WHITMANS

WINS THE DEBATE

University of Oregon Lost by Unanimous Decision.

The Question, "Is the Incorporation of Labor Unions Desirable?"—A Banquet Enjoyed.

The second annual contest in debating between Whitman College and the University of Oregon was won last evening by Whitman, the decision of the judges being unanimous.

The question discussed was, "Is the Incorporation of Labor Unions Desirable?" Oregon argued for the affirmative and Whitman for the negative.

For Oregon, Tomlinson was easily the star, making a large majority of its points, while Brown and Baldwin won the debate for Whitman.

Hon. L. T. Harris presided and after reading the question, introduced the first speaker of the evening, Herbert G. Moulton, on the affirmative.

Mr. Moulton showed that labor unions are not responsible, and that lack of responsibility brings recklessness. Unions are increasing in strength and less in lawlessness and claimed incorporation only check for this. He outlined the plan by which labor unions might be incorporated.

Edward D. Baldwin for the negative, claimed labor troubles can be settled only by conciliation. He cited a number of legal decisions to show that organized labor is legally responsible. He also showed that they are morally responsible and claimed that incorporation would lessen responsibility, would make unions less liable for broken contracts, and would increase the number of strikes.

Ralph Bacon, the second speaker on the affirmative, showed that the incorporation of labor unions would be beneficial to employer, to laborer, and to consuming public. He showed that incorporation works well in England, Australia and New Zealand. Claimed that incorporation would lessen the number of strikes.

Gains Greenalade, the second speaker for the negative, claimed that incorporation of unions would not work, for incorporation is perpetual, while labor unions are many times only temporary; that incorporation would not recognize identity of interest, and that labor unions are democratic, while incorporations are representative.

Wayne Tomlinson, leader of the affirmative, again outlined their plan of case. He was by far the most forceful speaker for Oregon. Most of his time was spent in refutation.

Brown, the leader on the negative, was perhaps the best speaker of the evening. He summed the argument of the negative and showed that labor leaders are against incorporation, and the only way to get incorporation is to force it. This would drive labor unions to socialism and anarchy. The judges of the debate were Governor Chamberlain, Judge Otto Kraemer and Robert Treat Platt of Portland.

TEAMS BANQUETTED. After the debate the committee on oratory and debate tendered the two teams, the judges and presiding officers and their lady friends a banquet at the dormitory. Covers were laid for thirty-five guests.

Prof. I. M. Glen acted as toast master. Toasts were responded to by President Campbell, "Bez" Brown, and Governor Chamberlain.

DEDICATION ON JANUARY 22ND Date Set for High School Exercises--To Be Held in Evening.

(Daily Guard January 15.) The Eugene school board has decided upon a date for the formal dedication of the \$30,000 new brick High School building. The exercises will be held Friday evening, Jan. 22nd, in the assembly room of the new building.

During the day on that date the building will be thrown open and the public will be invited to go through it and make an inspection of it. The exercises will be held on the afternoon named date on the condition that Governor Chamberlain and State Superintendent Ackerman can be here then. If they cannot, the dedication will then be postponed until such a time as these gentlemen may come. Governor Chamberlain is in Eugene today and the board will get an expression from him before he leaves. It is probable, however, that the 22nd will be a satisfactory date and that the event promises to be a big one.
