustees of Pulitzer's school, prints in a current issue of his Tribune, a lecture he has delivered upon more than one occasion to young men who want to mount to fame through journalism. This is what he says:

I have little faith in "schools of journalism" or in "courses of journalism," or, if you must have the truth, in lectures on journalism, either. The only place to learn the newspaper business is in a newspaper office, and you have to be caught tolerably young to learn it at all!
