AMERICAN CONSUL IS ASSASSINATED

U. S. Government Insulted by Turkey.

Consul at Beirut, Syria Murdered while Driving.

Uncle Sam Will Send War Ships to the Scene and Demand a Full Investigation and Punishment of Assassins.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 27.—The most startling news for weeks was received by the government today by cablegram. It is to the effect that the United States Consul at Beirut, Syria, in the Turkish domains, was assassinated last Sunday afternoon while out driving in his carriage.

The news created intense excitement on account of the trouble which is going on in Turkey between the Bulgarian insurgents and the Turkish government.

The cablegram stated that Minister Lefshman immediately asked for a complete investigation of the affair and punishment of the assassin or assassins.

Admiral Cotton, in command of the American squadron of war vessels which was a recent visitor in German and English waters, has been notified by cable to prepare his fleet for action and hold it in readiness to proceed to Turkish waters on receipt of first news.

The excitement and indignation in Washington was increased by additional news that the murdered consul was subjected to inhuman cruelties and torture.

Turkey will have to answer for the outrage.

(Beirut, originally spelled Beyrout, is a small Syrian city near the Eastern coast of the Mediterranean Sea, 100 miles north of Jerusalem, and has but recently been a consular station. The consul stationed there, according to the 1903 World Almanac, was Gabriel B. Randall, of South Dakota.)

Turkey is on the verge of an upheaval which diplomats say will either end the tyrannical reign of the present Sultan or end his government. Inhuman atrocities have been occurring throughout the entire empire. Turkish soldiers have killed, mutilated and tortured victims time and again. The United States has heretofore escaped direct insult, but the killing and torture of an American consul will give this government an opportunity to take a hand.—Ed. Guard.)

Wife Will Not Confess.

Seattle, Aug. 27.—Mrs. Haynie, wife of the highwayman, who is accused of being his accomplice and of having full knowledge of his doings, will not confess. Haynie is still in jail here. The police say that she is as guilty as her husband and will be tried with him.

Fine Seedling Apples.

It is of medium size and of a deep red color, the handsomest apple ever seen. The judge says there were only two of its kind and has not sampled them yet, so he doesn't know how the flavor is. He intends to propagate the apple and expects to develop a fine variety. He says he will name it "Eve's Temptation."

Hops Bought.

Hall & Son, the merchants, purchased the Smeed crop of 1903 Fuggle hops today.

The consideration was 22 cents a pound. This is the first sale of 1903 hops made in the state. The price is indicative of good prices for 1903 hops.

Price for Picking Hops.

Hop growers have practically agreed to pay \$1 per hundred and 50 cents per box for picking hops this season. The general advance in the price of hops has made a fair margin for the growers are willing to share profits with the pickers. They are practically united upon the figure.

Forty and forty-five cents per box and 50 cents per hundred has been the prevailing price in recent years.

THE THIRD YACHT RACE CALLED OFF

COTTAGE GROVE OPEN ON SUNDAY

Highlands, N. Y., Aug. 27.—The third of the series of yacht races between the Shamrock and Reliance was called off this afternoon on account of the inability of either yacht to finish inside the time limit.

The start was made in hardly a knot of wind. The weather was gloomy and there was seen to be small chance of the yachts being able to race. The breeze brightened later and gained three knots.

The Reliance took the lead and crossed the outer mark in a mist a half a mile ahead of the Shamrock. A continuous series of jockeying attempts on the part of both yachts took place with the advantage, (of course) with the Reliance. It was his best exhibition of cleverness, according to yacht experts.

At 3 o'clock the Reliance is seen coming in still half a mile ahead of the Shamrock. The excitement is intense owing to the proximity of the time limit. The race is practically won and even the opponents hate to see it lost on account of time limit.

At 4:15 the regatta committee took its place at the finish. Reliance cannot finish in time. The Shamrock is 15 minutes behind.

4:20—The Reliance is three-quarters of a mile from the finish and the time is up. The Shamrock is laboring still 15 minutes in the rear.

INJURED IN A RUNAWAY

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

J. W. Chute, of San Francisco, representing the Gamewell fire alarm system, is in Eugene trying to induce the city authorities to adopt the system. He gave a demonstration of its workings last evening before members of the city council who seemed to be quite favorably impressed with it.

