MAY SECURE BIG BREWERY

A Representative of
Wisconsin Capital-
ists Here.

Proposes to Put in a Big Brew-
ing Plant if Proper En-
couragement Is
Given.

(Daily Guard, January 8.)

Henry Lang, a representative of Wisconsin capitalists, arrived in Eugene yesterday for the purpose of looking over the field here for the establishment of a brewery. Mr. Lang was registered at the Smeede Hotel from Olympia, Wash. He left this afternoon for the north, but announced that he would be back again in eight or ten days to further consider the matter.

While here Mr. Lang conferred with the various liquor dealers and other business men in regard to the advisability of establishing a brewing plant in Eugene and was given every encouragement by all with whom he talked. He was very much impressed with the city as a good location for such an enterprise, and no doubt will report favorably to the men he represents.

It is understood that the men who wish to put the plant in have plenty of capital and that the brewery would be a large one. It would give employment to quite a number of men and would add materially to the prosperity of the city.

HIGH SCHOOL FOR COTTAGE GROVE

A Fine Eight-Room Structure to
Be Erected
There.

Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 8.—Architect Burgraf, of Salem, was in town this week and turned over the plans and specifications for Cottage Grove's new High School building, to the school board. The site for the new building has been selected in the J. H. McFarland addition on a slight elevation near the site of the old home which burned, but the ground has not yet been secured. The building is to be a fine eight-room, two-story structure, modern in all of its departments, and is patterned after the Patterson school building at Eugene. It will cost complete, about \$14,000, however, only three rooms are to be completed at the time of building.

IMPROVEMENTS AT DORMITORY

A new hot water tank of 400-gallons capacity is being put in place at the University dormitory to supply the boys' bath tubs. This is a much-needed improvement as the supply of hot water in the building has been small, the tank in the kitchen being the only one in use.

Gen. Odell Stricken.

General W. H. Odell, than whom few men are more generally known to the people of Oregon, is reported to be seriously ill at his home in Salem. General Odell is a pioneer resident of this state and has served the public in several important official positions. He was surveyor general for this state, clerk of the state land board and later postmaster at the Capital city. A. W. Stoll, of Vancouver, Wash., a son-in-law of General Odell, passed through Portland this morning in response to a call summoning him to the Salem home. General Odell is in his 75th year, has spent an active life, and his illness is said to be due to an affection of the internal organs that has been causing him inconvenience for some time.—Portland Telegram.

ALMOST PURE GOLD UNCOVERED

Fabulously Rich Strike
Made in Badger
Mine.

Find Was Made January 5--An
Inch Vein, the Rock of Which
Is 90 Per Cent Pure
Gold.

Gold, almost pure in quality and in quantity that has enabled its discoverers to extract ten pounds of the virgin metal, has been struck in the Badger mine, at Blue River. News of this phenomenal find reached Portland today, says the Telegram of yesterday, Richard Constable, employed as a miner on the property, writes to friends in this city that the strike was made January 5. The vein is about one inch in width, the rock being 90 per cent pure gold, giving a value of \$132,000 to the ton.

The property is situated one and a quarter miles from the Lucky Boy, and has shown good values at all times during the previous development of the property. The Sunset group joins the Badger, and it is contended that the ledge which carries this gold runs through the Sunset.

The Badger mine was recently purchased by Philadelphia people, who are now actively engaged in opening the property. W. L. Becker is superintendent, and recently left Portland to continue work on the ground, after spending the holidays here.

About ten pounds of the rich ore has been extracted, and the streak is being jealously guarded and every particle of ore saved.

For richness it is the most sensational strike made in Oregon for many years. The Sunset group is owned by W. H. Dodge, of this city, and C. Runyard, of Blue River. Many Portland people are interested in the mines of that section, and news of the strike was received with much gratification.

