

ISTHMIAN SITUATION SERIOUS

Colombian Troops at Colon Refuse to Secede.

Soldiers Threaten to Burn City and Murder all Sympathiz- ers as Well as American Residents.

Panama, Nov. 5.—The situation on the Isthmus this morning is a most serious one. General Torres, commanding the Colombian troops at Colon, has refused to follow the example of Panama and secede from Colombia. He has threatened to send his troops from Colon to Panama in case the latter city doesn't surrender. It is reported that the Colombian soldiers at Colon have threatened to burn the city and murder all the sympathizers of the revolution as well as American residents.

The Americans have appealed for protection to the cruiser Nashville, which is in the Colon harbor, to protect American interests.

Washington, Nov. 5.—Admiral Glass' entire squadron now at Acapulco, Mexico, has been ordered by Secretary Moody to proceed to Panama for the protection of American lives and property, and to maintain an uninterrupted transit across the Isthmus. The squadron includes the Wyoming, the Marblehead, the Concord and the Boston. The latter ship is already on the way.

Secretary Hay and Admiral Walker, chairman of the canal commission, had a long conference with President Roosevelt today. Nothing was made public, but it is understood that Hay and Walker agree that the revolution will result in benefit to the United States.

The presence of the American cruiser at Colon is undoubtedly the only cause of avoidance of bloodshed. Should Torres carry out his threat and send troops to Panama they will be compelled to walk a great distance. The gunboats Padilla and Chacito left here today to search for the Colombian gunboat Bogota.

Colon, Nov. 5.—The United States gunboat Nashville is again preparing to land marines here.

Washington, Nov. 5.—A dispatch from Commander Hubbard from Colon says we have withdrawn all the forces that were landed on Wednesday. No bloodshed.

INDUSTRIAL REACTION

Washington, Nov. 5.—President Gompers at next Monday's meeting of the Federation of Labor, will sound a note of warning in his address, containing about twenty thousand words. He believes that the industrial reaction has set in and that labor must face this depression rather than to fight for a further increase of wages.

Baby Scalded to Death

Newberg, Or., Nov. 4.—The child of Mr. and Mrs. George Baird died yesterday as the result of a frightful accident. Mrs. Baird was doing the washing, and had a boiler of water on the stove. In moving around the stove she accidentally pushed the boiler off, upsetting the scalding contents upon their 14-month-old baby, which, without the knowledge of its mother, had crawled up near the stove. The little one was horribly scalded, and died from its injuries yesterday. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the home.

Wool and Hop Sales.

Oakland, Or., Nov. 5.—Messrs. Faber and Nels, of Albany, this week purchased the entire 1903 crop of hops raised by D. W., R. L.,

George J. and A. F. Stearns, paying 16 and 21 cents per pound for them. The hops are now being delivered at the depot, and will be shipped in a few days. The entire crop of these gentlemen amounts to 254 bales. The yield in the Stearns yards averaged about one ton per acre. There remains in the Oakland warehouses at the present time 150 bales of the 1903 crop. These belong to the Sham-brook estate.

E. G. Young & Company have sold to the Oregon City mills 40,000 pounds of wool. This represents the fall clip of this county. Last spring they shipped 200,000 pounds to New York, that being nearly the entire clip of Douglas county.

ANOTHER BANK

FAILURE

Pueblo Title Trust Company Fails
Capitalized at \$259,000.

Pueblo, Colo., Nov. 5.—The Pueblo Title Trust Company, one of the largest banking institutions in the city, failed to open its doors this morning. The institution was capitalized at \$250,000, and was recently purchased by the Woods Investment Company, of Cripple Creek, Colo., who were also owners of the First National Bank of Victor, which failed to open its doors yesterday.

INDIANS ARE

JUSTIFIABLE

Indian Commissioner Says Mur-
der an Unpardonable
Outrage.

