

GUY HUFF ENTERED PLEA OF NOT GUILTY

Oregonian: Guy Huff, who was indicted for forgery alleged to have been committed in connection with the McKinley-Ware Puter cases, came to the city from Eugene and entered a plea of not guilty to the count against him. Mr. Huff asserts his innocence and is confident that he will be able to clear himself before the court.

The November term of the federal court will open on November 16, with the case of Mr. Moody. The trial promises to be a lively one. At the Dalles, where Mr. Moody lives, it is the general topic of conversation.

BOND AT \$5000.

(From the Journal.)

A small display of fireworks was given in the federal court yesterday when Guy Huff appeared to give bond for his presence in court at his trial for alleged forgery. Huff, accompanied by his wife, reached Portland on Monday evening, coming from Olympia. With his counsel, Judge Thomas O'Day and Senator Pierce Mays, he went to the federal courtroom at 3 o'clock. Judge O'Day addressed Judge Bellinger, referring to the indictment against Huff, and said that the defendant wished to give a bond for his appearance, and asked the court to fix the amount for which surety must be pledged. District Attorney Hall replied that the bond had been fixed already, and Judge O'Day asked, in surprise:

"For what amount?"

"Five thousand dollars," said Mr. Hall, whereat was precipitated an extended argument for the lowering of the bond.

"May it please the court," said Judge O'Day, "this man Huff has come here voluntarily from Olympia to answer the charge against him. I regard \$5000 as excessive, and ask the court to lower it."

"The bail is not excessive," rejoined the district attorney. "Huff is accused of a serious crime, forgery, and \$5000 is not too much bail for him to give to assure his attendance at the trial. He has followed a sporting life and has been a card player; he has no property and there is nothing to hold him if he took it into his head to leave. I desire to have the bail retained at \$5000."

Judge Bellinger then asked what was the amount of the bonds that had been given by the defendants in other cases—McKinley, Ware and Puter—and was informed by the district attorney that the United States com-

missioner had placed them at \$2000 each.
