DARING TRAIN ROBBERY

On the Sunset Limited
Early This Morning.

Boarded Train and Forced Open
Express Car—Threw Safe Off
—Trainmen Discovered the
Theft an Hour Later.

San Francisco, Jan. 21.—The Southern Pacific Sunset Limited train, westbound, was boarded by masked men near tunnel No. 7, a few miles from Paso Robles, Cal., early this morning. A safe was thrown off and discovery was not made until an hour later. The amount in the safe is unknown, but it is believed to be not less than \$10,000. A posse has been sent to the scene.

While the train was coming slowly up grade into the tunnel, the robbers boarded it and battered down the large doors to the first express car, in which there were no messengers. The door was locked at San Luis Obispo, after several thousand dollars in money and valuables had been placed in the safe.

The train proceeded northward with the express messengers in the adjoining car to the rear. They did not notice any suspicious characters around the station, neither did the conductor or other train men. It is almost a positive truth that the robbers boarded the train as it was proceeding slowly up the grade and when the tunnel was entered they immediately began their work of breaking in the door, using long iron rods and a hatchet. The noise was not heard by any of the trainmen. They must have worked at the door for fully fifteen minutes at the least, as the safe was thrown out near a little station called Thiels, in the San Lucia Mountains.

The sheriff and his deputies found the safe, blown open, early this morning and made an immediate attempt to trace the robbers and it is believed they live in the vicinity. No arrests have been made up to noon. A peculiar thing about the robbery is the fact that it was not discovered until after the train had left Paso Robles on its way north, when one of the express messengers

noticed the door had been broken open after the train had pulled out from Paso Robles station and when it reached San Miguel he gave the alarm.

The engineer and the conductor as well as the whole train crew, knew nothing of the robbery and not a single one could offer the slightest clue and the express car, in silence, alone told the story. Wells Fargo officials will not give out the exact amount the robbers secured, but it is known to be very large, as many valuable express packages were in the safe as well as considerable coin.

The men who committed the crime are familiar with the custom of the express messenger and helper leaving their car and going back into the baggage car during the early morning hours, and suspicion naturally points to frequenters of one of the depots along the line or to some employee as the leader. The mystery surrounding the robbery is made deeper by the failure of the bandits to blow open the big safe which is believed to have contained between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

The superintendent of the Wells Fargo Express Co. declares the safe blown open could not have contained a great amount of valuables as it was used principally by the messenger as a depository for way papers and small packages and refuse to estimate the amount of the plunder.
The robbers were evidently pressed for time after getting off the train and locating the safe, as they failed to make a complete job of the looting. When the treasure box was picked up it was found that a diamond worth probably \$500 was overlooked. Pieces of torn express envelopes were found strewn indiscriminately about the spot, showing conclusively the extreme haste the robbers were in.

An unofficial estimate of the loss places the amount of plunder at \$80,000, but the express and railroad officials unite in asserting that the loss is comparatively insignificant. A conservative estimate places the loss at about \$10,000, but as express officials are the only persons who know the full extent of the robbery in its magnitude may never become public.

BOARD OF REGENTS MET

Academic Department
Abolished at University.

Salaries of Several Instructors Increased—New Cement Walks to Take the Place of Board Walks.

At the meeting of the University of Oregon board of regents at Portland but little business aside from routine matters was transacted. The academic department was abolished, as the high schools of the state are now furnishing the necessary instruction in that grade of work. There are now only 20 academic students in the University.

SALARIES INCREASED.
The salary of Professor Stafford was raised from \$1200 to \$1400. Miss Slayter's salary was raised from \$900 to \$800. Registrar Gamber was raised from \$700 to \$800.

Dr. Boynton will remain another year as assistant in physics and mathematics. Dr. Friedel, who is doing graduate work in German, will resume his position as the head of the department of physics next September.

The board voted \$2500 for the improvement of the grounds. The old board walks will be replaced by cement walks and new driveways will be constructed.

FATAL GAS EXPLOSION IN HOTEL

Happened at Marion, Indiana, Early This Morning.

Three Killed Outright and Many Others Injured—Bodies Were Cremated.

Marion, Ind., Jan. 21.—A gas explosion occurred in a hotel here at six o'clock this morning. Three were killed outright, six fatally injured and eight dangerously. A fire followed.

The known dead are: Charles Beltel, hotel proprietor; Mrs. Beltel, James Devine. Fatally hurt, Edward Gaskell, L. Hobbs, Thomas Twigg.

The hotel is located at the north entrance of the Soldiers' Home. The explosion, which is believed to have been due to weak mains, was terrific. People in Marion, three miles away, were aroused. The building, is a two-story frame structure. The flames spread rapidly. The dead could be seen in the building and the bodies were cremated.

The hotel register was saved but there may have been other victims. If so, the bodies were cremated. The damage will be \$50,000.

STRICKEN BY PARALYSIS