Washington Nov. 5.—The Indian office this morning received a dispatch from the agent at Brannan Hot Springs, in which he urges that orders be issued by the governor of Wyoming to use all necessary means to protect the Indians under arrest, as mob violence has been threatened. Indian Commissioner Jones is indignant over the killing of the Indians, which he characterizes as a brutal murder and an unpardonable outrage. He says that they have a right to defend themselves from attack by the sheriff's posse, which is not unreasonable. The governor of Wyoming has been appealed to protect the prisoners.

NEGRO COLONIZA-

TION A FAILURE

New York, Nov. 5.—On the steamer Majestic which arrived today were 12 American negroes who went to Liberia to experiment with cotton culture, with a view of the future colonization from the United States. The experiment was a failure and the negroes had barely enough money on which to return home.

Rome, Nov. 5.—Pope Pius IX today received Hon. William Curtis, representative of the St. Louis Exposition. The pope informed Mr. Curtis that he would send a commissioner to the fair and that he would probably select Martinelli as his representative.

Boys Strike and Girls Employed.

Indianapolis, Nov. 5.—All the A. D. T. messenger boys struck at 10 o'clock this morning. The company is now employing girls.

Hill Reappointed Judge.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—President Roosevelt today re-appointed James G. Hill federal judge of the Indian Territory.

OVER FORTY THOUSAND MAY STRIKE

Big Labor Movement Inaugurated This Morning.

Tanners and Curriers Out and Employees of Chicago City Railway Balloting on Strike.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—The first of a series of strikes that may involve 40,000 Chicago workmen was inaugurated this morning when 1100 tanners and curriers employed by the American Hide & Leather Company, struck. They demand ten dollars a week and a ten-hour day.

The second and more serious movement began at four o'clock this morning when 2500 employees of the Chicago City Railway began balloting on a strike.

It is expected that this strikewill tie up every road in the south side of the city.

Theo. Mommson at Rest.

Berlin, Nov. 5.—The remains of the late Theo. Mommson were buried here today. The funeral oration was delivered by Professor Herrick, the closest friend of the deceased. A number of prominent persons attended the funeral, including the Crown Prince Frederick, who represented the Kaiser. The latter went to Wolalargen this morning to return the visit of the Czar.

Will Not Accept Nomination.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 5.—Vice President Duncan, who has been brought forward to head the Mitchell faction, is said to have announced to friends that he would not seek the presidency unless Gompers would withdraw from the contest. Gompers will not consent to this.

Kid Vaughan Convicted.

Goshen, Ind., Nov. 5.—Kid Vaughan was convicted this morning of enticing sixteen-year-old Majorie Bedekos from her home with the promise of marriage. The couple were arrested at St. Louis, where they were living as man and wife.

HOS. YOUNG SENTENCED

He Will Also Spend Four Years in the Pen.

Grand Jury Returned Two In- dictments This Morning-- Vivian Dunten Fined for Selling Liquor Without License.

Thomas Young, the man who stole several pairs of harness in Eugene several weeks ago and who gave the officers a merry chase between Cottage Grove and Oakland, was this morning sentenced to four years in the penitentiary by Judge J. W. Hamilton of the circuit court. He was sentenced on two counts, four years for each count.

INDICTMENTS RETURNED.

E. P. Cadwell was indicted for pointing a gun at John A. Thomas on July 8, 1903.

C. W. Berry and Frank Clifton were indicted for stealing watches.

Berry is accused of taking John S. Hamilton's watch at Cottage Grove on September 29th, and Clifton took John Davis' watch also at Cottage Grove on July 20.

This afternoon Cadwell waived arraignment and he will enter a plea tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Vivian Dunten was indicted for selling liquor without a license at Waterville. He was arraigned this forenoon and pleaded guilty. Judge Hamilton imposed upon him a fine of \$200, which was paid.

"Not a true bill" was reported in the case of the state vs. James Wilkinson.

THE DAMAGE CASE.

The Beadle vs. Paine & Kuykendall damage case has proven to be a long drawn out affair. A large number of witnesses have been examined and the testimony of some of them is very lengthy. Today X-ray photographs of Beadle's broken arm were produced, and the bones of a human arm were introduced to illustrate the nature of the fracture.