SHIPPED CHICKENS TO YOKOHAMA

B. F. Keeney, the well known chicken fancier of Goshen, who is now acting as special registration clerk at the courthouse, has just received a letter from a gentleman at Yokohama, Japan, informing him of the safe arrival there of four Barred Plymouth Rock chickens, which Mr. Keeney shipped to him. The fowls leaving here in October. The gentleman writes that this consignment of fowls is the first from America that has arrived in Japan in condition to make it worth while to coop them. He says that generally a half of them die enroute and the other half are not fit for much when they arrive there.

Petition Granted.

The district boundary board of Lane county in session January 6, at Eugene, changed the boundary line between school district No. 85 and the Springfield district as follows: Beginning at the southeast corner of William Neis' land where it intersects the north bank of the Willamette river, thence up said river to the east line of section 2, tp. 18 s, r 3 w, thence north to the present boundary line of school district 19, Lane county, Oregon.

This annexes the land belonging to George A. Dorris and David Spencer to the Springfield district, a change which has been sought for some time, but which, owing to the amount of territory included in a former petition, met with opposition and was refused by the boundary board.—Springfield News.

ED McCLANAHAN'S CASE DISMISSED

Trial at Salem Results in Dis-
missal of the
Case.

Salem Journal, Jan. 7: In the circuit court yesterday afternoon, the case of the state against E. McClanahan, the automobilist, who is charged with frightening a horse to death with his machine, on the highway near the penitentiary last summer, was called for trial.

After the testimony for the state was submitted, defense moved a dismissal of the suit, and this motion took up the time of the court until adjournment. At the opening of the court at 9 o'clock this morning, Mr. Woodcock, on behalf of the plaintiff, moved the court to direct a verdict of not guilty, for the reason that the information did not show facts sufficient to constitute a crime.

After hearing the argument of counsel, Judge Frazer dismissed the information and discharged the defendant, for the reason that the act complained of did not constitute a crime under the laws. As Mr. McClanahan was not permitted to testify, his side of the case did not come before the jury at all.

In discussing the matter, after his dismissal, Mr. McClanahan said that, when the unfortunate incident occurred on the road near the penitentiary last summer, he checked his automobile when the owner of the horse raised his hand in protest against the fast approach of the machine. He stopped his engine, and slowed down, coming almost to a standstill, and after passing the rig, and about 75 yards beyond it, he again started the engine, and it was the noise made by the machine at that time that frightened the horse and caused the wreck and the runaway.

Frank Herrington's Death.

It appears rather late to the writer that the death of a man once so well known as Frank Herrington was in Eugene, occurring, too, so close by as Portland, should just now be noted in the Guard, but if the announcement was made in the Portland papers it was overlooked by reason of the holiday season.

Mr. Herrington died in Portland December 23rd and was buried there on the 24th. He had been a sufferer from piles for years, but his attending physician wrongly diagnosed the case as cancer, and to make sure used the X-ray. This burnt the delicate membrane and he suffered great agony during the last few days of his life. He was buried at Portland. Mr. Herrington came to Eugene in 1870, and soon after started a barbershop. This he operated successfully till 1897, when he got the Fallou fever and selling his Eugene holdings joined the Lane county contingent bound for the promised land. In the Fallou he also found fortunes with Horace F. Stratton, joined from Eugene, and a Mr. Davenport, the firm establishing a big store at Farmington with a branch establishment or two. It was flush times and for awhile Mr. Herrington was rated well up in the thousands. But a crash came from the credit system upon which business was generally done, and the firm with many others succumbed.

He went to Portland in 1902, and with his accustomed versatility engaged in the repairing of small machinery, sewing machines, etc., for a time; then into a Keeloy cure institute hospital, and latterly had invented a slot machine, from which he was reported as making considerable money.

In Eugene he was a very zealous member of the Odd Fellows' lodge and its higher branch, the Encampment. His not a few friends here regret not only his death but the circumstances which made him a sufferer and brought it apparently needlessly about.
