

SENTENCED TO FOUR AND TWO YEARS

Eastman and Skewes Go to Penitentiary for Forgery.

Grand Jury Has Finished Its Work, Filed Its Report and Has Been Discharged-- Civil Cases.

A good part of today's session of the circuit court was taken up with the case of Charles Gary against W. H. Russell, to recover money on a logging contract.

The grand jury is still at work on criminal cases, and is not yet ready to make its report. The cases disposed of since yesterday's report are as follows:

F. E. Dunn vs. M. J. Hawley, report of referee. Argued and submitted. Ten days given plaintiff to file brief and defendant to answer there after to file brief.

The Hurlburt-Nicklin Mercantile Company, a corporation, vs. Peter P. Colguard, to recover money. Verdict for plaintiff for \$22.

Frank Gorrell vs. Douglas County, Oregon, damages. Dismissed.

Fred R. Welch vs. J. E. Sweet and Dan Sweet, objections to cost bill. Submitted; plaintiff given 2 days to file brief. Defendant 3 days thereafter to file brief.

E. J. Hirsch and E. Block, partners doing business under the firm name of Hirsch, Block & Co., vs. C. P. Houston, to recover money. Judgment for \$148.03, interest at 6 per cent from Oct. 27, 1902.

Samuel George, vs. Cornelia Brown, nee Stevens, George Brown and Nancy Griffith, foreclosure. Continued for service.

Charles Gray, vs. W. H. Russell, to recover money. Jury selected: Edgar King, Jos Ferguson, C. C. Hazelton, J. L. Furnish, Robt Vitus, J. T. Zomwalt, G. L. Day, Samuel Templeton, Geo Winn, R. R. Rossman, Geo. E. Sides, H. W. Jones. Jury out.

K. G. Staples vs. Wm. H. Drake and N. W. Drake, confirmation. Confirmed.

James G. Merrimer vs. Jacob Koontz and A. C. Ruby; appeal from justice court. Settled and dismissed.

PLEADED GUILTY.
Earl Eastman and H. H. Skewes, charged with forgery, were arraigned yesterday afternoon and time for pleading was set for today. At 1:30 o'clock they appeared and both entered pleas of guilty. Time for sentence was set for tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

This morning at 9 o'clock Earl Eastman and H. H. Skewes were sentenced by Judge Hamilton of the circuit court to four and two years respectively, for forgery.

Eastman and Skewes were brought into the court room at the appointed time. Eastman was ordered to stand up, and when asked by the judge whether or not he had anything to say why sentence should not be passed upon him, replied, "No, sir." Attorney L. Bilyeu, counsel for the prisoner, then made a short plea for leniency and the judge sentenced Eastman to the penitentiary for four years.

Skewes appeared neatly dressed and his acquaintances hardly recognized him as he has grown a heavy mustache during his four months in jail. After replying in the negative to the judge's usual query, Attorney Bilyeu asked that the sentence be light because the amount of money secured by the prisoner's act of forgery was small, and because the prisoner was the last of a family of consumptives and was afflicted with the disease himself. The judge gave him the lower end of the scale, two years in the penitentiary.

GRAND JURY'S REPORT.
The grand jury finished its work last evening and was discharged. Following is the jury's final report:
"To the circuit court of the State of Oregon for Lane county. Final report of grand jury:

"To the Hon. J. W. Hamilton, judge of the above entitled court:
"We, the grand jury, at the March, 1904, term of the above court, in our final report, say:
"That we have investigated all charges of crime coming to our knowledge, and have disposed of the same according to our best judgment.
"Having completed our labors we ask to be discharged.

TAMPERED WITH U. S. MAIL BOX

Three Barnes Boys Under Arrest for Tearing Down Rural Delivery Box.

Deputy United States Marshal Jacob Froebster, of Portland, accompanied by Chief of Police Stiles, of this city, made a trip to the Palmer Ayers place, a few miles north of Eugene in the river bottom, this morning and placed under arrest Ernest, Frank and Amos Barnes, three brothers charged with tearing down and demolishing a United States mail box.

It appears that the Barnes brothers, who are all young men and ought to know better, tore down the rural free delivery mail box in front of John Maughn's place, immediately across the river from town, last Saturday. They had been in town and were on their way back to the Ayers place where they have been chopping wood. The Barnes boys were brought to Eugene this forenoon and were have been given an examination before United States Commissioner J. J. Walton at once, but that gentleman was busy with a case in the circuit court, and the examination was set for 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The penalty for such an offense is a fine of not less than \$100. Later—Ernest and Frank Barnes were bound over in the sum of \$250 each. Amos Barnes discharged. Ernest and Frank will be taken to Portland on the early train tomorrow morning.
