TERRIBLE DYNAMITE ACCIDENT

Two Young Men Torn to Pieces Near Independence by Explosion.

An Independence dispatch of March 5th says while thawing dynamite preparatory to blasting stumps at Burton's hopyard, two miles north of Independence, this morning at 8 o'clock, over one hundred pounds of dynamite exploded, killing Curtis Baker and Gilbert McCabe, young men of 22 and 18 years respectively, of this place. The bodies were torn to pieces, almost beyond recognition, and members of the bodies were hurled 120 feet. The legs of both were torn off at the knees.

The shed at the place of thawing was shattered to splinters and hurled 200 yards. The earth was torn up for several feet around to a depth of four feet. In a house fifty yards away the windows and doors were shattered. A woman and child in the house were not hurt.

They had some 100 pounds of dynamite in two boxes, and had placed some of this in some hot water for the purpose of thawing it out. The water was probably too warm, and as a result the dynamite exploded. One of the bodies was thrown a distance of over 100 feet and the other was hurled through the air almost as far. Their feet and limbs were torn from their bodies, their bowels were torn out, and their faces marred beyond recognition.

The whole 100 pounds exploded and the report was perceptible as a strong jar at Independence, a distance of 1 1/2 miles from the scene.

There was a woman and a little girl in the house located near the scene of danger, and although the house was badly demolished the people were not hurt. It was only a miracle that two other men were not killed as they had been working with the dynamite, and one of these started to run down to where the boys were, when he was called back by Mr. Burton, who wanted him to help him at something else for a few minutes.

MCKENZIE ON A RAMPAGE

Water in that River Highest This Year—No Damage Done.

Reports from Clatsop and other points on the McKenzie river today state that the river is on a rampage, being out of its banks and flooding a considerable portion of the country along the bottom.

The warm weather the past few days is responsible for this 1-abet, the deep snow in the Cascade Mountains being melted by the soft Chinook wind and the warm rains.

So far no reports of damage to property along the river have been received. The McKenzie is higher now than it has been this winter, but not near as high as it was during the big freshet last winter.

The Willamette was not affected much by the warm weather, and it remains almost stationary at this place.