Mr. Chute recently put in the Gamewell system at Ashland and it seems to give satisfaction there. It is said that the board of fire underwriters has reduced the insurance rate at Ashland, 10 per cent, since the system was put in and no doubt an equal reduction could be had here if the city adopts the system. It would mean a big saving for everybody who takes out insurance.

HOW IT WORKS.

The Gamewell system works on the same principle as the alarm systems in most of the big cities. Alarm boxes are distributed over the city and when an alarm is turned in it is sounded at all three of the fire stations.

Fire Chief Yoran thinks it is just the thing for Eugene and recommends that it be purchased by the city.

The cost would be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$2000.

A Big Bone.

A huge bone apparently the hip bone of a mastodon of some kind, was picked up recently on the beach at Alsea. It was brought to Eugene this afternoon and attracted considerable attention. No one knew what animal it came from. It is as large as a mastodon thigh bone, yet is fresh enough to excrete oil. It weighs 7 pounds and is over three feet in length.

Dam Was Broken.

The big dam which has been gathering water in Fall Creek with which to wash out the immense supply of logs for the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, was broken by the workmen yesterday. The flood raised the water of the creek five feet and the drive lodged a considerable distance down the creek.

THREE BOYS RELEASED

Judge Walton Refuses to Hold Driver on Evidence.

The Three Boys Charged With Obstructing the United States Mail Cleared of Charges.

Deputy United States Marshal Robbins came up from Portland this morning accompanied by Attorney Mays, to look into the charge against Frank Hopkins, Wiley Driver and W. Jenny, holding up the United States mail wagon driven by Frank G. McMurry on the public highway, last Monday morning.

The case came up before United States Commissioner J. J. Walton in his office this morning. Lark Bilyeu appeared for the defendants and several witnesses were examined.

It was shown that Hopkins and Jenny had little or nothing to do with the case but that Driver had jumped out of the wagon, crossed in front of McMurry's horse, which stopped, and said, "Now you d—"

"Now you d—", we got you and I'm going to thrash you good." McMurry thereupon displayed a pistol and demanded that he be let alone. After a few more words he drove on.

The evidence went to show that there had been personal trouble and that there was no intent to hold up the United States mail, only incident to settling a personal quarrel.

The Commissioner reviewed the evidence and refused to hold young Driver upon request of the attorney.

All the boys were released from the charges.

WATER SYSTEM TRIED

(Daily Guard, August 27.)

The new water system which has been under course of construction under the direction of R. L. Jones, a student of the University, and an experienced man in the business, was completed yesterday and the water turned into the mains.

The first official trial was made this afternoon and a reporter of the Guard was invited to be present to witness the result. The pumps were started going in the new power station and the water sent jumping into the mains. A hose was attached to one of the hydrants near Villard Hall and when the water shot through the nozzle it was evident that it was powerful for it made hard work for one man to manage the hose.

The stream was shot towards the tall tower on top of Villard Hall and to the gratification of President Campbell and other spectators, went to the top and completely over the tower. In a few moments the power increased and shot a beautiful stream of water fully ten feet over the weather vane.

The same experiment was tried on Dundy Hall, and the water was easily sent over the top of the tall structure. The power may be better imagined when one realizes that city water turned on the same spot hardly reaches to the second story.

The new system makes a grand improvement in the irrigation of the lawns. Fully two-thirds of the time and work will be saved in taking care of the lawns. The protection from fire is self-evident.

The Gardiner Gazette says: "We are in receipt of a letter from Frank E. Alley, an abstractor at Roseburg, to the effect that the work of investigation now being directed by the special land agent in the Roseburg office is in many instances necessitating the postponement of final proof on timber and stone lands and that some of the notices of intention to make such proof will have to be republished."

U. S. Deputy Surveyor, Homer D. Angel, of The Dalles, is looking up the unsurveyed government lands in this section. Mr. Angel informed a Gazette reporter last week that he was not here to survey these lands just now, but to make a report on them and that they would quite likely be surveyed early next summer.—Gardiner Gazette.
