A Furor on Wheat Today—Market Excited at Close.

Armour Took in a Third of a Million of Other Boys' Money—Very Exciting Day.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—This was the most exciting day in the wheat pit for years. The excitement at the close of the day's trading was terrific.

Armour, who was long on a line of fifteen million bushels, did not appear in the market till the advance was already sharp. Then it went 90½, and advance of two and a quarter cents per bushel netting him \$340,000 profits on today's trading. The advance was due to frantic efforts of the shorts to cover.

BERT BICE GOT SIX YEARS IN PEN

Yesterday's Roseburg Review: An important feature of the present session of the circuit court occurred Monday afternoon when Bert Bice, charged jointly with his younger brother, Harvey, on two separate indictments for horse stealing, entered a plea of guilty. He was sentenced this morning by Judge Hamilton to six years imprisonment in the penitentiary. Only last August did Bert Bice complete a two-year term in the penitentiary for a crime exactly similar to that for which he is now to serve three times as long. Harvey Bice was arraigned at the same time as his brother and pleaded not guilty. This morning he withdrew the plea and entered another of guilty. He will be sentenced tomorrow at ten o'clock. Harvey was an inmate of the state reform school at the time Bert was released from the state prison. Harvey was soon after induced by his older brother to desert the school and together they made their way to their home in Douglas county, trading horses which they stole. Harvey's arrest at his home near Riddle, and Bert's subsequent capture by a storekeeper at Merlin, Josephine county, are familiar to our readers. Two younger Bice boys of the same family have also been inmates of the state reform school for some time past.

PRINTER SENTENCED.

A. E. Brown, the itinerant printer, who uttered the name of the Plaindealer Publishing Company to two checks while in their temporary employment, pleaded guilty to the charge of forgery when arraigned this morning, and was given a sentence of two years. This is the minimum sentence and had been recommended by District Attorney Brown.

Four Sawmills on Siuslaw Bay Will Have Big Output This Year.
